ITALIAN FORCES INVADE GREECE

BRITISH WARSHIPS AND AIRCRAFT ENGAGE ITALIAN NAVY

HITLER AND MUSSOLINI ARE DRAGGING THE WHOLE WORLD INTO THE WAR AS THE RESULT OF THEIR FAILURE TO "BRING BRITAIN TO HER KNEES." THEY HAVE BEEN FOR THE LAST TWO WEEKS TROTTING ALL OVER EUROPE LOOKING FOR HELP AND ENDEAVOURING TO FIND A WAY OUT OF THE PRECARIOUS POSITION IN WHICH THEY FIND THEMSELVES AS THE RESULT OF HITLER'S FAILURE TO INVADE BRITAIN.

GREECE INVADED

WHILE HITLER WAS WOOING MARSHAL PETAIN, PREMIER OF FRANCE, AND GENERAL FRANCO OF SPAIN, SIGNOR MUSSOLINI ORDERED HIS ARMY TO INVADE GREECE; AND THUS SPREAD THE WAR TO THE BALKAN STATES. IT IS NOT AS YET KNOWN HOW FAR THE CONFLAGRATION WILL SPREAD; BUT IT IS QUITE CLEAR THAT BEFORE LONG SEVERAL COUNTRIES WILL BE INVOLVED.

BRITAIN GOES TO THE RESCUE

GREAT BRITAIN HAS PROMISED TO GIVE AID TO GREECE AND ALREADY BRITISH WARSHIPS AND AEROPLANES HAVE BEEN IN ACTION AGAINST THE ITALIAN NAVY IN THE AEGEAN SEA.

MUSSOLINI'S UNPROVOKED AGGRESSION

Naval aircraft from His Majesty's ships of the Mediterranean Fleet have carried out an attack on Maltezana, the capital of the Island of Stampalia, in the Dodecanese, and the nearest Italian air base to Athens, says an Admiralty communiqué.

King George of Greece has assumed supreme command of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Reuter was officially informed that the British Government is giving Greece military aid in the widest sense of the term. It is not possible at the present stage to disclose the various steps taken, but it was announced by Mr. A. V. Alexander, First Lord of the Admiralty, that British Naval assistance for Greece had already

begun.

A communiqué issued in Athens stated that enemy forces of varying strength attacked Greek positions on the frontier lines in successive waves. The communiqué added: "Our troops have held their positions. Enemy aircraft attacked certain military objectives, but without success. Two women were killed in the Epirus district."

Greeks in every country are rallying to the colours. Many young Greeks besieged the Greek Consulate in Istanbul demanding to be sent home, so that they might fight in the Greek army. Six hundred of them left for Greece. An army of 20,000 Greeks has been raised in Egypt.

R.A.F. BOMBS NAZI ARMAMENTS FACTORIES AT SKOTA

British bombers again raided areas in Germany and in enemy-occupied territory.

The Air Ministry announces that the R.A.F. made successful attacks on military objectives in Germany as well as on ports and aerodromes in enemy-occupied territory.

The successful attack by British bombers on the huge Skoda armament works at Pilsen in Czechoslovakia on Sunday night, is described by the Air Ministry as "one of the most ambitious bombing raids carried out by the R.A.F. and marks another increase in the R.A.F.'s offensive under the control of the new Chief of Air Staff, Sir Charles Portal."

The attack ended in the early hours of Monday morning—the 22nd anniversary of the founding of the Czechoslovak State.

The Skoda works, which are one of the three biggest armament factories in the world, fell into German hands at the time of the occupation of Bohemia and Moravia in March, 1939. They cover 400 acres and employ 50,000 workers.

When the raiders neared the target, after a 750-mile flight from the English coast, visibility was so bad that they spent an hour searching for the works. Then the plant was seen silhouetted

against the snowcovered ground. "Fierce fires and explosions followed the attacks," says an Air Ministry news bulletin. One pilot, who made three separate runs, bombing by the light of flares dropped by other aircraft, reported that all his heavy bombs found their mark.


"These were quickly followed by incendiary bombs which set fire to the damaged buildings. "Fires were seen to be increasing in size and new outbreaks were gaining hold as the aircraft left the city."

