MINUTES OF THE 27TH SESSION OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF THE PROVINCE OF SOUTHERN AFRICA HELD AT WATERFORD KAMHLABA COLLEGE, MBABANE, SWAZILAND FROM 11 - 20 AUGUST 1992.

TUESDAY 11 AUGUST 1992

- 1. Synod assembled for a celebration of the Holy Eucharist at the Cathedral Church of All Saints, Mbabane, Swaziland at 18h00.
 - 1.1 After the Gospel, the Registrar (having certified that a quorum was present) the President, the Most Revd D M Tutu, constituted the Session of Synod.
 - 1.2 The President delivered his Charge.
 - 1.3 Immediately before the blessing Synod received greetings from local churches:-

The Revd Fr Joseph Matola spoke on behalf of the Roman Catholic bishop, the Rt Revd Louis Ndlovu.

The Revd Absolom Mnisi spoke on behalf of the Lutheran Church.

The Rt Revd A M Dlamini spoke on behalf of the Council of Swaziland Churches and the Zionist Church.

1.4 The Dean of the Province, the Rt Revd Michael Nuttall, read letters of greeting from:
The Revd Nigel Uden, Minister-in-Charge of the Ecumenical Parish of St John the Evangelist, Sandton;
The General Secretary of the Anglican Consultative Council, Canon Sam van Culin;
The Most Revd Keith Rayner, Archbishop of Melbourne, on behalf of the Anglican Church in Australia.
The Revd Roy Barker, sometime Dean of Grahamstown;

2. MOTION IN TERMS OF RULE 30 (b) (ii)

The President moved and the Dean of the Province seconded a motion calling for the immediate suspension of rule 14 to enable Synod to conduct its daily business as suggested in the Order Paper.

Synod gave its unanimous consent and Rule 14 was suspended with immediate effect.

The President gave the Blessing.

Synod adjourned at 20h40.

WEDNESDAY 12 AUGUST 1992

4. Synod resumed at 10h02

- 4.1 The President read from scripture; the "Veni Creator" was sung in English. The "Kyries" were sung in Ronga. Synod said the Lord's Prayer and the President read a prayer.
- 4.2 The Provincial Registrar declared that a quorum was present.
- 5. The headmaster of Waterford Kamhlaba College, Mr Dick Eyeington, welcomed Synod members to the College. The President thanked the headmaster for his greeting. The President welcomed the delegates from Lesotho who had arrived late due to transport problems.
 - 5.1 The President welcomed members of Religious Communities who were present, the President of the AWF Mrs Jenny Frye, The President of the Mother's Union Mrs Joan Beddy, the representatives of the Anglican Students' Federation.
 - 5.2 A special welcome was given to the Revd Michael Lapsley, ASF Chaplain Synod stood to applaud him.
 - 5.3 The President greeted the representatives from the newly created Dioceses of Christ the King, South Eastern Transvaal, Klerksdorp and Umzimvubu.
 - 5.4 The President welcomed The Revd Ed den Blaauwen, the editor of CPSA News.

- 5.5 The Bishop of Grahamstown was commended for his fast in support of the plight of farm labourers.
- 5.6 Mrs Leah Tutu, wife of the President, and Mrs Doris Nuttall, wife of the Dean of the Province, were welcomed.
- 5.7 The Bishop of St Helena and its lay representative, Mrs L M Crowie, were greeted.
- The President called for a time of silence in memory of deceased members of the Synod, especially Mick Milligan. The Bishop of Port Elizabeth ended the silence with a prayer.

- 6.10 The President congratulated Claude Cogill whose wife had just given birth to a child, and Synod sang "happy birthday" to delegates from Lebombo and Grahamstown.
- 6.11 The Bishop of Lesotho was welcomed on arrival and it was noted that Bishops S Dwane and E McKenzie were at Synod but not present due to illness.
- 6.12 The Provincial Youth Chaplain, the Revd Dalisu Zungu, was greeted.
- 6.13 Messages of greeting from the Chancellor, Diocesan office and the AWF of the Diocese of Klerksdorp were read.
- 7. The Ven Andreas Soares, the Episcopal Delegate from the Anglican Church in Angola, addressed Synod concerning the life of the Church in Angola. The address was interpreted into English by the Bishop of Lebombo, who added his own comments about the work in Angola.
 - 7.1 Synod congratulated the Bishop of Lebombo on this pioneering work, and welcomed the visiting group of evangelists from Angola.

7.2 Mrs Jenny Frye spoke about the work of translation of the book "Good News People" for the Diocese of Lebombo by the Diocese of Teneriffe.

- 9. AGENDUM 1 (PAGE 4 First Agenda Book)

The mover was given permission by Synod to present an amended version of Agendum 1.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 1 (OF PROVINCIAL SYNOD) AND CANON 43 (OF PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. We as the Church of the Province of Southern Africa at the Partners-in-Mission Consultation in 1987 acknowledged "our failure to be faithful to Jesus' own concern for the young", and committed ourselves to ensuring a more effective ministry among young people, and by young people;
 - B. At our last Provincial Standing Committee it was agreed that proposals be submitted to amend the relevant Canons to allow for "the full representation of Youth, both at Provincial Standing Committee and Provincial Synod";
 - C. Representatives of the Youth Structures of our Dioceses have unanimously appealed for

such representation :

D. Up to four people should represent our young people, as full members, at Synod.

The Proposals

1. Be it enacted that the following fourth paragraph be added to Canon 1.3:

"Youth

The Anglican Students' Federation and Representatives the Provincial Youth Council at their respective annual Conferences immediately prior to Provincial Synod, shall elect two representatives each to represent the Youth of the Province, as full members of Provincial Synod. Should there be any changes to the Provincial Youth Structures prior to a Provincial Synod, and one or more or all of these members not be elected for any reason, then the Metropolitan shall nominate people to be such members, after consultation with such bodies or associations as he deems appropriate."

2. Be it enacted that a new paragraph (b) be inserted in Section 1 of Canon 43, with the balance of the paragraphs to be renumbered :

"Youth Representatives The Anglican Students' Federation and the Provincial Youth Council at their respective Annual Conferences immediately prior to Provincial Standing Committee shall elect two representatives each to represent the Youth of the Province as full members of Provincial Standing Committee. Should there be any changes to the Provincial Youth Structures prior to a Provincial Standing Committee, and one or more of all of these members not be elected for any reason, then the Metropolitan shall nominate people to be such members, after consultation with such bodies or associations as he deems appropriate."

Proposed by : The Bishop of Grahamstown Seconded by : The Rt Revd M M Makhaye

9.1 Debate was entered into

- 9.2 The debate was interrupted at 12h05 for silent prayer.
- 9.3 An amendment to the Principles, accepted by the Proposer and Seconder, was made to the motion as follows:-

'In line 2 of paragraph B of the Proposals insert the words "and Articles of the Constitution (as recommended by the Committee of Synod to accommodate proposals 1 and 2)" between the words "Canons" and "to".

- 9.4 The proposer replied to the debate.
- 9.5 The Principles of Agendum 1 as amended, were voted on and were agreed. Agendum 1 was set down as the first business of the Committee of Synod.
- 10. AGENDUM 2 (Page 4 First Agenda Book)

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 1 (OF PROVINCIAL SYNOD) AND CANON 43 (OF PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. At all times the Church of God has the responsibility of being fully and sensitively alert to the circumstances in which the Christian Faith has to be incarnated so as to be able to make appropriate responses as the occasion demands in the light of the Gospel;
 - B. In the foreseeable future, the geographical area covered by the Church of the Province of Southern Africa will experience a period of turmoil and change;
 - C. It is therefore necessary to amend the instruments of government of the CPSA in such a way that the Church is able to respond most effectively and timeously to such changing circumstances by having more frequent meetings of Provincial Synod, at least once a year, with consequential changes in the representation of dioceses at Synod and in the status and function of the Provincial Standing Committee;

The Proposal

Be it enacted that :

- 1. In line Nine of Canon 1.1 the words "three years" be deleted and replaced by the words "one year".
- 2. Canon 1.2 be deleted, and replaced by the following : "All the Dioceses of the Province, including those which shall be hereafter constituted according to rules prescribed by Provincial Synod, shall be entitled to send representatives to the Provincial Synod, according to the following scale: Two Clerical and Four Lay Representatives for each bishop in a diocese up to a maximum of four Clerical and six Lay representatives per diocese".
- 3. Delete Canon 43 entirely and replace with a new Canon 43 "(Of the Finance Committee and the Metropolitan's Executive)" to read:"
 - "1. There shall be a Finance Committee consisting of three Bishops, five Clergy and seven Lay persons elected together with alternates by their respective Houses at Provincial Synod. Such elected representatives shall be eligible for re-election. The Committee shall prepare estimates for and administer the Common Provincial Fund in accordance with the provisions of Canon 45 for consideration by Provincial Synod. The PST shall be Secretary to the Finance Committee.
 - 2. Where elsewhere in the Constitution and Canons there is reference to actions of the Provincial Standing Committee, the same shall be deemed to refer to those of Provincial Synod.
 - 3. There shall be a Metropolitan's Executive which shall meet only in times of emergency consisting of the Metropolitan, The Dean of the Province, Two Senior Clergy and Four Senior Lay persons elected by Provincial Synod. The Provincial Executive Officer shall be the secretary of the Metropolitan's Executive."

Proposed by: The Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman Seconded by "The Very Revd J Marcus.

