

Slaughter Of Cattle In Natal

Boodskap Van Mn. H.A. Fagan

"Die volgende Boodskap van Mn. H.A. Fagan Minister van Natuurlesake word deurgestuur vir publikasie deur Bantoe Pers. Met my diensaanyaarding as Minister van Natuurlesake voel ek dat ek graag my groete wil stuur aan almal wat nou onder my sorg geplaas word. Ek weet in welke mate my voorganger, Mr Grobler, julle hoogagt en toegeneentheid geniet het en dit sal altyd my ernstige strewe wees om 'n mate van dieselfde gevoel waarnee julle hon bejeen vir myself te verwerf. My naam mag aan vele van julle onbekend wees maar ek kan julle verseker dat ek nog nooit die ingewikkeldheid en belangrikheid van die probleme verbonde aan naturellesadministrasie uit die oog verloor het nie en die studie van besonderhede wat ek sedert my diensaanyaarding gemaak het het my weereens oortuig hoe belangrik hierdie afdeling van die regering van die land is en watter verantwoordelikhede meegaan met die taak waartoe ek geroep is. Sonder julle samewerking en goedgesindheid sou hierdie taak vir my onmoontlik wees en terwyl ek julle verseker dat ek altyd besiel sal wees met die begeerte om julle welsyn na die beste van my vermoeie te bevorder hoop ek dat ek met sekerheid op julle bystand en ondersteuning kan vertrou.

Ek het ontdek dat die bedoeling van baie naturelleangeleenthede misverstaan of verkeerd geïnterpreteer word. Mag ek iets se in verband met een van hierdie aangeleenthede wat op die oomblik taamlik op die voorgrond van julle gedagtes is. Julie is bewus daarvan dat daar op 12 deser 'n census van alle naturelle wat in die stedelike gebiede van die Unie woon gehou gaan word. Die doel van die census is om die plaaslike besture stadsrade dorpsrade en dorpsbestuursrade instaan te stel om die arbeidsvoorraad by die aanvraag aan te pas. As daar teveel mense is om al die werk te doen dan sal die lone daal en diegene wat geen werk kan kry nie sal sonder kos moet bly of dit op misdagige wyse moet probeer verkyk. Dit is om so' toestand van sake te voorkom en om werkloosheid en die dryfveer tot misdagheid te verminder dat ons grootig is om juiste inligting aangaande die aantal naturelle in die stede en die hoeveelheid werk wat vir hulle beskikbaar is in te win. Dit is natuurlik waar dat sekere verantwoordelikhede van die dorpe verlig sal word deurdat hulle ontlae raak van die surplus bevolking maar ek wil he dat julle moet verstaan dat dit glad nie die enigste en vernamste doel van die census is nie. Dat die naturellebevolking groot voordeel gaan vind by die gevolge van sodanige strappe as wat geneem mag word ly geen twyfel nie en daarom vra ek julle in julle eie belang om lojal te berus in die bepalings van die wet. Ek kan julle die verskering gee dat hierdie bepalings simpatiek toegespas sal word met die minste ongerief aan enigemand en dat geen naturelle wat 'n lewe lei wat nuttig is vir die blanke of vir sy eie rasgenote enige vrees behoort te he nie.

Hoemeer ek 'n studie mak van die uitgebreide aangeleenthede van die departement wat ek nou beheer hoemeer kom ek onder die indruk van wat gedoen word om toestande onder die naturelle bevolking te verbeter. Gronde is gekoop of in aankoop deur die departement vir 'n bedrag van

byna vier miljoen pond en ons is nou besig met die belangrike en moeilike werk om die beste resultings te tref vir die ekonomiese gebruik van daardie grond en vir die herwinning en verbetering van die bestaande lokasies en reserwes, julle weet dat voed selgebrek grotendeels verantwoordelik is vir die feit dat daar so baie naturelle is wat hulle na die dorpe begewe en dat wanneer hulle daar kom hulds moet het om vir hulself kos te vind en dan is daar ook nog die probleem wat van hulle families moet word wat hulle agtergelaat het. My departement is begerig om die lokasies die reserwes en die nuwe grond wat gekoop word meer produktyf te maak en om aldus verhoed dat dit vir so baie van julle nodig word om julle huise te verlaat en herbergloos vir julle daie stede te begewe.

Baie is reeds gedoen en ek voel trots om verbonden te wees met die taak van voortsetting van die goeie werk. Ek is heeltemal bewus van die moeilikhede en ingewikkeldheid van die probleme waaroor ons staan maar ek weet dat as ons hulle in 'n gees van gemeenskaplike trou en samewerking aanpak ons hulle nie onoorkomelik sal vind nie. Ek wens die naturellebevolking van die Unie all voorspoed en geluk toe.

Calmly Faced Slaughter Of Their Cattle

The decision of the Government to slaughter cattle belonging to both Europeans and Africans in Northern Natal in order to combat foot and mouth disease, has been loyalty accepted by the Zulus, after the Chief Native Commissioner, Mr. Lugg, had explained the reasons and promised that the Government would compensate those who would be affected. It is understood that the compensation will involve £50,000. On Wednesday the Zulus of Nqutu Reserve calmly faced the tragedy of the slaughter of their cattle.

This calmness is attributed in part to:

The Government's spontaneous offer of compensation and relief measures to the Natives particularly to their children.

The weighty words of the Zulu Regent, Mshiyeni ka Dinuzulu, who bade them co-operate with the Government; The sympathetic and tactful breaking of the news, the promise of immediate payment, and the replenishing of herds in three months' time.

Liquor Raid Causes Another Attack On Police

Two detectives on the liquor staff at Marshall Square were attacked by Africans while they were carrying out a raid at Orange Grove. Both had to be treated at hospital. They sustained serious head injuries.

Shortly before three o'clock on Tuesday afternoon the detectives, a European and an African, climbed a koppie from the Pretoria-Johannesburg main road and searched the vicinity for Native liquor.

A man was detained for questioning in connection with some liquor that was found and the detectives eventually walked down the koppie with their prisoner. Unknown to them, however, a number of Africans had gathered in the vicinity to take action.

They suddenly surged towards the detectives. The European detective was facing away from them. Before he realised that there was trouble, he was struck a severe blow over the head with a stick.

He released his prisoner and held his hands over his head to protect himself. Another blow was struck and his left wrist was seriously injured.

The Native detective was also struck about the head.

Indians To Rescue

Some Indians working nearby came to their rescue. Their wounds were bathed and the European detective was placed on a chair.

The two men were then driven in a private motor cart to hospital. The European detective was taken to the General Hospital, where his head wound was stitched. The Native detective was treated at the Johannesburg Non-European Hospital.

Chief And 48 Africans Arrested

Rustenburg, Tuesday.—In a fight between Africans of the Naaupoort and Nooitgedacht districts, in the Rustenburg district, one man was killed and another is in hospital with a fractured arm. A number of men are suffering from minor stab or stick wounds.

Fort-eight men including the chief, have been arrested on charges of murder and stock theft. It is stated that one chief sent Natives to fetch cattle from other Natives, which led to the fighting.