Naval Action Off Corfu

Italian and Greek warships are engaged in a battle near Corfu, where the Italians have attempted to land troops, states a message from Belgrade.

The Greek General Staff announces that Italian aircraft have bombed an aerodrome on the Corinthian Isthmus.

The anti-aircraft guns defending Athens were in action against planes raiding the capital from the direction of the Tatoi aerodrome.

Italians Battered In North Africa

An Italian concentration in Egypt, near the coast east of Sidi Barrani, was attacked by units of the Mediterranean Fleet in co-operation with R.A.F. aircraft. News of the action was received by the Admiralty from the Commander-in-Chief in the Mediterranean, who said that an enemy motor transport was destroyed and a large fire started in a fuel dump. No damage or casualties were sustained by the British forces.

The combined naval and R.A.F. bombardment was carried out at night, according to a R.A.F. communiqué, which says that bombers dropped parachute flares to light up the target for the naval force, and also bombed a camp and motor transport. Large fires were started and considerable damage was done in the main operation.

Bantu Doctor Serves In Royal Navy

Dr. Anders Qunta, an ex-Lovedale and Fort Hare student whose home is in the Transkei, completed his medical course at Edinburgh over a year ago but received a scholarship for post-graduate work and decided to stay on for a time. And then came the war, which has given a strange turn to many careers. Now Dr. Qunta is on war work. He is a ship's surgeon. He roams the High Seas, from the submarine infested waters around Great Britain to the Far East and back. The name of his ship cannot be mentioned but letters reach his friends from outlandish ports in Malaya, etc. His ship has sailed round the South African coast but he has not seen his home in the Transkei since he left to go Edinburgh to commence his study of medicine. One day the war will end and we hope Dr. Qunta will return safely to the great welcome and work which awaits him in the Transkei and in South Africa as a whole.

King George's Message To Greek Nation

The King has sent the following message to "the Greek nation and my cousin, George, King of the Hellenes."

"In this hour of Greece's need I wish to say this: We are with you in this struggle. Your cause is our cause, and we will be fighting against a common foe."

"There are, doubtless, hard trials to be borne, but we shall both meet them in the firm faith that ultimate victory is assured by the ever-increasing strength of free peoples."

"We may hope, indeed, that we are already near the turn of

the tide, when the power of the aggressor will begin to ebb and our own growing might will begin to prevail."

"Long live Greece and her leaders. Long live the King of the Hellenes."



BRITAIN THANKS BASUTOLAND

The message sent to the Resident Commissioner of Basutoland by Lord Cranbourne, Secretary of State for the Dominions, conveying the thanks of the British Government to the people of Basutoland for the gift of £100,000 to purchase Spitfires, has undoubtedly sent a thrill of hope throughout Bantustan. It has strengthened the ties that have existed between Basutoland and Great Britain since the days of Moshoeshoe, and it has undoubtedly impressed the Basuto nation with the fact that its friendship with Great Britain has not in any way weakened with the passage of time.

"Such a gift," says Lord Cranbourne, "is an inspiration to us all and a further proof, if such were needed, of the unshakable strength of the foundation of the loyalty and devotion on which the structure of our great Empire is raised. Basutoland brings new weapons to our hands, weapons the weight of which the enemy has felt and learnt to fear."

These are inspiring words and come from the heart of a man who realises that if the people of Basutoland and their rulers were not satisfied with the protection which Britain gives them, they would not have been so eager to stand or fall with the Empire. They have filled the hearts of the Basuto people with joy and hope, because coming, as they do, from a man in a responsible position, they express the gratitude of the British people in their hour of trial to a people who owe to them the protection of their country and their guidance and assistance along the path of human progress. The loyalty and devotion of the Basuto nation to the British Crown has never been questionable since its fonder placed it under the protection of Great Britain. The reason for this is not far to seek. Under the protecting wing of the British people, the Basuto nation has been enabled to maintain its integrity and its independent life; it has been assisted to maintain its soul and hold its head above the overwhelming waters of the sea of European civilisation.

