THE AIMS OF THE CLUB



The Club was founded in 1943 in order that there might be some place in Durban where people of all races could meet together, get to know each other personally and take part in joint activity. The Club is in no sense political and is debarred by its Constitution from taking any political action.

The bringing together of the different sections of the South African community is its fundamental aim and it seeks to achieve this by fostering activities of all kinds, cultural, social, educational as well as those calculated simply to entertain, in which all races can take an active part.

It also aims at developing the individuality of members by providing them with various opportunities for self-expression, particularly as this helps to bring about appreciation of the qualities and capabilities of persons of different races and respect for the personalities of such people.

The Club provides facilities for inter-racial meetings of both formal and informal nature. Its premises are open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekdays for tea and lunch and as a place to rest and are also the venue of more formal activity in the evening.

The Club provides a place where Europeans and Non-Europeans wishing to meet can do so in reasonably comfortable circumstances. The importance of this can be realised when it is remembered that there is no other similar place in Durban where a Non-European and European can sit down and enjoy a cup of tea together. For example, some years ago, when a Kenya Native Commissioner visiting Durban wished to see the son of one of the chiefs in his area who was studying here, the Club was the only place where such a meeting could be arranged.

Undoubtedly the Durban International Club plays an important part in the life of Durban as a meeting place available to members of all races.

We want each member to think who, from among his friends, would like to join in Club work and to ask that person to join. The Executive asks that each member makes a definite approach to one other person. I hope that all members will respond actively to this important request.

SOCIAL EVENING - FRIDAY, MARCH 5th.

It is with very real pleasure that we welcome back to the Club our former Chairman, Mr Kenneth Kirkwood, who has returned to Durban after two years research work into the theory, problems and practice of government in relation to multi-racial societies. He spent a year at the Institute of Commonwealth studies, University of London, then travelled in the U.S.A. on a Carnegie fellowship for three months, and finally worked for several months on the staff of the Institute of Colonial studies at Oxford University. We look forward very much to meeting him again and to hearing what he has to tell us of his experiences overseas.

REPORT ON CONFERENCE OF S.A. INSTITUTE OF RACE RELATIONS.

It has become customary for delegates to the Annual Council Meetings of the Institute of Race Relations to make their report at a joint meeting of the International Club and the Joint Council of Africans and Europeans. This year the report of the meetings which were held at Port Elizabeth in January will be given at the BANTU SOCIAL CENTRE in Beatrice Street on Tuesday, March 9th. All members are invited, and the speakers will be Mr Donald Mtimkulu, Mr Jack Naidoo, Rev. A.H. Zulu and Mrs J.E. Hill. Mrs Hill also attended the SABRA conference in Bloemfontein, and will have something to say about that.

THE SPIRIT OF RECOVERY IN GERMANY - FRIDAY, MARCH 19th.

Dr Leib is one of those who left Germany when Hitler rose to power in 1933, but he remained in touch with developments there through his contacts with the Evangelical Church. These who were here when he addressed the Club eight years ago will remember him as an interesting speaker. Since then he has been engaged on the work of re-education and rehabilitation, first amongst P.O.W's in England and then for five years in the Education Department at Hamburg. He has been sent out to South Africa to make known the progress and the problems of Germany in this country, and we are fortunate to have this opportunity of hearing first-hand information.

THE PATTERN OF AMERICAN POLITICS - FRIDAY 26th.

Although Prof. Nixon is a newcomer to South Africa, his wife is no stranger to South Africa, for she was well known as Peggy McCord, daughter of the founder of McCord Hospital. Prof. Nixon, Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of California, is one of the two American experts who have been sent by the Carnegie Corporation to the University of Natal to train advanced research workers in the field of social conditions in the Union. His subject is one which should prove very interesting, for American politics are to most outsiders somewhat of a mystery, and no one could be better qualified to enlighten us than Prof. Nixon.

SERIES ON HEALTH.

