REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1944.

When the time comes to frame the report of the Clinic's work during the past year it is natural to ask oneself three questions: (a) How has the work been going? (b) What important developments, if any, have taken place? (c) How have matters shaped in relation to future progress? I propose to attempt to answer each of these questions briefly.

- (a) The work of the Clinic has proceeded very well indeed. This was our first year in the new buildings and I am pleased to be able to report that they have exceeded our hopes. They have enabled our medical and nursing staff to carry on their work more smoothly and efficiently than ever; looking back one is reminded of the patience and devotion to duty that was required to cope with the volume of work in the old, cramped There have, of course, been many problems of adjustment to the new conditions. Donkeys have assailed our new lawns and invaded the very consulting room of the Medical Superintendent. Lightning has toyed with the intricacies of our electrical system. But these and other trials have been faced with cheerfulness and the new responsibilities. have been fully met. Dr. Miller's report provides an outline of the year's work but it requires a sympathetic imagination to fill in the picture of innumerable cuts, bruises, burns, lacerations, sores and fevers, in fact of every kind of injury and disease, that are being treated at the Clinic in ever growing numbers. We are glad to express our appreciation and gratitude to Dr. Miller, Sister Cowles and their able assistants.
- (b) In last year's report reference was made to our anxiety to proceed as soon as possible with the development of "nutritional, educational and specifically preventive work"—a field approximating to that described by the National Health Services Commission as "Personal Promotive and Preventive Health Services." It is satisfactory to be able to report a real advance in this direction during the year under review. Funds were made available by the University Students' Rag Committee that enabled us to take the initial steps towards building up a department of our work to cover the field. Mrs. Kark is in charge of this department and has three assistants working under her. The field is a wide one and its boundaries are elastic. Following the lessons of

experience elsewhere, the plan has been to work from a relatively small group of some fifty families through a widening range until the whole township is covered. There is already clear evidence that the residents are attracted to the type of services in question.

Another new step taken during the year was the provision by the Board of suitable meals for our African nurses. The practice of leaving the nurses to make their own arrangements for meals had revealed certain disadvantages; in some cases they were not providing themselves with enough suitable food. The new scheme has been in operation since January, 1944, and is yielding satisfactory returns in increased health and efficiency. It constitutes a really important addition to the nurses' remuneration and has many advantages over a mere increase in cash salaries.

On the building side it is satisfactory to be able to report that the Students' Hostel erected by the University at its own expense is nearing completion. The Hostel will facilitate the thorough training of the students in outpatient and district work, while it should substantially increase the Clinic's capacity to treat patients at night and over the week-ends.

(c) So far as the future is concerned, I have already in referring to the preventive side of our work indicated a direction in which notable advances may be expected. During the year members of the National Health Services Commission visited the Clinic and discussions that have since taken place make it appear probable that the residents of the Township will derive considerable benefit from their investigations. Apart from the urgent need for a hospital in the area we are certainly far from having presently available for the service of the large population of Alexandra anything like the minimum medical and nursing staff that the Commission envisages as necessary. Both on the curative and on the preventive sides the leeway should be made up as soon as possible.

We are expecting during the next few months to be able to erect a further portion or portions of our original building scheme, the new buildings to be devoted primarily to preventive and related services. It is very desirable that the completion of our whole building scheme, including the important hall for lectures, demonstrations and health films, should not be long delayed.

In 1944 a change was made in our street collection arrangements. The Students' Annual Rag was held on the day allotted to the Clinic and the Rag Committee handed to the Board the sum of £500 for general maintenance, representing the amount that we would have expected to collect. In addition, as indicated above, the Rag Committee provided us

with the sum of £4,000 for the preventive side of our work, of which £1,000 was earmarked for maintenance. The assistance of the students in thus making available to us a substantial portion of what they received from the generous Johannesburg public initiated the advance in preventive work to which I have referred. Should the discussions with the Union Health Department, mentioned above, lead to a further widening of the area of operations in this direction, the students will have the satisfaction of knowing that they have contributed very materially to this result. It is to be hoped that their efforts may lead to similar fruitful developments in the future and, in particular, that they will help us to raise the funds necessary for the completion of our building scheme.

