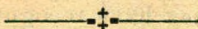

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1943.



Readers of the Annual Reports of the Clinic have become accustomed to learn of fresh and indeed striking progress each year. To this sequence of advances the year 1943 has been no exception. On the contrary, as appears from Dr. Miller's report and from the accounts prepared by Miss Moodie, the acceleration in development has been fully maintained. Through the sustained efforts of all members of the staff the quantity and quality of the services rendered have reached a very high level, of which they may all feel justly proud. A list of the members of the staff who have so finely served the residents of Alexandra Township during the year appears on the inside of the cover and to all of them the Board of Management conveys its gratitude and congratulations.

In last year's report it was stated that work on the new buildings was beginning and that it was hoped that they would be ready for occupation by the end of the year. Thanks to the skill and enthusiasm of our Architect, Mr. Chalmers, and our contractor, Mr. Morren, this hope was fulfilled, and at the new year we moved into the finely designed and finely built quarters, which surely compare favourably with those of any other clinic in the country. The progress of the Clinic in the past nine years cannot of course be calculated simply in terms of the size of the buildings successively occupied by it. But some idea of the growth of the work can be gathered from a comparison of the old two-roomed iron cottage with the double storey building opened in 1937, and with the new clinic. The latter provides us with greatly enlarged opportunities for serving the Township and it is our intention to use those opportunities to the full. The medical and surgical equipment of the Clinic is still decidedly inadequate, but certain further items, which are regarded as the minimum we need, are on order and will, we hope, be installed before long.

In last year's report reference was made to the sources, both private and public, from which funds for the erection of the new buildings had been or were expected to be derived. Since that date, in addition to various smaller but none the less most welcome donations, which are acknowledged elsewhere, we have received £500 from the City Council of Johan-

nesburg and £2,000 under the will of the late Mr. W. Mountstephens. The grant from the City Council gives us especial satisfaction because it confirms the view that whatever members of the Council may have thought about the future of Alexandra, they have recognised the existence of a moral obligation to assist us in promoting the health of the Township, the working population of which is almost entirely employed in the City. In Mr. Mountstephens the Clinic lost a generous supporter who, during his lifetime, had contributed £3,250 to our Building Fund, and who by his bequest of £2,000 showed that he remained interested in our work until his death.

The buildings now on the site are the Clinic itself and the European and African nurses' quarters. As has previously been indicated in these reports it is intended to erect further buildings as opportunity arises. The first of these, a hostel for University students, may be commenced before long. The University, whose co-operation continues to be of the utmost importance to the Clinic, is bearing the cost of erection of the hostel. In this connection it should be mentioned that the assistance of the University in the installation of the electrical equipment for the new buildings was invaluable.

The Clinic building itself as erected is only the larger portion of the building as originally designed. To cut down expenses we had reluctantly to excise portions that were to have been devoted to nutritional, educational and specifically preventive work. Some of that kind of work is being done. For instance, there is the milk distribution service, in carrying out which we are greatly helped by the special grants from the Martha Washington Club and the Alexandra Township, Ltd. But we are anxious, while maintaining the curative side of the work, to extend the preventive side and for that reason the completion of the Clinic building should not be unduly delayed.

In a previous report reference has been made to the possible erection of a small cottage hospital. Of course, the Clinic is not and never will be a substitute for the considerable hospitalisation that the area apparently requires. But a few beds should be available to take emergency cases of a serious nature. Some of the persons who come to the Clinic are really very ill, and it is unsatisfactory that all who are not sent to the Non-European Hospital should have to go back home immediately after receiving treatment.

The cost of running the Clinic has increased during the past year and will certainly increase considerably during the coming year or two. The new buildings require a larger staff and much more must be spent on maintenance in various directions. It is to be hoped and expected that certain of the

bodies that make us annual grants will increase those grants. But we do not wish the satisfactory balance in the sources of our revenue that has been maintained in the past to be unduly disturbed. We have, broadly speaking, received our money from (a) Government or local authority grants, (b) patients' fees, and (c) contributions from the public. Sums received from grants have grown in recent years and may be expected, so far as some sources are concerned, to increase further. Patients' fees grow with the growth of the services rendered. Contributions from the public, though they have been a most valuable addition to our resources, have not yet been placed on a regular basis so as to provide us with a steady and substantial flow of the sinews of war. To our annual contributors we are most grateful, but there should be more income from this source to preserve the balance and maintain the charitable aspect of our work. Employers of labour, many of whose employees live in the Township and receive treatment for themselves and their families at the Clinic, would doubtless if approached be perfectly willing to become annual subscribers to our funds.