- 10.1 Debate was entered into
- 10.2 An amendment to the Principles, agreed to by the

Proposer and Seconder, was made as follows :-

Delete the last line of Principle C and replace it with the words, "by abolishing the Provincial Standing Committee and substituting therefore a Finance Committee and Metropolitan's Executive, and to state the functions and composition thereof."'

- 10.3 The proposer responded to the debate.
- 10.4 The Principles, as amended, were voted on.

A verbal vote was taken, after which a division was called for.

The division was overwhelmingly against the Principles. Synod agreed to dispense with a count of the votes.

The measure was lost.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 1.2 (OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. The cost of Provincial Synods has risen to a point where Provincial Standing Committee in 1988 resolved that the membership of such Synods should be reduced in order to effect savings.
 - Increasing numbers of clergy (e.g. self-supporting clergy and the inclusion of deacons) have, on the application of the present formula for representation of Dioceses at Synod, increased these costs, and have distorted representation where there are large numbers of clergy relative to the number of parishes.

C. It is recommended that Diocesan membership of Provincial Synod be reduced in the houses of clergy and laity, and the principle upon which representation is based shall be changed.

The Proposals

Be it enacted that :

The words from and including "One Clerical and one Lay representative..."in the fifth line, up to and including the words "in excess of 50" in the twelfth line, be deleted, and the following substituted therefor:

1 - 20	1	1
21 - 40	2	2
41 - 60	3	3
61 - 80	4	4
81 - 100	5	5
101 and over	6	6

Proposed by : Mr N Greenham Seconded by : The Revd V Spencer

- 13.1 The proposer and seconder agreed to some grammatical corrections to the Principles as printed in the Agenda Book.
- 13.2 Debate was entered into
- 13.3 After the debate a vote was taken on the Principles of Agendum 3.

Voting was as follows :- for 109 against 87

- 13.4 The Principles were agreed and set down as the second business of the Committee of Synod.
- 14. The President appointed the following scrutineers for voting. Mr S N Colam, Mrs E Mashinini, Mr M Hales and the President's chaplain.
- 15. AGENDUM 4 (Page 7 First Agenda Book)

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 43 (OF THE PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE)

The Principles

Whereas Synod believes that:

- A. Provincial Standing Committee has become too large to be an effective Executive of Provincial Synod and too expensive to be afforded by the dioceses of the Province; and
- B. The distinctions made between members of the Church are artificial, unsound and unchristian.

The Proposals

Be it enacted that Canon 43 be amended :

1. In section 1 (a) by the deletion of the first sentence and its replacement with:

"The Provincial Standing Committee shall consist of the Metropolitan (who shall be Chairman), and two representatives, elected together with alternates, by the Synod of each diocese".

- 2. By the deletion of section 1 (f)
- 3. By the deletion of Section 1 (g)
- 4. By the deletion of section 3 and its replacement with:

"The quorum shall consist of 10 Diocesan representatives".

Proposed by : The Revd V Spencer

Seconded by : Mr D Holden

- 15.1 Debate was entered into.
- 15.2 The Revd Dr Ian Darby proposed and the Revd David Wells SSM seconded an amendment to the Principles as follows:

'that "B" in the Principles be deleted in its entirety and principle A be amended by the deletion of "and" in line 3, and the addition of "in it's present form" between the words "Committee" and "has" in line 1.

- 15.3 The amendment was voted on and agreed.
- 15.4 The Principles, as amended, were approved and referred to the Committee of Synod as its third item of business.
- 16. AGENDUM 5 (Page 7 First Agenda Book)

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 3 (OF THE SYNOD OF BISHOPS)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. It has become necessary to change the frequency of the meetings of the instruments of government of the Church of the Province of Southern Africa in order to enable the Church to incarnate the Christian Faith in a period of change and turmoil;
 - B. It is, therefore, not necessary to require the Synod of Bishops to meet twice a year;
 - C. There are provisions in the existing Canon for the Metropolitan to summon a Synod of Bishops whenever he deems it fit;
 - D. The canonical requirement should be for a meeting once a year.

The Proposals

Be it enacted that in line three of Canon 3.1 the words "and in any case half-yearly" be deleted and replaced by the words "at least once a year".

Proposed by: The Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman.

Seconded by : The Very Revd J Marcus.

- 16.1 Debate was entered into.
- 16.2 The Principles were voted on and the measure was lost.
- 17. Synod retired for tea at 15h37.
- 18. Synod re-assembled at 16h06.
- 19. AGENDUM 6 (Page 8 First Agenda Book.)

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 4 (OF THE ELECTION OF BISHOPS)

The Principles

Whereas: It is desirable that there should be maximum consultation with the Metropolitan in all matters concerning arrangements for Assemblies to elect bishops:

The Proposal

Be it enacted that Canon 4.9 (a)(i) be amended by the addition of the words "in consultation with the Metropolitan" after the word "Dean" before the word "shall" in line five.

Proposed by: The Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman Seconded by: The Bishop of Umzimvubu

- 19.1 The Principles were voted on and passed without dissent.
- 19.2 The President declared the measure was of a formal nature and moved that Synod proceed to the third reading immediately. Synod concurred.
- 19.3 The Proposer put the measure for final approval. Synod approved the measure.

20. AGENDUM 7 (Page 8 - First Agenda Book)

Proposed by: The Revd V Spencer

Seconded by : Mr D Holden

The motion as printed in the Agenda book was presented in an amended form as follows:

The Principles

Whereas: This Synod believes that the present form for the election of a bishop has certain faults, including the fact that

(a) the candidates are not present to speak for themselves

and that

(b) the proceedings of the Church should take place in the presence of any member of the Church who wishes to be present.

17 The Proposals

- A. Be it enacted that Canon 4 be amended as follows:
 - 1. In section 12(a) by the deletion of the second sentence.
 - 2. By the deletion of section 22.
 - 3. By the addition of a section 10(b)(v) reading:

"The Chairman of the Advisory Committee shall invite the nominees to attend the Elective Assembly to speak on their behalf."

4. By the addition in clause 15(a) of the sentence:

"Each nominee, if present and desiring to do so, shall be entitled to speak on his own behalf."

- B. Be it resolved as a motion (i.e. not as a measure) of this Synod that the enactment in Part A above be regarded as an interim measure, and that this Synod respectfully asks the Metropolitan that a commission be appointed by him to investigate the complete re-writing of Canon 4, taking into consideration the procedures for the election of bishops elsewhere, and to report with its proposals to the next Session of Provincial Synod.
- 20.1 The Very Revd Robin Briggs moved and the Bishop of Pretoria seconded that part B of the proposals be divided from the measure and treated as a separate motion.

After consultation with the Dean of the Province, Synod concurred with the motion, and part B of the proposals of Agendum 7 was referred to the Synod Advisory Committee to be tabled later.

- 20.2 A motion from the Bishop of the Diocese Christ the King that "Synod move to the next matter of business" was not received by the President.
- 20.3 Debate on the Principles of Agendum 7, as amended, was entered into.
- 20.4 An amendment proposed by the Revd Canon L Siboto and seconded by the Revd Canon L Ngewu was received to the effect that

"Part B of the Principles, as amended, be deleted."

- 20.5 Debate on the amendment followed.
- 20.6 The Amendment to the Principles of Agendum 7 was voted on and carried.
- 20.7 A further motion that "Synod proceed to the next business" proposed by the Dean of the Province and seconded by the Bishop of Umzimvubu was received by the President.

Synod voted in favour of this motion and the measure was lost.

21. The separated motion (part B of the proposals of Agendum 7) was now tabled as Agendum 55.

AGENDUM 55

That this Synod respectfully asks the Metropolitan that a Commission be appointed by him to investigate the complete re-writing of Canon 4, taking into consideration the procedures for the election of bishops elsewhere, and to report with its proposals to the next Session of Provincial Synod.

Proposed by: The Revd Canon R R Snyman Seconded by: The Very Revd R Briggs

- 21.1 No debate was entered into. The motion was put immediately and carried.
- 22. AGENDUM 8 (Page 9 First Agenda Book)

This Synod, deeply distressed by the growing violence that is sweeping through Southern Africa and appalled by the lack of regard for human life and property -

- 1. Affirms the work of the national and local Dispute Resolution Committees in South Africa
- 2. Condemns the flagrant disregard of the "Code of Conduct for Political Parties and Organisations" as contained in the National Peace Accord of South Africa by some of the signatories to the Accord.
- 3. Calls on all political parties and organisations in South Africa to uphold the principles of the National Peace Accord and to ensure that its members and organisations understand the contents of the Peace Accord.
- 4. Calls on all Christian leaders in the Church of the Province of Southern Africa to familiarise their people with the contents of the National Peace Accord.
- 5. Challenges Anglicans throughout southern Africa courageously to refuse to take part in any activity which is in violation of Christian principles or the spirit of the National Peace Accord.

The motion was referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANONS 43, 44 AND 45 (OF PSC, PROVINCIAL OFFICERS AND CPF)

- Whereas: A. The Church is a living organism and its structures are constantly adjusting to changing circumstances;
 - B. the relationship of Provincial Standing Committee to Provincial Synod requires clarification,
 - C. it is desirable not to hold a meeting of Provincial Standing Committee in years in which Provincial Synod meets.
 - D. Provincial Synod, being the governing body of the CPSA, must under-take appropriate responsibility for the work of the Province;
 - E. Former Provincial Departments and their Directors are in the process of being replaced by other structures and resource personnel.