Medical Science and Practice have expanded so enormously in recent times as to embrace many a subject that was hitherto considered completely unrelated to the causation of disease. Thus matters like Housing, Food, Soil Conservation and Recreational Activities are now beginning to receive high priority in the alleviation of disease. Whereas at one time the emphasis was on seeking new panaceas, it has now shifted to provide higher standards of living, and fuller and richer lives.

With a view to highlighting some of these new attitudes, the Durban International Club is arranging a series of lectures the first of which is by Dr Gale, ex Secretary of Health and Dean of the Faculty of Medicine at the Wentworth Medical School, on Friday 8th May 1953.

Our friends come to us after a lightning tour of Europe and West Africa, and brief visits to Johannesburg, Kimberley, Cape Town, Port Elizabeth and Fort Hare. They have expressed a desire to become acquainted with the activities of the Club.

We extend a cordial welcome to the Steeres and we know they will enjoy all the facilities provided by our Club during their stay in Durban.

It is hoped that they will speak at the Club and I understand that Saturday, 9th May (7.45 p.m.) is a suitable date for them. This however is subject to confirmation.

TUESDAY, 18th August 1953 : Work Camp Movement - Mr Clive Gray, a young student from Chicago University will speak to us on "Work Camp Movement", in the different parts of the world. He has already spent a month in South Africa at the Wilgespruit Fellowship Centre, where a really successful work camp which I had the pleasure of visiting in July, was being held. He has studied in Germany and travelled widely in Europe. This together with his experiences in the U.S.A. has given him a background to talk authoritatively on this subject. His lecture will certainly appeal to members and to all young people, and a special invitation is extended to High School and University Students.

FRIDAY EVENING, August 21st, is a date to remember. Mrs Morel will present a play-reading of "Chitra" by the Indian poet-philosopher Rabindranath Tagore. This lyrical drama is one of the most delightful of his plays.

POVERTY, HEALTH, & THE COST OF MEDICAL SERVICES. Dr Bassa, Chairman of the Study Group, needs no introduction to Club Members. He will discuss the relation between poverty and ill-health and the question of whether such funds as are available for health services are being used so as to get the greatest benefit. Tuesday, August 25th is the evening.

EQUAL PAY FOR EQUAL WORK. The Institute of Race Relations is performing a very useful service in arranging for a discussion of this very vital and controversial subject. TEA PARTY TO WELCOME MRS McCORD. We are very happy indeed to have the opportunity of welcoming to the Club Mrs Margaret McCord, widow of Dr James B. McCord, the founder of McCord Hospital. It will be 54 years ago this December since Dr & Mrs McCord began their work amongst the Zulus, which has borne such fruit that to-day Mrs McCord has returned to Durban to attend the opening of a new £30,000 wing to the Hospital - how different from the days when Dr McCord built his first operating table himself from five shillings worth of wood! Come and meet Mrs McCord at 4 p.m. on Friday, September 11th.

MRS GERICKE, "MENTAL HEALTH". Mrs Gericke is Principal of the Hunt Road Government School, and Chairman of the Durban Mental Health Society. Her subject is one which is often forgotten or neglected in South Africa to-day. She herself is a charming and accomplished speaker, and we hope that members will avail themselves of this opportunity of hearing her on Friday, 18th - September at 7.45 p.m.

FUTURE PROGRAMME. Our Programme is carried on into October to give members an idea of the good things in store. Further details will be announced later. The week-end study course on Indian population is being arranged by Mr I.Allan, to cover economic, medical, religious and social viewpoints, and to supply facts on a subject which many are more prone to talk about than to study.

PAST EVENTS. The social evening arranged for July 31st was very successful. A good crowd enjoyed the varied programme, for which we are very grateful to our guest artists, Miss Peggy Griffiths, Mrs Makan and her dancers, and Mr Ambrose Ngcobo and his Harmony Minstrels.