For these reasons the Basuto are determined as other members of the Commonwealth to defend the principles upon which the structure of this vast Empire is founded. They know that within the Commonwealth there is room for the growth and advancement of all its members, and they are fully aware that the destruction of the Empire by its enemies will mean the end of the existence of Basutoland as their country and also the end of their peaceful development as a nation. In this struggle, therefore, they feel that they are as concerned with the future of the Empire as the British people themselves and that it is their bounden duty to lay down their lives, if need be, for its safety and security.

Although at present they have not been called upon to defend the Empire with their lives, and may, for that reason, have been disappointed, nevertheless they have been comforted by Lord Cranbourne's declaration that "a special squadron of Spitfire aircraft will be formed with the name Basutoland." This recognition of Basutoland's place in this struggle is undoubtedly a harbinger of the great things that the country will share with the rest of the Commonwealth when final victory is achieved with the help of the 20 machines comprising the Basutoland Squadron."

Every black African in South Africa feels proud of the part which is being played by Basutoland in this war, and of Great Britain's recognition of these efforts. There can be no doubt that white South Africa is also deeply impressed. Slowly but surely Europeans in this country are beginning to realise that as a people we are not a menace but an asset to their security. In these critical times, when the Commonwealth stands alone to defend the principles of liberty and justice, Africans are proving that they can be trusted. They are standing as one man against the onslaught of Nazi propaganda, and we have no doubt that those who are endeavouring to mislead them will be disappointed in the end. The Africans are firmly convinced that within Nazidom there is no place for them except that of servitude, and that their only way of escape from the clutches of Nazi and Fascist tyranny is through British victory. They are confident that their position will be improved after the war. They know they will share with other members of the Commonwealth the fruits of victory, and for this reason they are prepared to share in the sufferings entailed by the war. If called upon to defend this country, they will come forward like men and, side by side with the other soldiers of the Commonwealth, will fight the common foe until the forces of righteousness and justice prevail against those of might.

To-day they show their readiness and willingness to shed their blood, if need be, in defence of the higher ideals of life, by contributing out of their meagre earnings to the various war funds and by enlisting in the various non-combatant units.

AMERICAN ANGER AGAINST DICTATORS

Mr. Roosevelt received one of the most tumultuous welcomes of his career from immense crowds during a political tour of New York City.

It is pointed out in Washington, says the correspondent of the Daily Express, that the Balkans may have a most important effect on American voters. Mr. Roosevelt's popularity has soared in direct ratio to the American people's wrath over each new Axis aggression.

It still looks like Roosevelt victory to the experts, and the President is known to be confident of victory, says the correspondent of the London Daily Mail in New York, but at least Mr. Wilkie has made a fight which is assured of a sensational finish. Although he lowered the odds on Mr. Roosevelt he ranks as an amateur compared with him. His campaign has demonstrated this. Politically he is naive, and from the viewpoint of statesmanship he is a toddler.

RIGHTS OF SMALL NATIONS

"One of the keynotes of United States policy is the recognition of the rights of small nations to survive and prosper," declared President Roosevelt in a speech on Monday night at a Democratic Party rally in Madison Square.

He called for support for the realistic fight for peace. "The alternative is to risk the future of the country in the hands of those with a record for timidity, weakness and shortsightedness. We guard against the forces of anti-Christ aggression, which may attack us from without by force."

President Roosevelt devoted most of his speech to domestic politics, attacking his Republican opponents for their alleged equivocal attitude as regards help for Britain and "falsification" regarding United States relations with the rest of the world, and the building up of the defence forces.

"Our Navy," said Mr. Roosevelt, "is at the peak of efficiency and fighting strength. Man for man and ship for ship it is as powerful and efficient as any that ever sailed the seas. Our Army and Air Force are now at the highest level they have ever been in peace-time, but in the light of existing dangers they are not great enough for the absolute safety of America."

DEADLY BOMBING

Regarding the British bombing attacks, the industrialist said that the accuracy with which the British bombs were aimed was very great.

According to reliable information he said, the Leuna synthetic petrol works had been very severely damaged.

Germany still appeared to be well supplied with petrol, but there was a shortage of Diesel oil, lubricating oil and greases.

The part the Italians have played in the war had caused general dissatisfaction in Berlin.