- 5. Canon 43.1 (i) (the new proposed 43.3 (i) in this measure) be amended by the deletion of the words "and the Directors of Provincial Departments";

 - "(j). The Committee shall provide for areas of Provincial ministry referred to in Section 1 (e) of this Canon to be represented by those persons set out in the schedule referred to in Canon 44.4. Such persons shall have the right to speak but not to vote";
 - 7. Canon 44 be amended by the deletion of 4 and its replacement by:-
 - "Persons appointed by the Metropolitan to care for areas of Provincial ministry in terms of Canon 43:1 (e) and 43:3 (j). A schedule of those to be so recognised shall be approved by Provincial Standing Committee at its session immediately preceding any session of Provincial Synod;"
- 8. Canon 45.2 be amended by the insertion of the words "Provincial Synod and, between sessions of Provincial Synod," between the words "by" and "the";

words "The Committee" in the first and last lines and the words "Provincial Standing Committee" in line 10 and their replacement in each case by the words "Provincial Synod or Provincial Standing Committee respectively"; and by the deletion of the words "The Secretary of the Committee" in line 7 and their replacement by the words "The Provincial Secretary - Treasurer."

C. It is considered desirable to unlink these two appointments.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 11 (OF RESIDENCE OF DIOCESAN BISHOPS)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. It is often not possible for a Bishop to delegate aspects of his responsibility of a Diocese effectively without extra people in position of authority;
 - B. The position of Archdeacon is itself not always specific enough to fulfil an effective ministry as described above;
 - C. The Canon only allows for the appointment of a Vicar General in the absence of the Bishop from the Diocese;
 - D. The Dean or Senior Priest or an Archdeacon would be appropriate for such an appointment.

The Proposals

Be it enacted that:-

- 1. A new section (c) of Paragraph 3 of Canon 11 be inserted as follows:
 - "3(c) If the Bishop of the Diocese believes that the work of God in the Diocese requires aspects of his responsibility to be delegated to a Vicar General while he is in his Diocese, he may appoint the Dean or the Senior Priest in his Diocese or if necessary one of the archdeacons to the post of Vicar General within the Diocese, at his discretion and for as long as he believes such an appointment benefits the Diocese."

2. The present section 3(c) be renumbered 3(d)

Proposed by: The Bishop of Johannesburg

Seconded by: The Very Revd R Briggs

- 30.1 Debate was entered into.
- 30.2 The Principles of Agenda 11 were voted on with the votes being counted:

for 99 against 75

The motion was carried and referred to the Committee of Synod as its fifth business.

- 31. The Bishop of St Mark the Evangelist addressed Synod on the concern expressed by the Archbishop in his charge that young people serve as volunteers in the church for a year. He described the Youth Year Programme in his diocese and offered their resources to the wider Province.
- 32. The Chairman of Committee reported that Committee would meet in the Synod chamber at 20h00.
- 33. Synod adjourned at 18h18.

THURSDAY 13 AUGUST 1992

- Synod gathered at Waterford Kamhlaba College, Mbabane, Swaziland.
- 35. 06h30 Morning Prayer 07h00 Eucharist 08h00 Breakfast 09h00 Bible Study
- 36. Synod resumed at 10h01.
 - 36.1 The President read from scripture.
 The "Veni, Creator Spiritus" was sung in English.
 The "Kyrie" was sung in Greek, Synod said the
 Lord's Prayer and the President prayed.
 - 36.2 The Provincial Registrar declared that a quorum was present.
 - The President informed Synod of the illness of the Provincial Executive Officer and Bishop E MacKenzie, and the absence of Bishop J Kauluma. He greeted The Rt Revd S Dwane who was back at Synod today.
 - The President identified the members of Religious Community present at Synod, and expressed the Church's gratitude for their ministry. Mother Nonie CR Grahamstown, Fr David Wells SSM, Mother Mary Evelyn SSJD, Mother Monica Mary CSJB, Fr Crispin Harrison CR, Fr John Salt OGS, Fr Michael Lapsley SSM and Bishop John Ruston.

Franciscan Tertiaries were introduced by the Dean of the Province, Fr R Snyman, Mrs R Faure, The Revd A S Dotchin, Mrs B Ngozwana, The President and the Bishop of Lesotho.

36.5 The Bishop of the Diocese of South Eastern Transvaal reported that the Revd David Mills would not be able to present the Renew Programme due to the sudden death of his son.

The President proposed a motion of condolence be sent to him and his wife, conveyed by his Bishop.

NEW PROVINCIAL THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

Proposer: The Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman

Seconder: Mr H Bennett

Whereas the 1991 session of PSC resolved that:

- A. The two colleges of St Bede's and St Paul's be amalgamated;
- B. A new college with the provisional name of "Peter Masiza" College be formed;
- C. The new college be situated in the present campus of St Paul's College in Grahamstown;
- D. A new constitution be drawn up under the oversight of the Metropolitan to be presented at the next session of the Synod of Bishops for ratification by Provincial Synod in 1992; and

Whereas it is necessary that

- E. The Province commits itself to support the College fully;
- F. Provision should be made for candidates that are still in the process of formation at St Bede's and St Paul's Colleges;

and NOTING

G. that there have been some objections to the proposed name 'Peter Masiza College'

BE IT RESOLVED THAT :

 The new college to be named "The College of the Transfiguration" be established;

- 2. All property, assets and finances, and where necessary, liabilities belonging to St Paul's College, and where possible, assets, finances and liabilities belonging to St Bede's College, be transferred to the new College;
- 3. After the transfers referred to in 2 above have been completed, the Trust Deed of St Paul's College and that of St Bede's College, be terminated.
- 4. Ordinands that are still in the process of formation at St Bede's and St Paul's Colleges, be transferred to the new College;
- 5. The Provincial Standing Committee shall allocate funds annually to meet the stipends and allowances of the academic and administrative staff, on a formula to be agreed upon from time to time;
- 6. The Metropolitan of the CPSA shall be the visitor of the College;
- 7. The Metropolitan be respectfully requested to establish an Endowment fund for the College;
- 8. The principal object of the College shall be the formation of candidates for the ordained ministry, while not precluding other forms of ministry;
- 9. Candidates shall either be recommended by a Diocesan Bishop of the CPSA or approved by the Visitor;
- 10. All property belonging to the College shall be vested in the Board of Trustees of the CPSA as Trustees of the College;
- 11. There shall be a College Council which shall consist of the following:
 - 11.1 A chairperson who shall be a member of and 'appointed by the Synod of Bishops and who shall have a casting vote as well as an ordinary one;
 - 11.2 The Visitor
 - 11.3 The Bishop of Grahamstown;

- 11.4 3 Bishops elected by the Synod of Bishops and 8 persons elected by Provincial Synod who shall hold office for three years and who shall be eligible for re-appointment. If a member fails to attend three consecutive meetings without apology, his or her membership shall automatically fall away. Vacancies on the Council shall be filled by PSC until the next session of Provincial Synod;
- 11.5 The Rector of the College;
- 11.6 One staff member elected annually by the College staff and one student elected annually by the student body;
- 12. The functions of the Council shall be:
 - 12.1 To manage and control the finances and assets of the College;
 - 12.2 To ensure that provision is made for academic, administrative and domestic staff for the College;
 - 12.3 To set a proper salary scale and allowances for the staff and to establish a budget for staffing requirements as well as their terms of employment;
 - 12.4 To deal with matters referred to it by Provincial Synod, PSC, and the Synod of Bishops;
 - 12.5 To formulate bye laws subject to approval by PSC for:
 - 12.5.1 The appointment and dismissal of the academic, administrative and domestic staff of the College, their terms of employment and the authority of the Rector in regard thereto;
 - 12.5.2 The control of the whole internal organization management and discipline of the College, as also the powers of the Rector in relation thereto;
 - 12.5.3 Such other matters relating to the conduct of the affairs of the College as may seem necessary to the College;

- 12.6 The Council shall have a right to amend the bye laws. All such amendments to bye laws shall be tabled for approval at the subsequent meeting of the Synod of Bishops, and upon approval thereof being given, they shall come into force forthwith.
- 13. The Council shall meet at least once a year.
 Notice in writing together with an Agenda Paper shall be sent by the Secretary to every member at least thirty days before such meeting. Further meetings of the Council may be summoned at the request of the Chairman, or of the Rector of the College, or of any three ordinary members of the Council:
- 14. A quorum of the Council shall be eight members;
- 15. The books of the College shall be audited annually by a firm of auditors appointed by the Council. A copy of audited accounts shall be sent to PSC, the Provincial Trusts Board, and members of the council;
- 16. The conditions of the employment of the Rector of the College shall be as follows:
 - 16.1 He shall be appointed by the Metropolitan with the approval of the Synod of Bishops;
 - 16.2 By virtue of his appointment, he shall be an Honorary Provincial Canon;
 - 16.3 The appointment of the Rector shall normally be for seven years, of which the first year shall be a probationary period. The confirmation of the Rector's permanent appointment shall be made by the Metropolitan with the approval of the Synod of Bishops;
 - 16.4 The appointment may be renewed by the Metropolitan with the approval of the Synod of Bishops after consultation with the Council, for further periods of up to three years at a time;
 - 16.5 Notwithstanding the provisions of 16.3 and 16.4 above, the Metropolitan and the Rector shall each have the right to give to the other of them at least three calendar month's notice in writing

terminating the appointment, provided that such notice shall take effect only at the end of a College term;

