I wonder if I may ask a favour of you, something that could be of great value to the "Rand Daily Mail". We have been encouraged from two or three friendly quarters to enter for something called The ANPA World Press Achievement Award which is sponsored annually by the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

Newspapers which meet the criteria for the award are newspapers whose editorial excellence, enterprise, courage, independence and integrity have contributed materially to the social, economic, cultural and political advancement of the citizens of their countries."