The German General Staff could not make out whether the Italians were not doing better because they could not or because they lacked the will to fight.

BEHIND THE HEADLINES

(BY SCRUTATOR)

Although the Germans are still bombing British cities, including London, and the Royal Air Force is still pounding Berlin and other German cities, the attention of the world at the moment is drawn to the political and diplomatic moves which Hitler and Mussolini are making in South-eastern and Western Europe.

His plans for the invasion of Britain having been frustrated at least for the time being, and being confronted by the prospect of a long war and the possibility of an American intervention, Hitler is trotting all over Europe looking for help. Last week he met M. Laval, the French Vice-Premier and urged him to persuade the Vichy Government to hand over the French fleet, Air Force and naval and air bases on the south of France. At first these proposals were rejected by Marshal Petain. Towards the end of the week Marshal Petain met Hitler and it is understood that he yielded to Hitler's demands which, according to a message from Berne (Switzerland) include (1) the cession of Alsace-Lorraine to Germany, (2) the cession of the Riveira as far as Nice to Italy, and (3) the co-operation of French armies in Syria and North Africa with the Italians against the British in North Africa.

PETAIN BETRAYS FRANCE

Although it is not yet known whether or not Marshal Petain has agreed to the use of the French fleet and Air Force by Germans, it is nevertheless plain that Hitler has succeeded in bringing France within the pale of the Axis Powers. Hitler also met General Franco, Chief of the Spanish State. The outcome of this meeting is not yet known, but Hitler is expected to make a statement in the Reichstag very soon.

FRENCH COUNCIL OF DEFENCE

Meanwhile General de Gaulle, who is rallying all free Frenchmen to the Allied cause, has formed a Council for the Defence of the French Empire. He is in West Africa at present where he has secured the support of most of the French colonies. His movement is gaining ground, and the betrayal of France by Laval and Marshal Petain will undoubtedly have the effect of strengthening General de Gaulle's movement. After the announcement of the Hitler-Petain accord, General de Gaulle's headquarters in London issued a statement and said: "We regard any association between France and the mortal enemy as sacrilege. We hold null and void any carving up of the land which is our national heritage."

EMPIRE CONFERENCE

While Hitler is running all over Europe looking for supporters, because he has now found it difficult if not impossible, to bring Britain to her knees, a historic conference of the Empire has been held in New Delhi (India) to devise ways and means of defending the Empire's vital points.

Speaking of this conference, Mr. L. S. Amery, Secretary of State for India, stated that "the battle for Britain may not be over, but its issue, I believe, has already been decided. The battle of the Empire comes next... Where and how the attempt is to be made, we cannot yet judge, but it is up to us to beat it off as we beat off the attempt on this island."

It would, however, be wishful thinking to conclude that Stalin has any intention of throwing in his lot with the democracies.

It is one thing to realise, it is quite another to reply to, any menace. Germany has powerful forces, amounting, it is said to 60 divisions, on the Eastern Front, and she is appearing in strength not only in the Balkans in the south but also in the north, including even Finland.

RUSSO-JAPANESE PACT?

Japan, Russia's dreaded foe in the Far East, is now an ally of Germany, but Japan is now turning her eyes southwards towards Indo-China and the Dutch East Indies, and it is more than possible that Stalin, with his eyes on the Straits, and Japan, looking southwards, may reach some understanding and might even go so far as a pact of non-aggression of a very innocuous character."

GERMAN MORALE WEAKENING

Striking revelations of how the morale of the German people has been lowered by the British bombing of Berlin and other places in Germany until to-day the admission is made that the odds are against a German victory are made by a Bulgarian industrialist who has just left Berlin after a stay of several months.

The morale of the German people has been falling rapidly during the last month, according to a leading Bulgarian industrialist who has just left Germany after several months stay in Berlin, where he had the opportunity to mix with some of the most responsible circles.

He stated that early in July the Germans were in a state of complete exaltation and a new division of world interests was being discussed everywhere.

Even ordinary folk like chauffeurs, he said, were busy choosing what part of the world in which they would settle after the war.

But during the next ten weeks this elevation was superseded by despondency. The first reason was that the three advertised invasion dates in July, August and September had failed to materialise.