- 16.6 The Metropolitan with the consent of the Bishops of the Province may dismiss the Rector at any time, subject to the payment of three months' stipend and allowances in lieu of notice;
- 17. The functions of the Rector of the College shall be:
 - 17.1 The determination of the academic courses and all matters concerning the formation of ordination candidates and other forms of ministry, in consultation with the Advisory Board on Theological Education;
 - 17.2 The initiation and fostering of relationships with other Anglican and Ecumenical Colleges in Africa and elsewhere;
 - 17.3 Oversight of all aspects of College life;
 - 17.4 Acquisition or disposal of College property with the approval of the Council and the Provincial Trusts Board;
 - 17.5 Appointment and dismissal of staff with the approval of the Council;
 - 17.6 Submission of a budget and a statement of income and expenditure to the Council;
 - 17.7 Submission of an annual report of all aspects of College life;
- 18. The conditions of employment of the academic staff shall be as follows:
 - 18.1 They shall be appointed and dismissed by the Rector with the approval of the Council;
 - The appointment of academic staff shall normally be for five years, of which the first year shall be probationary. They may be re-appointed for periods of up to three years at a time;

- Notwithstanding the provisions of 18.2 above, the Rector and members of the teaching staff shall each have the right to give to the other at least three calendar months' notice in writing terminating the appointment, which notice shall take effect only at the end of a College term; and provided further that the Rector may dismiss a member of the teaching staff at any time, with the approval of the chairman of the Council, or in his absence, the Visitor, subject to the payment to him of three months' stipend and allowances in lieu of notice:
- 19. The Rector and the academic staff shall enter into written contracts with the Council;
- 20. The stipends and allowances of the Rector and other academic staff shall be paid according to the scale as shall be determined from time to time by the emoluments committee of PSC after consultation with the Council;
- 21. This Constitution may be amended by PSC or Provincial Synod or by the Council subject to the consent of the Synod of Bishops;
- 22. If for any reason the College shall be closed down, whether by decision of Provincial Synod, Synod of Bishops, PSC or otherwise, then the Council shall determine what shall happen to the assets of the College, but such decision shall be subject to the approval of the Metropolitan with the concurrence of PSC and the Provincial Trusts Board;
- Act X and Act XI in the Constitution and Canons of the Church of the Province of Southern Africa concerning the Constitution of St Paul's College and that of St Bede's College be deleted once all the assets and liabilities of each have been transferred to the new College as provided for in 2 above;
- 24. Clauses 1 22 with suitable editorial changes, be published as the Constitution of the New College.

Proposed by: The Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman Seconded by: Mr Henry Bennett

- 37.1 Debate was entered into
- 37.2 Synod broke for tea at 11h03.
- 37.3 Synod re-assembled at 11h35.

- Notices regarding the worship of Synod were given by the President and the Dean of the Province.
- 37.5 The Dean of the Province gave notice to Synod that 120 representatives and officers of Synod were invited by the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Swaziland to dinner on Saturday at 19hOU.

requests Provincial Standing Committee to make an annual block grant to Theological Education by Extension College on a formula to be agreed upon from time to time.

- 39.1 Debate on Agendum 35 was entered into.
- 39.2 The motion was put and carried without dissent.
- 40. The President notified Synod that during the afternoon he would be vacating the chair and the Dean of the Province would be taking the chair.
 - 40.1 Greetings were received from the Revd S Thelejane.
 - 40.2 The President announced that Grace before dinner would be said in Chapel after Evening Prayer.
 - 40.3 The Provincial Secretary/Treasurer informed Synod that the meeting of the Emoluments Committee was postponed.
 - 40.4 Synod sang grace.

MEASURE TO INTRODUCE A NEW ACT (OF ADVISORY BOARD ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. The formation or ordinands and newly ordained clergy is of vital significance in the life of the Province;
 - B. it is necessary that there should be co-ordination, guidance and direction on ministerial or priestly formation in the Province;
 - C. there are basic standards that are required in the preparation of Candidates for ordination as well as newly ordained Clergy;
 - D. it is necessary to keep abreast of theological thinking and developments in models of training, taking into account ecumenical developments in the field of theological education.

The Measure

Be it enacted that a New Act be introduced to read as follows:

- "1 There shall be a Provincial Advisory Board on Theological Education;
- 2 It shall consist of five persons who shall be elected by the Synod of Bishops for three years and who shall be eligible for re-election;"
- 3 Its functions shall be:
 - 3.1 To advise and act as a resource to Theological Colleges and Diocesan training Schemes on all aspects of ministerial formation in the Province;

- 3.2 To foster theological thinking within the Province;
- 3.3 To ensure that basic standards on ministerial formation are maintained throughout the Province.

After consultation with the Chancellor, the President informed Synod that Agendum 9 was not of a formal nature and therefore would have to be referred to the Committee of Synod.

- 42.2 Debate was entered into.
- 42.3 Notice was given of an amendment to the Proposals of Agendum 9 to be brought to Committee:

that a new 3.2 be inserted, with consequential re-numbering, as follows:

"3.2 To hold quinquennial inspection of the Colleges, Courses and Diocesan Training Schemes on behalf of the Synod Bishops with powers to enforce recommendations approved by the Synod of Bishops."

Proposed by: The Very Revd J Marcus Seconded by: The Revd Canon P Lenkoe

The President referred the amendment to the Committee of Synod.

- 42.4 The Principles were agreed and referred to the Committee of Synod as its fifth item of business.
- 43. AGENDUM 13 (Page 14 First Agenda Book)

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 25.8 (OF TENURE OF THE CLERGY)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. Clergy should be given an opportunity of being heard before a decision is taken to revoke a licence without offering other work:
 - B. This will accord with developments in the Common Law of South Africa, which requires that a person shall be heard before any action is taken against him, i.e. the audi alteram partem rule.

The Proposals

Be it enacted that :

After the word "course" in the second line of Canon 25.8 the following words be inserted: "after giving the said Clergyman an opportunity to be heard".

Seconded by : Mr Henry Bennett

- 43.1 Debate was entered into.
- 43.2 The motion was carried and referred to the Committee of Synod as its sixth item of business.
- 44. Mr Henry Bennett asked that the bishops kindly inform him of the number of licensed clergy in their dioceses on which the representation at Synod was based.

- 47. AGENDUM 14 (Page 13 First Agenda Book)

Proposed by: The Rt Revd A G Quinlan

Seconded by : Mr H Bennett

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 36 (OF THE TRIBUNALS OF THE CHURCH)

The Principle

- Whereas: A. Canon 25.6 and 25.8 are sometimes wrongly used for disciplinary purposes;
 - B. It is necessary to provide for an informal and expeditious manner of dealing with such matters, other than by way of a formal trial;
 - C. In doing so, all the rights and interest of the clergy must be preserved and protected, and the beneficial developments in the law relating to labour relations acknowledged (whether the Labour Relations act applies to clergy or not).

The Proposals

Be it enacted that:-

- 1. A new subheading be added to Canon 36.1 to 36.10 inclusive (as Canon 42) reading: "Of Formal Tribunals".
- A new subsection under the heading "Of Informal Tribunals" be added as follows:
 - "11. Without derogating from the provisions of Canon 39, 40 and 41, a Diocesan Bishop, if he has reason to believe that a cleric is guilty of any of the offences referred to in Canon 37, Section 1 sub-paragraphs (a) to (j) inclusive, shall have the power to summon the Priest or Deacon to appear before him.
 - 12. In summoning the cleric, the Bishop shall notify him or her in writing of the charge which he or she is required to answer to.

- 13. At the hearing before the Bishop, the charge shall be put to the cleric by the Bishop, together with evidence supporting the charge, and the cleric shall be given an opportunity to be heard.
- 14. The Bishop, having heard the cleric, may after pastoral ministration, if such appears to be appropriate to the Bishop, suspend the cleric from office pending a decision by the Bishop on the charge against him or her, subject to the provisions of Section 17 below.
- 15. The Bishop, having considered the cleric's reply to the charge brought against him or her, shall have the power to dismiss the charge or find the cleric guilty of the charge. In the event of the Bishop finding the cleric guilty of the offence, the Bishop may either:
 - 15.1 issue a formal admonition;
 - 15.2 suspend the cleric from office for a period not exceeding two years; or
 - 15.3 revoke the Letters or Licence of the cleric upon the expiration of not less than three months' notice, or alternatively forthwith against payment of three months' stipend and allowances in lieu of notice, unless the charge of which the cleric is found guilty is so serious that it would ground summary dismissal in common law, in which event no notice or payment need be given or made.
- 16. The Bishop shall notify the cleric in writing of his decision, and within seven days of the cleric being so notified, he or she shall, if the sentence is either suspension or revocation, be entitled to appeal to the to the Metropolitan (or if the Metropolitan be the Bishop concerned, to the Dean of the Province), who shall decide, upon review, whether or not the proposed suspension or revoction shall take effect. Alternatively thereto, the cleric shall be entitled by notice in writing to the Bishop within seven days of the Bishop's said notification, to require the charge alleged against him or her to be dealt with under Canon 39 read with Canon 37.
- 17. If the cleric elects to take the matter to review or requires it to be dealt with under Canon 39 read with Canon 37, any suspension under Section 14 above

shall continue until the final determination of the matter. If no such suspension is in force at the time of the cleric's election, then the Bishop shall have the power to suspend the cleric from office pending the final determination."

