The Chairman, Mr. R. Feldman, opened the meeting at 3.15p.m.

He wecomed all the delegates and the meeting then observed a minute's silence for all those who had died in the unrest then prevailing.

# Notice of Meeting:

The meeting notice was read by Ms. L. Hanmer.

#### Credentials:

Credentials were read and accepted on a motion of Mr. Y. Kara, seconded by Mr. Sallie.

The Minutes of the Seventh Annual General Meeting were read. The Minutes were adopted, proposed Mr. M. Davy, seconded Mr. Y. Kara.

#### Matters Arising:

- 1. Mr. Waja(Tennis) informed the meeting that Southern Transvaal was no longer in existence. Some of their players were playing in South Western Transvaal.
- A new unit in the Northern Transvaal had affiliated to the Tennis Board.
- 2. The Chairman reported that Netball had been revived in the Eldorado Park/ Bosmont/Newclare and Noordgesig areas.
- 3. The matter of the Lenasia F.Association and the Southern Transvaal Football Association had been settled.
- 4. The Chairman replied in response to Mr. Mahommed of B.F.A. that the Executive had not been invited to speak to any of the affiliates at their meetings. Soem delegates felt that the Executive should use their initiative and go along to meetings even if they were not invited.

Western Transvaal Darts arrived at this juncture.

### Correspondence:

- Mr. M. Kahn, member of the Executive Committee: an apology for not attending the meeting. He stated that he was available for re-election. His apology was accepted.
- 2. From the New Unity Movement: denouncing the raids of the SADF into Angola and Botswana.
- 3. From the S.A. Chess Association asking TRACOS to asssist the Transvaal Chess Association. It was agreed that TRACos would call a meeting of interested chess persons. The first meeting would be held in Lenasia.
- 4. South African Council on Sport: the criteria for the selection of Sportspersons.
- 5. Action Youth: A message of support and solidarity.

The Correspondence was accepted for discussion, proposed Mr.T. Seotsanyane, Seconded Dr. Gopal.

- 1. It was decided that TRACOS and Transvaal Chess should meet to discuss the problems of Chess. Mr. L. Ratladi would be contacted in this regard.
- SACOS Sportsperson of the Year. It was decided that details of the function which would be hosted by TRACOS would be discussed at the next meeting.

# Secretarial Report:

The Report was read by Mrs. Tennant and Ms. Hanmer.

Corrections and Omissions:

- a) there is only one Volleyball unit in the Lenasia area.
- b) Azaadville Road Runners is not a member of the TRACOS.
- c) The TRACOS Sportsperson of the Year was a joint function with the T.S.B. Discussion of Report:
- 1. Rugby's absence from TRACOS meetings was discussed. TRACOS was not aware of any reason for Rugby's absence and non-affiliation.

# The Financial Statement:

The audited Financial Statement and Report were read by the Treasurer, Mr. A.B. Gandabhai.

TRACOS was owed R3 555 by its affiliates.

The Financial Statement was accepted for discussion, moved Western Transvaal Darts, seconded T.S.B.

Mr. Davy suggested that letters be written to the parent bodies of affiliates who were not affiliated or who absented themselves from meetings. These letters should also mention the outstanding monies.

The meeting deiced unanimously that only those units who were present at the annual meeting and those who applied in writing subsequently should be regarded as affiliates of the Council. Tea was supplied by the Bosmont Hotel. The Chairman thanked the Manager of the hotel. Delegates agreed that the R19.61 collected be donated to TRACOS.

## The Constitution:

There were no amendments to the Constitution.

# Election of Officials:

Western Transvaal Darts moved that the Executive of TRACOS be re-elected for another term of office, seconded Mr. Y. Kara.

Mr. Kara was elected into the vacant position on the Executive as Mr. Sibda had intimated that he was not available for re-election. Proposed Mr. Davy, seconded Mr. Carrim.

