

THE DUKE OF YORK chatting with a little inmate of the Queen's Hospital for Children, Hackney-road, which is visited yesterday.






A NOVEL GARAGE.—A Hampstead motor-car owner has solved the difficulty of housing his car by converting his basement kitchen into a garage.