- 47.1 Synod entered into debate on Agendum 14.
- 47.2 Permission was granted for a television crew to film and record in the Synod Hall.
- 47.3 The Proposer and Seconder accepted an amendment to insert the word "just" after the word "informal" in line 1 of Principle B of Agendum 14.

The Amendment became part of the substantive motion.

- 47.4 The Principle was carried with one dissenting vote and referred to the Committee of Synod as its seventh item of business.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 42.8(b) (OF TRUSTS)

The Principle

- Whereas: A. The investments which the Provincial Trusts' Board and (hence a Diocesan Trusts'Board) is allowed to make in terms of Canon 42 11(b) are limited to those described in Canon 42.8.
 - B. Canon 42.8 makes no provision for funds to be deposited with reputable Banks or Building Societies on call, fixed deposit or in any other secure recognised deposits.
 - C. Many Trusts are already making such investments.

The Proposal

Be it enacted that :

- 1. A new sub-paragraph numbered (iv) and reading: "in Banks and Building Societies" be added after Canon 42.8(b) after sub-paragraph(iii).
- The proviso (final paragraph) to Canon 42.8 be amended by deleting "(i) and (ii)" and adding "(i),(ii) and (iv)".
- 48.1 Synod entered into debate on Agendum 15.
- 48.2 The Principle was voted on and carried, and referred to the Committee of Synod as its eighth item of business.

49. AGENDUM 16 (Page 15 - First Agenda Book)

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 46 (OF THE PROVINCIAL PENSION FUND)

The Principle

- Whereas: A. There already exists, amongst the members of the Provincial Pension Fund, women who have been ordained to the diaconate;
 - B. the rules of the Fund as contained in Canon 46 refer to members only as "clergymen"; it is necessary to amend the wording of the Canon so as to include proper reference to members of both genders;
 - C. for actuarial purposes the dates of birth of new entrants to membership of the Fund are required.

The Proposal

Be it enacted in Canon 46 that:

- The words "clergymen" be replaced (as appropriate) with the words "member" or "cleric" or "clergy";
- 2. The words "or she" and "or her" be added to the words "he" and "his" respectively;
- 3. By the substitution of the word "widow" for the words "surviving spouse";

save that these amendments shall not apply to Section 32 of the canon which relates to Widows' and Orphans' Fund which does not require alteration in terms of the principle stated above.

- 49.1 Discussion followed as to the desirability of dividing the Principle, in the light of the coming debate on Agendum 20. Synod decided that the whole measure be taken.
- The Provincial Secretary/Treasurer drew Synod's attention to the fact that one of the proposals had been omitted and from the Agenda Book, an additional paragraph 4 was included as follows:
 - 4. that Section 31 (d) be amended by the deletion of all the words after "of" in line 3 and the substitution of the words "birth, of ordination and of entry to membership."

and while the structural inequalities of society in southern Africa make it unlikely that the effects of the above will be overcome in the short-term;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT THIS PROVINCIAL SYNOD

requests that the government of South Africa implement - as a matter of urgency - a school feeding scheme for all primary schools that are in need of such assistance.

This assistance should include children of refugees and could be carried out by educational departments as well as church and charitable agencies.

This should be seen as a mark of commitment to the future of South Africa.

BASIC HUMAN RIGHTS FOR FARM WORKERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

That this Synod

1. Notes with distress the plight of farm workers and their families who suffer from an extreme lack of basic human rights and that this cruel state of affairs makes a mockery of Government claims to have "closed the book on apartheid".

2. Calls on the Government to

- 2.1 include farm workers under the provisions of the Labour legislation in a form which ensures that basic justice is established and protected;
- 2.2 abolish the harsh and inhuman provisions of the Prevention of Illegal Squatting and Trespass Acts which give power to farmers to turn the rural poor into homeless criminals, virtually overnight;

2.3 intervene and halt all evictions, until laws and administrative procedures are in place to ensure that farm workers who live on farms with their families have some security of tenure and are provided with a place to live in dignity.

3. respectfully requests the Metropolitan to

- 3.1 seek a meeting with the State President, to enable a delegation of church leaders and experts involved in these issues, to discuss the matters raised in this resolution;
- 3.2 inform, with the help of involved church leaders and experts, representatives of foreign governments concerning the need to address the serious lack of human rights suffered by rural black people in rural areas in South Africa.
- 58.1 Debate was entered into.
- An amendment to Motion 32 was proposed: 'that the words "in South Africa" be inserted between the words "families" and "who" in line 1

and further that the words "South African" be inserted before "Government" in the heading in Paragraph 2.

This was accepted by the proposer and seconder - the amendment became part of the substantive motion.

58.3 A further amendment was proposed by Mrs E Davis, seconded by the Revd N Charton, as follows:

"The addition at the end of paragraph 1 of a comma, followed by 'and that this cruel system has led to many broken and debilitated people".

and

The insertion of a new paragraph 2.2, with subsequent re-numbering, to read "start an extensive programme of social development."

- An amendment was proposed by The Revd V Spencer and seconded by Mr D Holden that: "after the word 'priests' in line 2 of paragraph 1. be inserted the words 'and bishops.'"
- 62.4 Debate on the amendment was entered into.
- 62.5 Synod retired for tea at 11h03.
- 62.6 Synod re-assembled at 11h34.
- 62.7 The President, on behalf of Synod, asked the Ven A Soares to take to the singing group from the Church in Angola, a gift of R1170.02 for the purchase of a guitar. Synod stood to applaud the group as the gift was presented.
- 62.8 Synod was given information by the Bishop of George and the Dean of the Province as to the admissibility, or otherwise, of the proposed amendment to Agendum 19.
- 62.9 The proposer of the amendment asked the permission of Synod to withdraw his amendment. Synod agreed to its withdrawal.
- 62.10 Notice was given by the Very Revd R Briggs of a further amendment which would specify the exclusion of ordination of women to the episcopate from Agendum 19, which he intended to move at a later stage.
- 62.11 Debate on agendum 19 was resumed.
- 62.12 At 12h03 Synod stood for silent prayer after which the President led Synod in a Litany of the Holy Spirit.
- 62.13 The debate was continued.
- 62.14 The debate was adjourned for lunch.
- 62.15 The President suggested that the lunch time be kept in a spirit of prayer and that members should try to be quieter than usual during this time.

The President gave thanks to God for Synod's careful listening during the debate so far.

- 62.16 Greetings were received from the Society of St Francis at Little Portion friary in New York.

 The community at St Paul's College, Grahamstown, also sent greetings assuring Synod of its prayer that a spirit of unity would be maintained during today's debate.
- 62.17 Synod adjourned for lunch at 13h01.
- 62.18 Synod resumed at 14h32.
- 62.19 The President asked Synod to agree that the time allotted for speakers on Agendum 19 be reduced to 5 minutes.

 Synod agreed.
- 62.20 The debate on Agendum 19 was resumed.
- 62.21 An amendment to the motion was proposed.

Proposed by : Mr M Ellis

Seconded by : The Revd R Butterworth

"That the second paragraph be amended by the addition at its end of, 'and further requests that protective legislation be approved by this Synod. Until the church has received this approval no women should be ordained to the priesthood.'"

- 62.22 The President informed Synod that the Bishops of George and Bloemfontein had been asked to investigate the protection mentioned in the legislation. The Bishop of Bloemfontein spoke briefly about the investigation.
- 62.23 The amendment was put and lost.
- 62.24 The debate returned to Agendum 19.
- 62.25 The Rt Revd R G Cuthbertson proposed and the Revd V Spencer seconded that the "motion be now put". The President called Synod to silent prayer after which this was put and carried.
- 62.26 The reply to the debate by the mover of Agendum 19 was deferred until after tea.

- 62.27 The Dean of the Province formally requested that the vote on Agendum 19 be by orders.
- 62.28 Synod retired for tea at 15h36.
- 62.29 Synod resumed at 16h04.
- 62.30 The mover of Agendum 19 replied to the debate.
- 62.31 The President informed Synod that the vote would be by orders and explained the procedure for such a vote.
 - 62.31.1 Members would stand in their places and the green or red voting cards (signifying "for" or "against" the motion) would be collected by the scrutineers (supervised by the Chancellor). After a card had been received, the member would sit.
 - 62.31.2 The President informed visitors to Synod, as well as the Sisters praying for Synod, that they could remain in the chamber while voting proceeded.
- 62.32 The President called Synod to prayer.
- 62.33 Those abstaining were given one minute to leave the chamber.
- 62.34 The house of Laity voted:

for 75 against 14

The motion was carried in the house of Laity.

62.35 The House of Clergy voted:

for 70 against 25

The motion was carried in the house of clergy.

62.36 The House of Bishops voted :

for 21 against 6

The motion was carried in the House of Bishops.

62.37 Those who abstained were invited to return.

- The President announced the result to the whole 62.38 of Synod: 211 members voted, 166 in favour and 45 against. The President declared that Agendum 19 had been carried in all three houses, and, being a controversial motion, was approved by more than two-thirds of those voting.
- 62.39 The President called Synod to prayer and offered prayers of thanksgiving to God as well as prayers of concern for those hurt by Synod's decision.
- The President called on Synod to say the "Te 62.40 Deum" in thanksgiving for God's continual uniting of His church, and not in a spirit of triumph. The "Te Deum" was then said.
- 62.41 The President stressed that no bishop would be compelled to ordain anyone he did not choose to ordain. The President gave praise to God that Synod was more united now than when the vote was taken at the previous Synod.
- 62.42 The President vacated the chair, delegating his office to the Dean of the Province. President left the chamber at 16h52.
- At 16h53 the Dean of the Province took the chair. 62.43 He commented on the Metropolitan's great leadership and depth of spirituality.