# General Business:

- 1. The next meeting would be held on the 10th. August at the T.S.B. office at 3p.m.
- 2. The Chairman reported that the Executive had been upset by the fact that SACOS had attended a meeting in Johannesburg and that TRACOS had not been informed of the fact. There was also a report that SACOS planned to have Press Conference in Johannesburg. This too, TRACOS, was not aware of. The meeting felt that SACOS should be informed of our feelings in this regard.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks from the Chair.

All Provincial Councils of Sport, according to reports, are living through crises to a lesser or a greater degree. Some of the Councils are no longer in existence and only come alive when they have to attend SACOS conferences or when they have to organise a conference for SACOS. To my mind this is a matter which should exercise the minds of all those who are connected with SACOS and non-racial sport. It is my contention that this matter is so serious that it requires attention at the highest level.

Councils of Sport such as TRACOS who are still in existence but who limp along once or twice during the course of the year know from experience that provincial bodies affiliated to national bodies which are in turn affiliated to SACOS can be divided into the following classes:

- a) those who are "paper members". They have attended the annual general meeting and have paid their annual subscription fees but they hardly if ever attend meetings. They feel they have satisfied all requirements in respect of the struggle- after all they were told to join provincial councils and have they not done so?
- b) then there are those who do not even bother to make enquiries. Either they or their parent bodies are not interested.
- c) about 30% of the members are fully fledged and attend meetings regularly as well as participate in all activities,
- d) lastly there are those who also attend regularly until they are given tickets to sell or are asked for a financial contribution and then they stay away. The Council loses both their money and their membership!

To my mind there seems to be a confusion as to functions of the Executive of the Provincial Council and the members constituting such a Council. Member units seem to feel that they have fulfilled their function when they have administered their particular code of sport i.e. after they have drawn fixtures, held meetings, gathered match reports, selected teams and all the other duties connected with the administration and organisation of sport. I admit that our units are facedy with a great deal of work connected with their codes and that the lack of facilities and money keep them extremely busy but I wish to submit that as oppressed sportspersons we dare not neglect that most important aspect of our duty and that is to prepare our grass-roots membership for the non-racial society we are striving for. To teach them about the South African situation, to motivate them to study this abnormal society and to compare it with the type of society which provides optimum conditions for all its citizens to live up to their potential as human beings and sportspersons, to lead into the most effective ways and methods to counter the propaganda and pseudo scientific utterances and acts of those who would like them to believe in "andersoortigheid and eiesoortigheid" instead of in a common humanity.

Officials of provincial units attend SACOS conferences and participate in work-shops. They are given literature at both the SACOS and provincial council level.Delegates discuss matters affecting non-racial sport and life in general at provincial council level.And yet when it comes to disseminating that knowledge the question is asked: "What is TRACOS or NACOS or who-ever doing about the very important task of transmitting to the grass-roots membership?" The question should rather be: "What can we as a provincial affiliate of TRACOS and therefore SACOS do with the information/literature to make our members aware of the facts?" Alternatively: "Let us call on one of the TRACOS or NACOS officials to come and address our members. We will book the hall, undertake the publicity and do everything in our power to get as many of our members as possible to attend the talk/symposium/panel discussion."

It is very important to my mind for all our community organisations firstly, to practise democracy, secondly to make their members understand the democratic process and thirdly to teach them how to use democratic structures. I contend that the lack of interest in provincial councils of sport is a result of the failure to understand our responsibilities with regard to the other part of our task beside playing sport. As oppressed persons we have long ago learnt the inter-relationship between sport and politics hence the SACOS principle (it has gone beyond a slogan) that we cannot practise normal sport in an abnormal society. Our players must be given every opportunity to learn the democratic process and how to use democratic structures. The channel of communication should be:

- 1. SACOS (work-shops, discussions, literature)
- 2. To provincial councils of sport and from there to
- 3. unions and associations where club delegates participate and
- 4. lastly, participation of grass-roots membership.

