DEATH OF AFRICAN HERO: JOB MASEKO

The tragic death is reported of an African ex-serviceman, Job Maseko recently killed in an accident in a railway goods yard at Springs.

Maseko, who served with the Native Military Corps in the last war, was awarded a Military Medal for performing the greatest individual act of sabotage against the enemy in South African war records.

Captured by the Germans on June 21, 1941, he decided to do sabotage work because of ill-treatment of his fellows by the enemy, especially the Italians. In July 1941, Job successfully sank a German ship at Tobruk Harbour. Joining pieces of fuse to a length of about twelve yards, he found an empty milk tin into which he poured cordite collected from cartridges lying about. At first he thought of blowing up an ammunition dump, but found that they were small and scattered.

Next, he thought of destroying supply dumps, but decided that his fellows and himself would go short of food.

"It was when I was sent to work at the docks that I thought of the idea of burning a boat," Job said on release. He then told a comrade to engage a German guard in conversation; while this was being done, Job placed the home-made bomb among a number of large petrol drums, covered it with straw and poured petrol on the straw.

While in the hold, he led the fuse from the tin along the ribs of the boat which contained food-stuffs and tins of petrol. Then he put a match to the fuse while at the same time closing the hatch.

Back at camp in the evening, Job was sitting outside his tent overlooking the harbour; he saw smoke issuing from the ship, then a succession of explosions—and later a flame.

Next morning, the ship had disappeared; drums and planks were floating on the water. Later, Job and a friend, Samuel Masiya, escaped from Tobruk and walked twenty-three days through the desert. They were picked up by an officer of a South African armoured car near El Alamein on November 16, 1942.

Several had gone to their homes for a 7-day recuperative leave before resuming duties.

Moleko and Shongwe to see Priscilla Twisha; Mr. Nkomo to see Dorothy Didi Ntintill; Mr. A. Moroilo to see Bertha Moroilo; Mr. P. J. Ncaca of Pretoria to see Daisy Twala; Mr. Twala accompanied Mrs. Ncaca; Victoria Kekanana was visited by Messrs. Mokuena and Shongwe. Many other visitors and sympathisers from centres throughout the Union called, and sent messages.

At the outbreak of the illness of the nurses, the following nurses from local clinics volunteered to help at the hospital. Mrs. Fanelo, Mrs. Khona, Mrs. Kwakwa, Miss D. Monamela.

The staff of the Donagall Social Club represented by Mr. R. Chanike called officially to express sympathy to the nurses, as well as Messrs. E. Ncaca and Moane who are social workers. Through this column the nurses requested that a word of thanks should be conveyed to all who sympathised them in their plight and especially The Bantu World for the efforts it made to notify friends and relatives of the names of those who were affected.

It is understood that a commission of enquiry was appointed to investigate the incident, and that its findings are expected to be made to the hospital during this week.

This Old Zulu lady Has 32 Great Grand-children

One hundred and two years ago, Mrs. Ester Mandulo Mbete was born in the Nqutu district, Natal. This centenarian recalls vividly historical events such as the Langatibalele Rebellion of 1873; the faction fight between Gatsiwayo and his brother Mbu-yazi over chieftainship, and the Battle of Isandhlwana in 1879.

Of Chief Mpande she recalls his words: "happy is the person who witnesses a big battle."

Born Kumalo in 1850, Mrs. Mbete has six children, four of whom are alive. She has also, thirty grandchildren and thirty-two great-grandchildren.

After her husband's death in 1926, she came to live with her son in 1929, at Western Native Township, Johannesburg. Her eyesight is still fairly good and though her sense of hearing is slightly impaired she is able to hear only if the voice is slightly raised.

DEATH OF GREAT A.M.E. CHURCH BUILDER

Rev. J. D. T. Ndimande, Presiding Elder of the Witbank A.M.E. Church district, died last Sunday night at the age of 68. Born in Lourenco Marques, he joined the ministry of the church in 1921 after serving 20 years under Rev. Mabodde. He was ordained deacon in 1923 and elevated an elder later.

At Alberton he left the present A.M.E. Church building his memory and, at Witbank where he has been since 1935, he has built the present beautiful church and parsonage.