- 63.1 The Printing Committee was asked to examine the punctuation of Agendum 20.
- 63.2 After some questions about the motion, the motion was put and carried.
- 64. AGENDUM 17 (Page 16 First Agenda Book)

Proposed by : The Bishop of Pretoria

Seconded by : Mr H. Bennett

MEASURE TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE XXIV (5) (DEFINITION OF CLERGY)

The Principles

- Whereas: A. It is desirable for those Dioceses wishing to do so to proceed to the ordination of suitably qualified women to the priesthood;
 - B. It is desirable to avoid confusion relating to the interpretation of the Constitution in this regard.

The Proposals

Be it enacted that:

- In Article XXIV section 5, the words "male or female" be inserted after the words "all persons" in line 2.
- 2. At the end of Article XXIV, section 5, the following words be added:
 - ".....and all references to clergy, priests and clerical or priestly offices in the Constitution of this Church, the Canons, the Rubrics in the Book of Common Prayer and other Formularies of the Church shall be interpreted inclusively to mean men or women".
- 64.1 Questions were asked about the interpretation of the Measure.
- 64.2 The mover replied to the questions.
- 64.3 The Principle was approved and referred to the Committee of Synod as its tenth item of business.
- 65. There were no petitions.
- 66. Notice of motions.

66.1 MOTION OF GREETING

That this Synod thanks God for the life, work and witness of Regie Mbelle OSC and sends its condolences to Emma and family, assuring them of our love and prayers.

The motion was put and carried unanimously.

Proposed by: Mother Monica Mary CSJB Seconded by: The Bishop of Umzimvubu

September is the month when all churches in the CPSA are requested to pray for vocations to the religious life. We make a plea to this effect.

66.2.1 The Dean noted that the motion required some modification. The motion was referred to Synod Advisory Committee.

66.3 MOTION ARISING FROM THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE

Proposed by: The Revd T M T Mncube

Seconded by : The Bishop of Johannesburg

That this Synod

Respectfully requests this Synod to call on the F W De Klerk Government for :

- A moratorium on arrests for 'squatting', evictions and demolitions of existing dwellings and removals.
- 2. Amendment of the Squatting Act as to afford the homeless assistance rather than persecution.
- Adoption of effective urban land and housing policies which direct state resources to helping the poorest households. Every household should be able to afford at least a serviced site.
- 4. Acceptance of the principle of unified, non-racial local authorities.

- 5. More effective steps by employers to assist their workers with obtaining shelter.
- 66.3.1 The Dean of the Province noted that only points 1 5 of 66.3 made up the motion which would be referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

Whereas the Archbishop in his charge reminded Provincial Synod of the impending catastrophe facing our region of southern Africa as a consequence of the AIDS pandemic and of the plight of people living with HIV/AIDS

and

Whereas the Provincial Synod of 1989 requested the formation of a Provincial Task Force.

Be it resolved that

- 1. Synod respectfully requests the Metropolitan to urge the Provincial AIDS Task Force to communicate to the dioceses of the Province any progress it has made in meeting its mandate.
- 2. That the dioceses of the Province report to the Provincial AIDS Task Force what they have achieved in the areas of ministry and education with regard to HIV/AIDS and that such information be made available to all the Dioceses of the Province by the Provincial AIDS Task Force.
- 66.4.1 The motion was referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

66.5 MOTION ARISING FROM THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE

Proposed by: The Ven J Hughes

Seconded by: The Bishop of St Mark the

Evangelist

This Synod

Noting the Archbishop's call for greater communication in the Province

Believing

- (i) that one of the poorest areas of communication is in the area of vacant parishes
- (ii) that matching the right clergy to parishes is important for the health and life of the church.
- iii) that this is best effected by the widest possible dissemination of information about such parishes to clergy in the Province.
- (iv) that the Province is strengthened and invigorated by the right movement of clergy between dioceses.

Requests that a list of available parishes in all dioceses should be disseminated to the clergy in the Province on a regular and timely basis.

Requests the Bishops to draw up a protocol to be followed in cases of clergy wishing to apply for such vacant parishes.

The motion was referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

66.6 MOTION ARISING FROM THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE

Proposed by: The Revd C Matsinhe Seconded by: The Bishop of Lebombo

That this Synod

1. Noting the effects of drought in the countries of the Province and beyond and the possible lasting effect thereof

and

2. Noting the non-existence of an Anglican Body which would administer resources to meet crises immediately or to address social needs:

and

- 3. Believing that Anglicans world-wide have resources and are willing to release them for the relief of the suffering people of God, if credible channels can be found,
- (i) Requests the Anglican Consultative Council to establish a Pan-Anglican Body to collect, in time, resources and administer them whenever and wherever necessary to relieve suffering and promote human dignity. Such a body could be called Anglicare or any other suitable name.
- (ii) In order to enable people to become good stewards of nature, this Synod calls upon the Dioceses to draw guidelines to be shared with Governments at all levels and other humanitarian bodies, related to ecological issues whose lack of knowledge might have contributed to the present drought.
- (iii) Recalling that in many countries of Africa, the church has been the guardian and teacher of better, traditional and modern methods of agriculture and noting that in recent years the churches seem to be withdrawn from this function, that this Synod calls upon dioceses and parishes
 - (a) to take practical steps to reintroduce in their life the important task of providing agricultural skills, traditional and modern, to all people desiring them.
 - (b) to be the voice of the voiceless in regard to ownership of land and related issues especially in those areas where people are being deprived and cheated of their land.

The motion was referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

67. MINUTES

The Chairman of the Minute Scrutineering Committee gave his report. He recommended, due to the fact that only one copy of the minutes had been posted, that any further acceptance of the minutes be delayed.

Synod agreed.

68. The Very Revd R Briggs asked that the proposers and seconders of Agenda 37, 38, 47, 48, 50, meet with him

when Synod adjourned this evening in an attempt to conflate their agenda.

- 69. The Provincial Secretary/Treasurer informed Synod that the cards used in voting on Agendum 19 could be collected from him before the first session of Synod tomorrow.
- 70. The Dean of the Province informed Synod that the Emoluments Committee would meet at 20h00 in the Staff Room.
- 71. The Committee of Synod would meet at 20h00 in the Chamber and its business would be the measures dealing with the Tenure and discipline of Clergy, the Advisory Board on Theological Education and the Pensions and Trusts' Board.
- 72. Discussion followed on the advisability of Synod meeting on Sunday afternoon to allow for members of Synod to do shopping on Monday afternoon. Synod rejected the suggestion and decided to meet at the times laid down in the Order Paper.
- 73. Announcements were made in regard to the arrangements for the following morning's worship.

74. ASKING AND ANSWERING OF QUESTIONS

Due to pressure of time, this item was carried over until the following day.

75. Synod adjourned at 18h09.

SATURDAY 15 AUGUST 1992

76. 06h30 Morning Prayer 07h00 Eucharist 08h00 Breakfast 09h00 Bible Study

- 77. Synod resumed at 10h00.
 - 77.1 The President read from scripture. The "Veni, Creator Spiritus," was sung in English, the "Kyries" were sung in Greek and the President led the members of Synod in prayer.
 - 77.2 The Provincial Registrar declared that a quorum was present.
 - 77.3 Synod members were asked to collect their voting cards.
- 78. The President addressed Synod, paying tribute to a number of women deacons ministering in the Province and expressed his feelings about the vote on Agendum 19 and his concern for those who voted against the motion.

78.1 MOTION OF GREETING

Proposed by: The President

Seconded by: The Dean of the Province

That this Synod salutes with deep appreciation and gratitude the theological integrity and the devotion to, and love for, Our Lord as well as the dedication to Catholic truth, belief, tradition and spirituality of those in the CPSA who oppose the ordination of women to the priesthood; and assures them that there is a cherished place for them in His church, which would be impoverished without them.

The motion was put, and Synod agreed.

In response to remarks made by Fr D Wells SSM, Synod rose to give the President a standing ovation for the way in which he presided over the debate on Agendum 19 and for his sensitivity to all concerned.

- 79. The President proposed that the report of the Committee of Synod be first business after tea. Synod agreed.
 - 79.1 The President welcomed the Provincial Executive Officer, the Revd Rowan Smith, who had been sick.

80. AGENDUM 53 (Page 31 - 2nd Agenda Book)

PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Revd Rowan Smith proposed that the report of the Provincial Standing Committee be received. Seconded by the Bishop of Johannesburg.

1. Introduction

In terms of Canon 43 Section 5 (g) Provincial Standing Committee is to report on its work to each session of Provincial Synod and to make such recommendations as it may think fit.

2. Meetings

PSC has had meetings each year in September, since the last session of Provincial Synod, under the chairmanship of the Metropolitan. The Metropolitan has often shared this role as chairperson with others.

3. Synod of Bishops

There is a close working together between the Synod of Bishops and PSC and the September meeting of PSC is usually preceded by the Synod of Bishops meeting in the same venue.