BELITTLED OF THE BANTU

BY CHEAP PSEUDONYMS

Sir,
The time is ripe when some of the old habits such as calling any Bantu person "Jim, Anny, Boy or Kafir" had died out. These names are some of the relics of the cynical consideration Europeans had when they first came into this land, some of whom defined a native of South Africa as a "fearful giant as of fairy tales."

In trains, in workshops and hotels these pseudo-names are commonly used. Apparently, the kind of people who use them are those who side with the white man who scolded his kitchen boy for using an handkerchief for cleaning his nose despite that this is a decent and hygienic habit.

Whatever the pleasure is to those who call Natives thus it is not for the Bantu to tolerate, nor to labour its meaning, for any respectable European hardly uses such offending names. It is evident that these people are representatives of those homes where the Bantu are commonly called Jim etc in front of the children. Shutting the gate behind him a Bantu hears numerous "hey Jim!" from the children in the yard. But can Bantu respect be questioned?

His respect is as deep as that of some of the philosophers of old one of whom always took off his hat when meeting even little children "for", he said, "one of them will be my Governor or Secretary of State"; another spoke to birds and gave them food until they came down to him very often when hungry. A big Bantu girl or boy, undoubtedly having out-grown the stage of nursing babies at her own home, politely accepts the cradle and carries the baby on her back or pushes it in its cart in public. All this is done with all the dignity and pride in her work. Other non-Europeans avoid it, but their number is encouragingly small. Still some Europeans will go out of their way and scold a Bantu person with an "Hey Jim, d— fool" when finding him or her in a passenger train second class corridor on account of no space in third class inside and in the corridors. But does the Bantu, even if angry, use an insinuating name for a white man?

The force of his anger only causes him to resort to his own way of showing rage. Instead he uses a diminutive. This is a common feature in Bantu languages. Any person or thing going out of the general behaviour of society is called by his national name in the diminutive. So a Boer or Briton becomes "Ibunyana" or "Umlungwana" to prove that the wrong done does not only belittle him but his nationality as well, and not all the other members of his race will be called in this manner. That all the Bantu should be called Jim etc. as on "April fool" when even clever people are labelled behind with "Kick me, I am a fool" any person white or black fails to understand.

No ancestors of any Bantu ever went by these names, nor were there any such as pet names in Bantu life. Reason and common sense shall have fled to animals then if such nonsensical "Jims etc" will be dear to them. These "nonsensicals" do not only offend but merit "blue eyeing" to them who say them. They do not only lower the dignity of their respectable white neighbours but the much vaunted Western Civilisation for which the Bantu respect the Europeans. Could it be that one of the best qualities of yore is to respect at all costs, all colours, all treatments with hearty smiles?



REMOVE RUST FROM TABLE-CLOTHS

Make a solution of 1 dessertspoon of salts of lemon and 1 pint of hot water, soak the stains in this. Allow enough time for the chemicals to act on the stains then wash in the ordinary way, rinsing well. Stains from iron mould can be removed from woollen or silk articles by covering the stain with equal parts of cream of tartar and citric acid, and moistening it with hot water, leaving it until the chemical has had time to remove the stain. When the stain has disappeared, wash and rinse as usual.

A SUBSTITUTE FOR EGGS

JAM IN COOKERY

A good way of making jam goes twice as far when using it for cooking is to mix together a tablespoonful of ground rice, half a tablespoonful of vinegar, and a tiny pinch of salt, and add them to two tablespoonsfuls of any kind of jam. SHINE ON MEN'S SUITS

This is quite a good method, though it is more or less temporary. Put a tablespoon of strong ammonia and 1 teaspoon of alum into a basin, add 1 pint of hot water. Stir until well mixed. With a stiff bristled brush, brush it well into the shiny parts, being careful not to saturate the material with too much of the water. Take a piece of muslin and wring out in the alum and ammonia water, spread over the garment and iron slowly and lightly with a hot iron.

Certain firms of cleaners undertake to restore the surface of cloth that has become shiny.