Regarded as the greatest church builder of the present age, he is predeceased by his first wife and is survived by his second. Also surviving him are a son who graduated B.Sc. and is a Natal school teacher; two daughters — both married to clergymen.

At the time of going to press it was understood that the funeral would take place this week on Thursday.

Cost Of Living Allowances

New cost-of-living allowance scales calculated by the Treasury come into effect this month. They apply to civil servants, and are used as a basis by many private employers.

The scales vary from an increase of £4.16s.0d. a year for non-European married government servants earning up to £6 a year, to an increase of £160 a year, for those earning over £150 to £200 a year. Over £200 a year the scale is on the same basis as that for Europeans, that is, £3 a month more.

Protests & Prayers

The protest meetings on April 6 have proved beyond doubt that the African National Congress has become an international organisation dominated by men of the Karl Marx school of thought...

It will be the workers who will decide how the individual must live, how he must think, eat, drink, dress, walk and play. It is as plain as A.B.C. that to replace the "dictatorship" of the capitalist class by that of the working class will not solve the problems of mankind and will not bring peace to this unhappy world.

The African people should not allow themselves to be misled by demagogues who are used as cats' paws by non-Africans who have their own axes to grind. It is significant that at the protest meetings none of our well known leaders is reported to have made a speech. The Johannesburg meeting was presided over by Dr. Y. M. Dadoo, and yet, as far as we know, the chairman of the Planning Council is Dr. J. S. Moroka.

To us this is not surprising. We have on more than one occasion stated that Congress was now under the control and direction of Indian leaders, and these demonstrations have abundantly proved us to have been right. What we want the African people to know and understand is that Indians are afraid of African nationalism as they are of the Group Areas Act. This fear is understandable. The Indian people are wholly dependent on trade for their livelihood.

The fact that Indians are non-Europeans does not mean that they do not despise and exploit Africans. This is what a national-minded African in East Africa has to say about them: "I resent the entrenched economic position of the Indians, who give good jobs only to their own people, squeezing Africans off the middle rung of the ladder."

It is also significant that in Cape Town the protest meeting was addressed by Europeans, one of whom said that "thousands of White people would sympathise with the coming struggle against apartheid and as the movement grew in strength many would rally to it."

What is interesting is that Communist group was victorious in its condemnation of the "Forward Bloc," just as members of the former and also now defunct Communist Party are vociferous in condemning the Congress national bloc.

Whether it is the fault of the Joint-Planning Council or not we cannot say, but it is strange that while meetings of protests were held in four big cities, religious and Kimberley. And Port Elizabeth no mention of prayers for freedom in the "ultimatum" which Dr. Moroka sent to Dr. D. F. Malan.

"If Van Riebeeck had not landed at the Cape, Africa would still belong to the Africans. But because he landed, we have become landless and homeless in the land of our birth."

"That is nothing," replied his friend. "I certainly prefer groping in the darkness of oppression which has its origin in the landing of Van Riebeeck at the Cape in 1652. I prefer the freedom our ancestors enjoyed to the economic slavery which has destroyed our tribal and family life."

"I understand your feelings which are the fruits of frustration and despair, but I fail to understand your reasoning," declared his companion. "You seem to think that before the landing of Van Riebeeck Africans enjoyed freedom. I agree, but not the right kind of freedom. No doubt they had the freedom to fight among themselves and kill one another but not the freedom to think of the things that really matter in human life."

"Why is it, I want to know, that in spite of all this, Africans in those days did not feel that they were oppressed by these forces, instead they filled the air of this country with laughter and song? If I were allowed to answer this question, I would say this was due to the fact that 'ignorance is bliss.'"

Readers Forum

The political feud between the African National Congress and the Congress National bloc has confused many followers of the movement. It is common knowledge that Congress is a liberation movement, and not a political party. That being so, Congress is a haven of people of all shades of political opinion—it is a political playground.

It would be ironical if Congress leaders who hold diametrically opposite political views to those of the national bloc, to regard the latter group as 'responsible. Taking India as a state which has recently attained sovereignty, through great personal sacrifices by its leaders, and tolerance on their part during the struggle against foreign domination, the Indian Congress played a worthy role in the liberation of India.

The Indian Congress was quite similar to our African National Congress; it embraced Communists, Fascists, Socialists, Capitalists and Reactionaries, all striving for one common goal—liberation.