4. Commissions

Arising out of the last Provincial Synod a Committee of the Synod of Bishops has carried on the discussion on the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. This has resulted in two major conferences

- (i) Women's Conference on Ministry held at St Francis, Waterkloof in February 1991. Women from the whole Province participated in this conference;
- (ii) Conference on the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood at the same venue in March 1992.

Each diocese was invited to send five participants, representing various points of view.

A Committee of the Synod of Bishops has also been looking at Provincial Structures and the role of the P.I.M. Committee together with that of the Provincial Resource team.

5. Administration

5.1 Provincial Executive Officer

In the period under review there has been a change in this office. The Revd Canon Winston Ndungane, went on a year's sabbatical from September 1990 and in the absence of a deputy, the Chaplain to the Archbishop, the Revd Rowan Smith, was asked to stand in. Canon Ndungane was elected Bishop of Kimberley and Kuruman on 14 June 1991, shortly after his return to South Africa and Fr Smith was invited to fill the position, effectively from 1 July 1991.

The P.E.O. is Secretary of P.S.C. and is responsible for a number of other aspects of our Provincial life, yet there is no deputy - either as assistant or under-study. In addition to responsibilities within the Province relating to Synod of Bishops, Provincial Synod, Elections, Consecrations and Enthronement of Bishops, there are those matters concerning the Anglican Communion and for our Province presently the hosting arrangements for ACC9 and Primates meeting in January 1993. Fortunately for this last, Bishop Njongonkulu continues as chairperson on the Cape Town based Planning Committee.

5.2 Provincial Secretary & Treasurer

Mr S N Colam continues as Provincial Secretary Treasurer having had his contract extended just recently, after his first five years at the helm of our financial administration. As P.S.T., Mr Colam acts as Secretary and Treasurer of the Provincial Trusts Board; Treasurer of the Provincial Pensions Board; Treasurer of the Provincial Standing Committee, the Common Provincial Fund and the Augmentation of Stipends Fund as well as Accountant to the Provincial Resource Team.

As part of the support group for the P.S.T., PSC recommended and the Archbishop appointed Prof Geoff Everingham as Provincial Bursar.

6. Provincial Resource Team

Since the last Provincial Synod a phasing out of Departments has taken place along with the description director and in its place there has arisen the Provincial Resource Team. Reports have been made each year to Provincial Standing Committee which

decided at its meeting in September 1990 that no further appointments be made for the present to the PRT. (Min 56.1.1 - 56.1.5). This matter has been under review by the Synod of Bishops and PSC 1991. Since the last Provincial Synod the following departments and projects have been closed:

- (i) Training for Ministries
- (ii) Youth
- (iii) SEEK
 - (iv) Human Development Project
 - (v) Media Workshop

Those who were present at PSC in 1990 know the agony involved in agreeing to the closure of these various projects. In a number of cases it was decided not to fill these PRT positions which had become vacant and it was left to the P.I.M. Co-ordinating Committee to work out how best to continue the valuable work which had been done.

6.1 This Provincial Synod needs to place on record its appreciation of the following:

6.1.1 Training for Ministries

The Revd Edgar Ruddock was responsible for this work until his return to the United Kingdom at the end of 1990. The Archbishop at the September 1990 PSC paid particular tribute to Edgar and his wife Annette for all they had given to the Province through the Department of Training for Ministries.

6.1.2 Youth

Mr Larry Parsons emigrated to Australia soon after the last Provincial Synod and for a while the work was superbly co-ordinated by the Secretary of the Department Ms Nalane Moodley who worked from Durban. At the PSC of 1990 it was resolved that a Provincial Youth Synod be held in 1991 making use of the Anglican Students Federation structures and the youth structures in the Diocese of George. After a Youth Conference in George, where a Provincial Youth structure was set up, the Provincial Youth Synod took place in Bellville in December 1991.

6.1.3 **SEEK**

Mr Mike Phalatse served as Editor of SEEK until its closure, by a resolution of PSC 1990. From the report to last Provincial Synod, it was obvious that SEEK was not a paying proposition as only 6,000 of 10,800 copies produced were sold each month in the entire Province. There was no doubt that some drastic action needed to be taken even though it has meant that as a Province, we have been in a "wilderness" situation with barely adequate communication in so vast an area. We express gratitude to Mike for his work as Editor.

CPSA News can only be an interim measure and as a Province, we can not afford not to keep our people informed of what is taking place in the various dioceses with a variety of experiences.

- 6.1.4 The Media Project under the leadership of Ms Maggie Helass came to an end when the project was concluded as did the Human Development Project under Mr Paul Cranshaw and Ms Lulama Dumezweni. Mention is made of these projects in the Mission Institute report. Tribute was paid at the PSC meetings in 1990 and 1991 to the staff who had been involved in these projects and PSC was asked to keep development issues on its agenda.
- 6.1.5 Theological Colleges - An opportunity for discussing the future and purpose of our colleges will arise during the course of this Synod. The PSC in 1991 decided on the closure of St Bede's and St Paul's and the establishment of a new college on the campus at Grahamstown. Attention will have to be given to Lelapa La Jesu and to our future participation in FEDSEM. The whole issue of theological training is in the melting pot and a number of dioceses have local training schemes for those called to the ordained ministry. We are enormously thankful to all those who have served us in the various colleges and give thanks to God for their commitment.
- 6.2.6 Mission The Revd Mike McCoy continues as resource person for Mission. At the last PSC (1991) it was decided to accept a new

development, reflecting changes in the Province, so that Mike now heads up the Anglican Mission Institute. Provincial Synod will be asked to affirm the change which has taken place.

In the same period, the A.M.I. has moved its office to Cape Town with Mrs Lynette Crosbie continuing in a new capacity in Johannesburg i.e. as serving the Provincial Secretariat. In October 1990, Mike McCoy produced a resource book, "Good News People: Anglicans and the Decade of Evangelism" which is now being used even beyond the Province.

6.2.7 Justice & Reconciliation

Under the continuing direction of Mrs Emma Mashinini, the work of the J & R has made tremendous strides in the Province. Emma Mashinini continues to inspire and represent the CPSA beyond the bounds of our Province and is engaged in areas outside of Church structures. On behalf of the Province Emma has been involved in issues relating to:

- 1. Refugees and Returnees
- 2. Drought in Southern Africa
- 3. Population Growth
- 4. Defence Amendment Bill
- 5. AIDS
- 6. Education for Democracy
- 7. Empowering for Reconciliation and Justice a programme which needs the wide support of the Church.

Mrs Mashinini has been assisted by the Revd Earl Neil of ECUSA on a number of these issues. A very successful conference for all J & R workers was held in February 1992.

6.2.8 Institute for Christian Spirituality

The Institute reports to P.S.C. and is also part of the Provincial Resource Team. Since the last session of Synod, the work of the Institute has grown under the leadership of Dr Francis Cull.

The main thrust of the Institute is towards enabling individuals to develop an "Authentic Spirituality" i.e. one that draws from their own experience and takes account of the socio-political setting. Two conferences have been held, drawing clergy and laity from all over the Province and plans are in hand for the third annual conference to be held in Modderpoort in February 1993. The Institute sees itself as enabling dioceses to set up their own programmes and to be available wherever needed.

A very useful resource produced by a member of the Institute, Sergio Milandri, is a book entitled 'Yes to Myself', to assist those who have done the Foundation Course.

7. Committees and Organizations

PSC has received annual reports from its Committees and Organizations and has made grants to some of them to facilitate their work.

7.1 Radio and T.V. Committee

Bishop Peter Lee has succeeded Bishop John Ruston as Liaison Bishop with the SABC. At its meeting in 1990, PSC appointed an SABC Advisory Committee governed by linguistic needs.

7.2 Provincial Afrikaans Committee

Bishop Edward MacKenzie has succeeded Bishop George Swartz as chairman of the committee which continues to promote the Lent Book by Bishop Leslie Stradling, Neem en Lees and a Parish Calender.

7.3 PIM Co-ordinating Committee

The membership of the Committee has changed over the period under consideration, largely because the P.R.T. was an important component and because of changes decided by PSC relating to its composition. The P.I.M. Committee meets annually to receive reports and review the work of the Provincial Resource Team which also includes Publishing, CPSANET, Stewardship, and Theological Education. In addition, the P.I.M. Funding Committee, constituted by PSC meets, usually in October, to decide on disbursement of funds for various diocesan projects.

- 7.4 Missions to Seamen The work of Missions to Seamen in the Province continues to expand under the episcopal guidance of the Bishop of Bloemfontein. More and more the work of the Mission has continued its ecumenical dimension and the outreach is not only to seafarers from a Christian background, thus the Mission becomes involved in the Decade of Evangelism.
- 7.5 Publishing Committee Now that the Anglican Prayer Book has been launched the Publishing Committee has been looking at supplementary material and hopes to publish soon books relating to the family, parish and bishops along with the biographies of saints under the heading 'Saints and Seasons' some of which featured in the 1975 Minister's Book.

The Province owes a great deal to the Revd Cynthia Botha, who as Secretary of the Committee is also responsible for the distribution of publications.

7.6 Council for Religious Life - Since the last session of Provincial Synod, Fr Kingston Erson C.R. has become secretary of the Council and Bishop Edward MacKenzie is the Episcopal representative. Bishop Leslie Stradling continues to serve the council as chairman and Mother Monica Mary C.S.J.B. has replaced Sr Josephine S.P.B as representative at PSC and Provincial Synod.