TRACOS convened what was called a "crisis" meeting. One of the decisions (after we had decided that there was a place for provincial councils of sport) was that affiliates would come to meetings with topics that they and their members were interested in (e.g. private schools or the use of facilities) and that there would then be a discussion at TRACOS level. Units were also asked to come to meetings with their problems e.g. with grounds or other facilities so that joint action could be taken after full discussion. The concept of joint action or action in unity is another democratic process which our members must learn. We will only be able to mobilise our members as an effective force in the struggle when they can participate in the struggle in a thinking way. We will then avoid our members coming to meeting with their so-called problems

if they are armed with our principles and our strategies.

I am seriously considering to raise the matter of the continued existence of provincial councils of sport with other councils and to suggect that a meeting of provincial council representatives and SACOS Executive Committee should be held during the next SACOS conference to disus whether there is, in fact, still a place for provincial councils and if so what their future role should be in the struggle.

I wish to thank my fellow officials very sincerely for their support and co-operation during the past year. My thanks also to those affiliates who did not think of TRACOS as "they" but rather as "us". We have a long, hard way to go before we realise our ideal of a non-racial South African society and I trust that all our members will be equal to the

# We will not beg the SABC, says

THE president of the Transvaal Council on Sports, Reggie Feldman, yesterday said his organisation had resolved not to have anything to do with the SABC-TV because the corporation has previously snubbed them.

Feldman, however, admitted that Tracos had ini-

tially asked the corporation to cover some of their events. When the organisation responded negatively, they decided not to pursue the mat-

"The executive of Tracos decided it was not worth it to beg the SABC-TV. It was felt that the SABC-TV would project the affiliates of Tracos as subscribing to the multinational concept, and thereby give a slanted version of what we stand for," Feldman said.

Feldman said their affiliates were shunned by sponsors who did not take kindly to their policy of non-racialism in a democratic society.

"We would rather not have financial backing than

sacrifice out principles," Feldman added.
Feldman said some of their cricket pitches were badly kept because affiliates did not have money to keep them in a good condition. He said that is the area some of the sponsorship money would be channelled to.

Tracos is the provincial affiliate of the South African Council on Sports.

# Tracos declares war

THE anti-apartheid sports movement in the Transvaal has declared war on government-created local authorities which they believe are attempting to crush nonracial

Delegates representing 15 sports groups affiliated to the Transvaal Council on Sport (Tracos) said the high rentals charged for sports facilities and a new policy forcing the sports bodies to maintain facilities, was seen as a sophisticated move to force the antiapartheid sport to close shop.

Delegates pointed out that it was common knowledge that nonracial sport had no massive sponsorship which could absorb the high fees for facility rentals and maintenance.


But despite lack of finance, Tracos affiliates concluded that it was the government's responsibility to provide and maintain facilities as a service to the taxpayer.

It was unanimously voted that a massive educational programme to draw public awareness to the issue be started and committees formed to oppose the high rentals and the new policy that demands sports bodies to maintain facilities at their expense.

"Just like the tricameral elections which were vehemently and successfully opposed, Tracos will engage the support of community organisations and labour movements to fight the new demands from management committees, township councils and regional councils," said one delegate.

Tracos, a provincial affiliate of the anti-apartheid South African Council on Sport (Sacos), argued that the new rule and fees were unjustified because it was the government's responsibility to

provide facilities and maintain them as a service to the taxpayer.

Among examples of high fees cited during the discussion, were the rental of a swimming pool without adequate facilities in Newlands. It was stated that fees charged for the pool were similar to the Ellis Park rates. The latter has an Olympic-size pool and met all international requirements. Tennis also complained of high fees. There were also complaints on the deteriorating upkeep of tennis courts in certain townships.

Delegates said it was notable that codes like swimming and tennis which had made successful strides in breaking racial barriers from grassroot-level, were facing stronger opposition from authorities on facilities.

The two codes were encouraged not to despair and continue to. serve as an example to other codes who still have to work harder in breaking racial barriers.

Another contentious issue was the use of hotels in the cities.
