Ambiguous rules

THE Booley Bowl result is clouded in controversy as EP were declared winners on the basis of gaining one more bonus point. The sad fact is that the rules of play are ambiguous. There is no mention of points determining the result in the final.

The 15 units were divided into four groups and crosssection semi-finals between the four log leaders were determined on the bonus point system.

The semi-final between Western Province and Transvaal was not played with bonus points, as the winner on either the first innings or an outright would go through.

Transvaal began the final in PE under the impression that the same criteria would apply. Then the sudden declaration by EP with only eight wickets down, still 13 runs behind, exposed the ambiguous rules of play.

Manager Abdulhack Bismillah argued that the points system only applied in each group to determine the respective winners and it was absurd to play the final under uncertain and vague laws.

Transvaal's match and registration secretary Shahed Wadwalla, who is also the association's delegate to the SACB, said the result was unacceptable as the rules of play made no mention of what terms the final was played under.

He pointed to the fact that the rules declared the team with the highest aggregate as winners of the competition. He also said SACB units must discuss the issue before the result can be finalised.

SACB match and registration secretary Mr Yusuf Lorgat's view was that the rules were "clearly" stated and that EP had won on the technicality of gaining the one extra bowling bonus point.

Whatever the ambiguity of the rules, the lack of them or the rules as they are written, the SACB must review them to avoid negative aspects creeping into the game.

In fact the trend worldwide is to foster positive results for the game's benefit.

For Transvaal to have led the game all the way and being part of a historic first tie concludes its best season on a rather sour note.

In fact, if the total points of the leaders in the four groups are taken into account, then Transvaal would be run-away winners as they were the only team to record three outright wins.

Western Province's Seraj Gabriels will lead a team blended with a fine mix of youth and experience.

Vaal youngsters Iqbal Khan and Imran Munshi win their first 'caps' and will line up with their provincial colleagues, wicketkeeper Yasin Begg and their skipper Haroon Lorgat

WP opener Ismail Behardien is the only other player

to win SACB colours for the frist time.

Jack Manack and Vincent Barnes (WP) and lanky Mandesi Mali (EP) will spearhead the bowling attack, with Lorgat and EP skipper Khaya Majola filling the all-rounders' roles.

Gabriels and Faiek Davids are 'sandwiched' by the three new caps. Munshi will open the batting and Iqbal Khan will bat at four.

EP all-rounder Richard Dolly, tipped to lead EP in the near future, is 12th man.

The Vaal lads had to score a reasonable total, but inept batting and bad running between wickets resulted in four run-outs.

Vaal finished on 131 in their second knock. Only Solly Mangera's timely return to form with an unbeaten 44 added some respectability to the total.

With EP needing 145 in over 200 minutes and 20 overs, the battle- scarred wicket again responded in nightmarish fashion.

Ashraf Variawa sent four batsmen packing in his seven overs, and with EP on 15/4, Transvaal were in command.

But young Nasser Ebrahim (brother-in-law of Transvaal senior captain Haroon Lorgat) batted a painstaking 240 minutes to deny Transvaal an easy passage.

Athletic wicketkeeper Geronimo Piedt (41) and Ebrahim (36) added 57 for the sixth wicket.

At the start of the 20 overs EP required 52 runs and Transvaal were looking for four more wickets.

The EP batting took on more urgency and the pressure on both teams was mounting. The tail-enders began to find the boundary at regular intervals and wickets fell as well.

Kolia again captured two wickets in quick succession to keep Vaal in the hunt.

Then the famous last over unfolded and though the result was a tie, EP carried off the Booley Bowl.