It is again my pleasant duty to record our gratitude to Professor and Mrs. Kirby for the splendid contribution that the Triple Bill staged in the University Great Hall made. The amount received (£675 7s. 7d.) easily constitutes a record. The Medical Students' Dramatic Society again helped us substantially and our thanks are also due to the organisers and collectors who made the annual street collection a great success. We are very grateful to the ladies who worked so hard and successfully at collecting and making the various forms of non-medical but essential equipment for the new buildings.

Our thanks are also due as in former years to Mr. B. A. Key, of Messrs. Vaughan, Key & Payne, our Honorary Auditor, and to the secretarial staff of the University who have helped us regularly with various forms of clerical and other work. We are grateful also to the Sisters of the Holy Cross Mission, who again during the year allowed us to use their premises for our annual meeting.

In conclusion, I would like personally to thank my fellow members on the Board who have attended the often lengthy meetings so regularly. Miss Moodie, our Hon. Treasurer, and Dr. Dexter Taylor, our Hon. Secretary, have worked without sparing themselves; their duties have increased considerably, and without their constant attention to our affairs the work of the Clinic could not have been carried on.

## MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1943.

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I have much pleasure in submitting my report for the year ended 31st December, 1943.

It was again a year of gratifying increases in every department. Perhaps the most notable of these increases occurred in the medical consultations and dressings. In regard to medical consultations, a total of 19,008 attendances were recorded compared with 14,952 during the previous year, while 29,144 dressings were done, an increase of 5,393 compared with last year's total. An idea of the phenomenal development of the Clinic and the enormous amount of work done by the Staff during the year under review can be gauged from the fact that a total of 66,662 attendances were recorded for all departments of the Clinic's medical services: this exceeds last year's total by 10,650. In addition 21,077 visits were paid to patients in their homes.

The Clinic's services have again been extended to meet the needs of the community. A Dental Clinic for School Children was established towards the end of the year. A survey by the Faculty of Medicine of a few schools in the Township was made early in the year, and lists were compiled of children requiring dental treatment. The Clinic staff with the aid of students extended this survey to include all schools in the Township. Thus lists were compiled of all Alexandra School Children in need of dental treatment. It was originally intended to send these children, in groups of twenty every day, to the Dental Hospital, Johannesburg. This arrangement had to be abandoned owing to lack of transport facilities. Dental treatment (extractions only) of these children is now carried out at the Clinic twice a week by the Medical Aid under a doctor's supervision. Already 180 children have been dealt with.

It is hoped, when facilities and staff become available, to extend the Clinic's services to include out-patient clinics in Medicine and Surgery, and perhaps other specialities.

The general state of health of the community was fairly good, considering the unfavourable living conditions existing in certain parts of the Township. Apart from minor outbreaks of infectious diseases amongst children, no serious epidemic occurred.

Medical students continued to render valuable service, and ample opportunity for gaining experience in dispensary practice was afforded them. Students attended first in groups of four and later in groups of six, for a period of two weeks. During the year 103 final year students attended the Clinic.

In view of the growth of the Clinic and the increase in work the African Nursing Staff was increased from ten to twelve. On the Medical Staff, Dr. de la Hunt, of the University Department of Obstetrics, joined the Visiting Obstetricians, of whom there are now three. There were also several changes on the Medical and Nursing Staff. Dr. Marion Reid left in April to take up residence in Durban; Dr. Deborah Bradley-Moore, who succeeded her, resigned in October to take up residence in England; Dr. Mathilda Mendelow is now acting as Assistant Medical Officer. Sister Hagemann left in April to take up a post at "Brenthurst." She was succeeded by Sister Batterbury.

The Medical Aid, Mr. Nodada, was transferred to the Transkei, and left in April. His place was taken by Mr. Ngcwabe. There were also three resignations on the Nursing Staff.

The general work of the Clinic has been maintained at a high level throughout the year, despite great difficulties occasioned by lack of accommodation.

In conclusion I desire to express my grateful thanks to all members of the Staff for the loyal and efficient services they have rendered throughout a most trying year. I also desire to express my thanks to the Chairman, members of the Board of Management, University Authorities, Alexandra Health Committee, voluntary workers and other interested persons for their generous help and cordial co-operation.
