COUNTING OF "ORDINARY" AND "PRESS" TELEGRAMS.

The following regulations in regard to counting of words, figures, &c., in "Ordinary" and "Press" Telegrams are enforced :---

1. 1

1. Names of divisions, towns, villages, locations, settlements, railway stations at which multic telegraph buildess is transacted (other than Branch Telegraph Offices), and Foreign Telegraph Offices mentioned in the International List of Telegraph Offices.

Recognised abbreviations, such as "etc.," "can't," "don't," "couldn't," "oz.," "ib.," "cwt.," "ut.," "ft.," "yd.," and "a.m." and "p.m." (when used to denote time).

- 2. Names of streets, squares, roads, lanes, Branch Telegraph Offices, &c., are counted according to the number of words employed; for example, Adderley Street, St. George's Street, Lansdowne Road, Sällor's Lane, each count as two words, and Old Main Street, New Church Street, each count as three words.
- 3. Figures are counted at the rate of five figures to the word. For example, 384, 4589, 24689 each count as one word. Fractions are counted according to the number of figures employed, one figure being added for the mark of division—thus, ‡ counts as one word, 2‡ as one, 210‡ as two. In groups of figures a stop, a decimal point, or an oblique stroke is always counted as a figure—thus, 10/2, 287/4, 1896, each count as one word, 100/250 counts as two words, and so on. The symbols %, a/c, b/l, and c/o are each counted as one word.
- 4: Where a figure or a group of figures is followed or preceded by a letter, the letter is counted as one word thus:-1000a or A1000 counts as two words. An exception is however, made in the case of ordinal numbers, thus:-1st, 1ste, 2de, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, each count as one word; 1000th, 1200th, each as two words.
- 5. Single letters, single figures, inverted commas, parentheses, underlines and marks of commerce, such as cif, cfi, fob, each count as one word.
- 6. Words joined by hyphens are counted as two or more words, according to the number of words employed.
- 7. Combinations of words contrary to the usage of the English, French, German, Dutch, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, or Latin languages are not permissible.