What is interesting is that Communist group was victorious in its condemnation of the "Forward Bloc," just as members of the former and also now defunct Communist Party are vociferous in condemning the Congress national bloc.

Perhaps the old Communist technique that "whoever is not with us is our enemy" still stands good. I believe that the struggle for African liberation is not a class struggle—that is, the struggle between the working class against the employer class; it is a struggle for black supremacy in Africa, wherein the black man is sovereign.

In other words, it is not a struggle for a living space under the African sun, but a struggle for the African sun itself. —S. Reg. Mpela, Jafavu Township, Johannesburg.

Ever since Herr Hitler coined the dictum "the bigger the lie the more believable," his conscious or unconscious disciples throughout the world have followed the example of Goebbels. South Africa is no exception to the rule as can be judged from the report which appeared in the Bantu World of March 8, 1952.

In a letter published in this newspaper under my name on February 9, I referred to a church service I attended, and at which a number of children were being baptised. I said that most of these children were given European names only.

Mr. S. Modisane accuses me of criticising the church for this. My letter was not directed against customs and practices followed by our many churches, all it did was to point to what I considered wrong in giving African children European names at baptism. I do not dispute the fact that when a child is named "John" he is named after a great man, but Europeans have cheapened that name by calling every African whose name they do not know "John."

Why do Europeans not christen their children "Chaka," "Lobengula," "Cetshwayo" or any other name of a great African?—Leppile, Taunyane, Kalkbank.

I think we ought to make less use of the name "Bantu" in reference to ourselves so that in the long run that name should die away.

Admittedly we cannot call this newspaper "The African World" since there already exists another paper by that name in the country.

We should not fall into the same pit "Bantu" for Africans; "Bantu" means "the people." —Anthony, St. James.

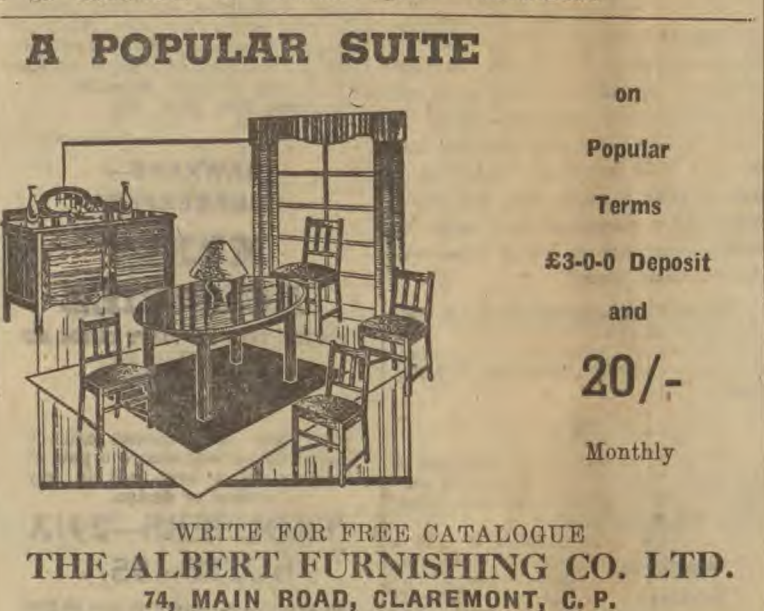

Cricket Controversy

In the semi-finals of the Reserve League, West Rand C.C. played against Village Main C.C. at the former's ground on a one day match, and scores for the day were W.R.C.C. 144 all out; Village Main C.C. 128 for 9 wickets.

The West Rand captain alleges that he received a letter from the secretary of the Transvaal C. Union to the effect that the match should be played to a finish in the following week, and when this was done Village Main could only add 5 runs to their previous week's score, and were all out for 133, and thus left West Rand winners by 11 runs.

The point now at issue is that West Rand C.C. was not invited to play in the finals against Orlando Brotherly C.C. Village Main being invited instead. The West Rand team fails to understand how this happened as it maintains that it had won. The T.B.C.U. secretary has given no hint as to the present crisis, the captain alleges. P. S. A. Gwele a senior official of the Union, was unable to throw any light on the situation but said that the matter would be discussed by the Board as soon as it is brought officially to his notice.