WAYS TO KEEP MILK FRESH

During hot, thundery weather milk easily turns sour and the greatest precautions are necessary to keep it fresh and sweet. With milk delivered only once a day, one often takes more than is wanted during the twenty-four hours, but if the milk is boiled as soon as it arrives, and then poured into a sterilised jug and covered, then placed in the refrigerator or in a cold spot in the larder, it should be quite good the next day.

Never leave milk standing in an uncovered jug or basin in a hot kitchen, even for a few minutes. Warmth in a room, dust, dirt and flies cause milk to turn sour even more quickly than a sultry atmosphere or "thunder in the air."

When dealing with any utensil which is used for milk, ordinary washing-up is not enough. First rinse the basin or jug in cold water, then pour boiling water into it to the brim. Empty the water away, but do not dry the basin. Leave it instead in a cool place, upside down, to drain ready for use.

To keep milk cool if you have no refrigerator, let the cold water tap run until a large basin is filled. Stand the milk jugs in this and cover them with a piece of double muslin long enough for the end to dip into the water. The muslin will be kept moist all day and the milk cool and free from dust and flies. Stand the basin in a draught and preferably on a stone slab in the larder.

If milk does turn sour, in spite of precautions, do not throw it away. No sour milk need be wasted, for it makes deliciously light scones and cakes.





ADAMS COLLEGE NEWS

The old Students of Adams College were among the invitees to the ceremony of the opening of the school of music by the Rt Hon. F. S. Malan, President of the Senate.

This is the first Native school of music to be attached to a Native educational centre in South Africa.

The building was erected at a very low cost by African students in the Industrial department under the supervision of the architect Dr. K. R. Brueckner. There was a large gathering of Bantu and European friends, many prominent personalities having made the trip from Durban for the occasion.

The audience sat on benches in a natural amphitheatre before a stage incorporated in the structure of the new building.

Senator Malan congratulated the College on having a school of music. He had been struck by the magnificence of the building and the efficient way in which it had been done.

He briefly traced the history of the Institution which was the product of the generosity and foresight of Christian Americans more than a hundred years ago. He then referred to Rev. Lindley who started a Mission at Inanda and to Dr. Adams after whom the College had been named.

Senator Malan spoke with admiration of his visit to the United States where he visited Negro Colleges Tuskegee and Hampton and the Nash University.

He had the pleasure of seeing Mr. R. T. Caluza the time he was a student at Hampton Institution.

Speaking of the Bantu, Senator Malan pointed out that one could sing only if one were happy, and if one wanted the Bantu to be good singers they must be made happy.

Song was also an expression of harmony and music could teach South Africans to work together in harmony.

There are Bantu, Coloured and Indian sections of the community. They are all Union Nationals and live under God's sun, Mr. Malan continued, "Unless these elements developed the faculty of working together harmoniously, the future of this country is not a bright one."

He believed by studying the principles of harmony it would be possible to overcome the difficulties ahead and work together for the common good of the country.

Mr. Maurice Webb thanked the donors who had made possible the new building. Among them were Dr. Richard from the U.S.A. (to whom a song had been dedicated), Dr. Townley Williams and his family, the Natal Coal Owners Association and the Bantu Welfare Trust. Dr. Brookes also announced a generous gesture by the Native Affairs Department of £1000 extended to the College for improving sanitary conditions and better hospital facilities at Jubilee.

The well-trained choir of Adams College consisted of over 70 voices. It gave a varied programme of Anthems by classical composers, solos, Indigenous Zulu songs and dances as well as part songs.

Throughout these choral items the choir responded with precision to the able leadership of Mr. R. T. Caluza.

Other items which thrilled the audience much were a bottle solo by Todd Matshikiza and a solo "Ol' Man River" by Fortune Kune.

In the evening visitors and students were entertained with a boscop.

We ex-students of Adams College are always filled with courage and joy when we see our College developing year after year a sign of the activity of the authorities of the school. "Arise and shine, Adams."

Coming Natal Tennis Events December 1940

The winners of these three Trophies last year were:— Durban and District Bantu Lawn Tennis Association for the Intertown Trophy, Mr. A. M. Xaba, of Dundee, for the Men's Singles Trophy, and Mrs M. S. Phashe of Durban for the Women's Singles Trophy.