Despite all efforts to keep expenditure under control our outgoings continue to increase. The expanding volume of work demands increases in staff and further medical assistance is required. It is gratifying to be able to record an increase by the Native Affairs Department in its annual grant from £600 to £800 but as yet we have not received from the Transvaal Province the increase that we had hoped for. In last year's annual report reference was made to the need for further annual subscriptions from the public of Johannesburg and in particular from the employers of residents in the Township. An appeal on these lines was planned to take place in November but in view of the transport difficulties that arose at that time it was deemed wiser to postpone the appeal for a while.

The Board wishes to refer to the retirement of Mr. D. L. Smit, the Secretary for Native Affairs, to whose sympathy and help the Clinic owes a very great deal. We wish him many years of healthy and pleasant relaxation from his arduous duties and trust that congenial opportunities may be found for the further exercise by him of those outstanding qualities that have endeared him to the African people. To his successor, Mr. Mears, we extend a hearty welcome.

In conclusion, I wish once more to convey the Board's sincere thanks to all, both inside and outside the Township, who have devoted so much time and energy to the furtherance of the work of the Clinic. It is to be hoped that their efforts will be supplemented by those of new recruits whose assistance would be welcomed. Mr. B. A. Key, of Messrs. Vaughan, Key and Payne, has again undertaken our auditing in an honorary capacity, and we are very grateful to him. The auditing of our accounts is not the comparatively simple affair that it was when the Clinic began its work.

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REPORT OF THE NURSING SUPERINTENDENT

Throughout this first year in our new buildings, we have been very conscious of our debt to numerous friends who, through their continued loyal support, have made possible the present development of the work of the Alexandra Health Centre and University Clinic. From the moment we stepped into the new buildings, made shining and immediately habitable by an enthusiastic committee of ladies, we have been deeply grateful. At the time of dedication and opening of the buildings, the interest of friends was interpreted into specific gifts and practical service by all sections of the community within and without the Township. By church and school choirs this loyalty and interest was interpreted into music which brought delight to all.

Through co-operation with the schools, the biggest and best Health Education Week was held in Alexandra at the end of October. The week culminated in a Health Parade resplendent with uniforms of Wayfarers, Pathfinders, little blue Sunbeams, and the joyful strains of two brass bands. Into the local street collection at that time, the church women threw themselves whole-heartedly, thus raising a goodly sum to add to Clinic funds. Following the custom of several years, school children from the Holy Cross Mission presented the Health Centre at this time with the sum of ten guineas collected for the most part in precious pennies to help less fortunate children. Red Cross V.A.D.'s from this same school have given practical assistance at the Clinic during busy

week-ends for the better part of the year. Other adult V.A.D.'s from the Western area of the city have given faithful help every Sunday morning during rush hours.

Friends from the Township, from Johannesburg, and from the U.S.A. have continued to contribute in cash and in kind towards the work of relief and prevention of disease. A generous gift from the "Rand Daily Mail Christmas Fund," a gift of warm blankets and of cash from the Native Affairs Department, together with many personal gifts, made possible the Christmas parties which were the grand finale of the year. Staff, blind folk, and mothers and babies joined in the celebrations. Fully six hundred mothers and babies were made glad by gifts of bags, baby powder, sweets, oranges, and toys for the toddlers. The shining eyes of a tiny tot trundling a minute red wagon, would bring Christmas into the heart of every donor.

To mention by name all of those who have contributed towards the work of the "Help Centre," as it is frequently called, is impossible here, but to each and every one we would express our deep appreciation. And, according to Bantu custom, would add, "And don't be weary of well-doing to-morrow!"