"I think that the standard of our cricket has reached its highest peak, and I hope that we can stand against the best overseas team, a thing which will help to raise African cricket. One falling factor amongst Non-European is their failure to run sports on proper lines, and the decision arrived at by the officials in curtailing our privileges is worthy of note," said Mr. Richard Poswayo in an interview with me.—by Veritas

Comment On Mr. Neill's Boxing Ratings

In his Non-European Boxing Ratings and Review up to and including February 15, 1952 Leonard Neill, boxing journalist of Durban, writes: "Doubtless there will be some fighters well rated who will be unknown to some boxing fraternity. An example is Johannes Mahlangu, alias the Congo Kid, who heads the list of the lightweight contenders. This smooth-moving African, gave champion Homicide Hank a beating in Germiston, on February 8 last year," in the words of a prominent Rand European manager: "Mahlangu looked more the champion than the champion himself." According to this manager "Mahlangu was head and shoulders over Hank, and deserved a chance at the title."

Mr. Neill rates Mahlangu as No. 1 contender for Homicide Hank's title, and he rates the other contenders in Class A, B and C. In the welterweight division, Leslie Mokekzie is rated No. 1 contender for Simon Greb Minkulu's welterweight crown. Mr. Neill has hardly slipped here because Lesane Lithabe has beaten Leslie Mokekzie, and so should be rated under Lithabe, in class A he rates Phillip Agulhas No. 1, with Cuban Hawk No. 2 and Wally Thompson No. 3.

Here again in the middleweight division, Mr. Neill wrongly rates Andrew Jellars No. 1 and Enoch Gumede of Durban, No. 2. These two boxers have not been very active for a long time, and are not worthy to be rated in the above manner. Gumede is not likely to fight again following his fractured skull after an assault. Therefore, contenders for Jolting Joe's title, are as follows: Simon "Greb" Minkulu, Windy Mize and Sam Sankey, etc.

Reviewing the heavy-weight division, Mr. Neill goes on to say that this division remains dormant. Recently in Johannesburg, King Kong beat John Sullivan (by no stretch of imagination like his famous American namesake) for the Transvaal title.

"Kong also rules over a poor light-heavy weight division, and it would be an advantage of the boxing sport if the boards of control recognised a national title fight between Leonard Makoko and King Kong, a newcomer is the burly Natalian Zakariyah Mkhwanazi who, with his forceful style of attack.

In his opening remarks, the vice-chairman told the gathering that the people had to voice their protest with the rest of the non-European people of the Union, and after addressing a word of welcome to the Indian people present.

Dr. A. E. Lettele exhorted the people to be willing to make sacrifices in the interests of the national struggle, and informed the meeting that the gathering was being held in response to a call by the African National Congress, supported by the South African Indian Congress.

Mr. O. R. Tambo opened his stirring address by recalling that the liberation of the oppressed peoples was part of the history of mankind. He quoted the emancipation of slaves in the 19th Century, the liberation of India, and of Africans in Nigeria and the Gold Coast; and declared that the non-European oppressed masses were on the march to the same destination which our present-day rulers had reached in May, 1948. He fore-saw the emergence of a black Prime Minister within the not too distant future. This, he said, would eventually come some day, whether the oppressors liked it or not.—"Correspondent."

TEACHERS' COLUMN

Prompted by an article which appeared in these columns on the need for reconciliation in the present dispute among Transvaal teachers, of Mr. M. T. D. Leboho of Nootgedacht Tribal School, Rustenburg district writes to me. Mr. Leboho agrees with the writer of the first article which appeared on March 29, 1952; he himself now elaborates on that article and places before the teachers a scheme by which reconciliation could be approached.

Mr. Leboho's article runs:

I am in full support of Mr. "X" views but would like to ask a few questions:

(i) To what degree should this unity be extended?

(ii) Is there already a mediator for the "truth talks"?

(iii) How many teachers are T.A.T.A., T.A.T.U. members, and how many are passive and neutral?

I am not criticising anyone, but if you want to inoculate cattle, you want to know how many there are. It does appear that news has been sent to the Press about unification, and about conferences to be held in Pretoria; nobody knows about those conferences or their convener. If anyone wants his mandate, he should go to the country—i.e. the teachers.

