### re Native Service Contract Act.

The magistrates of Potgietersrust and Zoutpansberg have addressed circulars to public bodies, farmers' associations and landowners in their districts notifying the Government's intention to put the above Act into operation on July lst, 1933, and the appointment of local committees to investigate and report to the Minister on the question of proclamation of areas under Section 9. In case you have not seen the circulars I beg to enclose copies herewith for your information.

## Main provisions of Section 9, Native Service Contract Act, 1932.

- 1. The Governor-General may from time to time proclaim any area, alter boundaries of any area, or withdraw any area from the provisions of Section 9.
- 2. The owner of land outside a Native Location and an Urban area is liable to a tax of £5 in respect of each native male over 18 and under 60 years of age who resides on his land and who is physically and mentally fit and who has not rendered service during the calendar year for the period fixed by proclamation in the proclaimed area (which shall be not less than three months and not more than six months).

If the services of the native were not available and the owner could not take or have taken reasonable steps to secure that the services would be available, the owner will not be liable.

No tax will be paid in respect of the guardian of three or more natives who have each under a contract of service served the owner of the land on which the guardian is demiciled, in the aggregate for a period not less than the prescribed period (not less than three months and not more than six months).

- 3. Tax payable in January in respect of the previous calendar year.
- 4. Unless the owner proves the contrary he shall be deemed to be liable for the tax in respect of each native male (over 18 years and under 60 years) proved to have resided on his property during the preceding calendar year.

COPY. NATIVE SERVICE CONTRACT ACT No. 24 of 1932. It is hereby notified that it is the intention of the Government to put the abovementioned Act into operation on the 1st July, 1933. The publication of a proclamation bringing the Act into operation will not, however, automatically put the provisions of Section 9 into force and the Minister desires in each case to obtain a report from a local Committee of investigation before any area is proclaimed under this Section. A Committee for the Zoutpansberg district has been appointed under the Chairmanship of the Magistrate and its functions will be to investigate and report to the Minister on the following lines:-The customary period of service rendered annually by squatters in the district and to recommend the periods of service to be determined. 2. The effect the proclamation of any area in the district is likely to have upon the natives in that area and whether the natives are likely to suffer any undue hardships in cases where landowners refuse to pay the £5 tax, and how many natives are likely to be affected and what other land is available for them. What areas, if any, should be defined by proclamation in terms of Section 9 (1). 3. Landowners, farmers' associations and public bodies generally are invited to make representations to the Committee so that the position may be thoroughly investigated before the Committee submits its report. The times, places and dates when the Committee will sit to hear evidence will be notified later but the Committee will also be pleased to receive representations in writing. C.N.