I would suggest that an independent person (mediator) be appointed. He should write to the general secretary of the T.A.T.U. the general secretary of the T.A.T.A., and their respective district secretaries. The general secretary of the T.A.T.U. lives at Salspoort, Rustenburg. The general secretary of the T.A.T.A. resides in Johannesburg. The addresses of the district secretary are known. These will form the executive which will go back to the branches and report these talks.

Two months later, the "independent mediator," should summon a meeting or conference of all African teachers in the Transvaal, through the Press, and also through district secretaries. The conference should be summoned at a place where neither the chairman nor the secretary of either of the two parties live.

I am of opinion that the split was done purposely; many teachers were present, they know who is at fault. They should have told that person to go out while conference carried out its business. Moreover, if we are all interested in our affairs, we should just come together and correct the wrong without law suits.

Today you find many teachers are suspended; many circulars have been issued without consulting or asking the teachers to comment; many teachers have not received their cheques upto today. Then we have the age limit, classification of schools, and the new salary scales to consider. Are we as teachers, content with the meagre salaries that we do not even worry about other teachers' troubles? This observation has been made with branch meetings where only ten attend a branch meeting out of a total of 40.

All district conferences are today as large as our old branch meetings. Ask the veterans in your district: "Do teachers like music?" I would say, "yes," but before you correct the Pietersburg mistakes, music will leave them as blank as they were.

A conference summoned must represent all parties. I am not saying the views of the Party I follow, but my own views.

Around The Courts

An African appeared before a magistrate charged with assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm. The complainant was the wife of the accused who alleged that he had hit her with a stick and a drum. The accused pleaded not guilty.

The complainant said she resides at Orlando. On the date in question she had an argument with the accused over a drum which the accused sold to a neighbour without her consent and knowledge. The drum which belonged to her was sold in her absence and when she came home she took it back. The neighbours thereupon demanded their money back.

The accused came to her in an aggressive mood, armed with two sticks, and struck her five blows on the head. She caught hold of the first stick and he took another and struck her over the head, shoulders and arms. She received no open wounds but bruises. She said that she received a cut on the forehead caused by the drum which he threw at her. He also put his two hands into her mouth causing injuries.

She said that she was taken to hospital and her wounds were treated but she was not detained. She gave no provocation to the accused to warrant the assault.

Further she said that the accused no longer lived with her.

Cross-examined by the accused the woman said that she was quite sure that accused assaulted her with two sticks. It was not true that she fell on the drum and injured herself. She also said it was not true that she and her daughter tore his trousers. The trousers was torn on a previous occasion when accused threatened to stab her with a knife, and her daughter intervened and the trousers were torn in the scuffle. Replying to a question, she said they had been married since 1916.

The accused denied that he hit her with sticks and a drum. On the contrary, he said that complainant and her daughter assaulted him. His daughter insulted him, he continued. He gave her a smack on the face with his open hand. Both daughter and mother then began to assault him and he screamed for help. Two neighbours came to his assistance.

The magistrate in passing sentence said that the accused and the complainant had been living for 35 years as man and wife. They had now quarrelled over a little drum. The magistrate said he believed the complainant's story, and found the accused guilty of common assault. He would give a suspended sentence, but warned him to live peacefully with his wife.

The accused was fined £5 or one month imprisonment, suspended for one year provided that during that period he does not appear charged with a similar offence. The magistrate also admonished the complainant not to provoke her husband. He ordered them to go home and live together amicably.—S. D. Matshikiza.

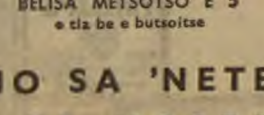

The South African version is recorded by Decca.

The following letter has been sent to me by "Music Lover" of Johannesburg in connection with the show which was given by the Gay Gaieties at the B.M.S.C. on Friday April 4: "There has been great interest in seeing the famous Gay Gaieties Troupe at the B.M.S.C., Johannesburg on April 4 staging their so called show "Night to remember." More than 200 people including Coronation and Baragwanath Hospitals nurses who attended the show but to our surprise the concert was very poor. The reason is that the troupe leader was shy even to appear full on the stage. We could only see his head when he announced the next item until a one leg man jumped on the stage and rendered two hits and then we all started to jump from our chairs.