The Council continues to give assistance to Communities beyond our Province notably in Madagascar while continuing to encourage the Sisterhood of St Paul in Maputo. The prayer of the Council is for the establishment of indigenous Communities in South Africa and the growth of the Religious Life in our Province.

A recent cause of celebration was the Centenary of the Community of the Resurrection (Turfontein) which was observed in joyous solemnity with a Eucharist in St Mary's Cathedral, Johannesburg, at which the Archbishop presided, assisted by his brother bishops, and the preacher was Archbishop Walter Makhulu of the Province of Central Africa. We owe a great deal to all our Communities.

7.7 Mothers' Union: Christian Family Life. - Mrs Joan Beddy has become Provincial President of Mothers Union in succession to Mrs Susan Higginson. The Mothers' Union has been working hard to raise the awareness of the whole church that its concerns includes 'the family life' and thus its interests are broader than usually understood. At a recent Provincial Council, therefore, two new Portfolios were established: AIDS

- Ministry to Victims and their Families and Young Families. The Central (World) President of M.U., Mrs Pat Harris visited the Province, which included attendance at the M.U. Provincial Council in October 1991, as well as spending time in Mozambique. This visit was a great encouragement to the members and especially the Diocesan Workers.

The work of the M.U. is often under estimated or even dismissed, yet many congregations would be the poorer for their absence.

7.8 Anglican Women's Fellowship - Since the last Synod, Mrs Jenny Frye has succeeded Mrs Pat Gorvalla as Provincial President. The particular aim of Mrs Frye is consolidation of membership and the enhancing of the ministry of women in the Church.

While membership has increased in some areas, it is sad to report the ... "White" membership has decreased substantially due to lack of interest..."

The work of AWF is as diversified as its members and parish groups are encouraged to become involved in local community groups. The President was able to attend the Worldwide Anglican Encounter in Brazil and in this received support from Mothers' Union - a sign of continuing co-operation between the two groups. Ecumenical contact includes involvement in the Women's World Day of Prayer and C.U.C. Women's Committee.

Along with the rest of the Communion, A.W.F. members are encouraged to be involved in the Decade of Evangelism and one diocese has had a training weekend for its members.

- 7.9 Provincial Stewardship Committee The work of the Committee in the CPSA has been:
 - 7.9.1 Training and teaching God's people in

Stewardship and Giving.

7.9.2 Being a prophetic voice in the CPSA in respect of its own Stewardship.

Thus in 1991, a Seminar on Stewardship was held in the diocese of Bloemfontein and two Seminars in Namibia. In 1992, a Seminar has been held in the diocese of Christ the King and later this year a further Seminar in the diocese of St Mark the Evangelist.

While giving thanks to God for all the resources of people, money, buildings and property, the Committee calls on the CPSA to reflect on ways of using more effectively the bountiful gifts of God.

7.10 Provincial Archivist - The Province is grateful to all the hard work of Mrs Anne Kotze, the Provincial Archivist, who herself believes that we should pay particular tribute to Mrs Anna Cunningham, our Curator of Manuscripts at Wits University, while also expressing appreciation for the encouragement of Prof. Reuben Musiker, who has retired recently as head of the library department there.

A number of researchers use the CPSA Central Record Library, which includes work for Master's degrees and Doctorates.

A particular concern of the Archivist is the failure of many parishes to keep a register of confirmations and burials, since those are not required under Canon 32, yet are essential from the point of view of researchers.

A Bibliography Report has been produced at the William Cullen Library at Wits University containing information on CPSA books and pamphlets.

8 Anglican Communion

Reports were received from Mrs Betty Govinden and Bishop Dinis Sengulane on the work of the A.C.C. and as a Province we have the honour of hosting ACC9 and Primates Meeting in Cape Town 17 - 31 January 1993. We also received reports on the Conference of Anglican Provinces in Africa.

9 Ecumenical

The involvement of the CPSA in the ecumenical movements needs to be reviewed. Reports are received by PSC On the SACC and CUC but it appears that our ardour has dimmed and we are less enthusiastic about the ecumenical schemes. The Province values the work of the SACC and Dr Frank Chikane in a rapidly changing society, we need to bear witness to our unity in Christ Jesus and work together with other churches in the process of reconstruction and reconciliation in Southern Africa.

- 80.1 After a number of corrections had been made, the report was received.
- 80.2 Questions arising out of the report were asked and answered.
- 80.3 There was discussion on the PSC 1991 resolution on 'A Weapons Free South Africa', which was not mentioned in the report.

Begin the next sentence with the word "Three" and continue to the end of the paragraph but within the sentence delete the words "Chairman, to" and substitute "chairperson, shall".

2. Bye-law 16

Delete all the words after "payable" and substitute the words "monthly in arrear and interest shall be charged on any late payments at a rate to be determined by the Finance Sub-Committee."

3. Bye-law 17

Delete all the words after "Treasurer" and substitute the words "not less than four months before the commencement of the meeting of Provincial Standing Committee at which the application is to be considered."

4. Bye-law 19

Delete the word "July" and substitute the word "May".

5. Bye-law 22

Before the words "Provincial Secretary" insert the word "Metropolitan or the". Delete the words "Provincial Registrar" and substitute the words "Provincial Accountant".

6. Bye-law 25

Delete the words "balance sheet" and substitute the word "report". Delete the date "30th June" and substitute the date "31st March".

86. AGENDUM 52 (Page 48 - Second Agenda Book)

1. CANON 42 (10)

In terms of Section 10 of Canon 42 The Provincial Trusts Board is required to lay before every Session of Provincial Synod:

- 1.1 Report of proceedings.
- 1.2 Return of Stock and Capital of every kind belonging to the Trusts under its direction.
- 1.3 Certified copy of minutes except such parts as contain mere matters of detail.

What follows is therefore presented on behalf of the Board in compliance with this Section.

2. PROCEEDINGS

2.1 CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARD

In terms of Canon 42 Section (2) the Board consists of the Metropolitan and other Diocesan Bishops and the Registrar of the Province (as ex officio members) together with one clerical and two lay members elected by their houses in the Provincial Synod plus one lay member nominated by the Provincial Pensions Board.

All the elected members hold office until the next session of Provincial Synod but in the event of a vacancy occurring in the members elected by Provincial Synod the Board is empowered to co-opt a replacement. The nominee of the Pensions Board may appoint an alternate to take his or her place at meeting of the Board but there is no provision for the Pensions Board to nominate a new lay member to fill any vacancy in its representation on the Board between sessions of Provincial Synod.

2.2 COMMISSARIES

In terms of Section 3 each Diocesan Bishop has the right to appoint a Commissary to attend Board meetings on his behalf and in practice this is what happens so that the Board is in reality constituted of a group of commissaries, who generally are persons well versed in business matters, together with the elected members.

2.3 SECRETARY AND TREASURER

The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board is the Provincial Secretary/Treasurer appointed from time to time by the Metropolitan in conjunction with the Board and Provincial Standing Committee.

3. MEETINGS

The Board meets three times annually to deal with a wide variety of business relating in particular to the investment of the trust funds placed under its care together with other matters of importance in the proper stewardship of the assets of the Church.

Prior to 30 June 1985 all trust funds and pension funds in the care of the Board were held in the Provincial Deposit Fund and the Provincial Pension Fund. Thereafter, although the Pension Fund has continued as a separate investment portfolio, the old Deposit Fund was divided into the new Provincial Deposit Fund and the Provincial Investment Fund. The latter is operated as a Unit Trust Fund giving its investors opportunities for capital growth as well as a cash return on their investments.

It is important to note that these Funds are restricted to Church participation only and no deposits or investments are accepted from the public.

The Unit Trust Fund has been a most successful innovation as reflected in the value of its units which have grown from R1 at inception to approximately R6 at the end of 1991.

Other matters of particular importance dealt with by the Board have included inter alia:

- 3.1 A decision that the rate of interest applicable to loans for the purchase and development of ecclesiastical property by Dioceses in terms of Section 8 (b) (iii) shall be not less than 12% per annum.
- 3.2 A decision that the proportion of investments in loans in terms of Section 8(b) (iii) shall not exceed 25% of the total investment held by Diocesan Trustees.

4. SUB - COMMITTEES

The Board has developed a modus operandi by which it works in the main through a number of sub-committees, each of which reports back to the full Board at its regular meetings.

4.1 <u>UAL LIAISON COMMITTEE</u>

This Committee meets regularly with the executives at UAL who are responsible for the management of the Church investment portfolios so that investment policies and decisions are kept under regular review.

4.2 AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Audit Committee is charged with responsibility for the review of the annual financial statements of the Province and all dioceses and it must be emphasized that this function is seen by the Board as of considerable importance in the fulfillment of the Board's canonical obligations as the ultimate owners of the assets of the Church.

The Audit Committee reports back to dioceses and on occasion finds it necessary to be critical of the standard and extent of diocesan record - keeping. This is not always

popular but the Committee tries to be constructive and is at all times available to give advice when asked to do so.

4.3 NATIONAL MONUMENTS COUNCIL LIAISON COMMITTEE

A very fruitful understanding has developed through the work of this Committee with representatives appointed by the National Monuments Council. As a result the Council has given an undertaking that no Church property will be declared a National Monument without reference first having been made to the Liaison Committee.

Through this liaison the church has much greater control over the fate of its historically important buildings and a fund of advice is available to dioceses on all matters related to the declaration of such buildings as national monuments.

4.4 INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

This Committee has responsibility for :

- (i) the granting of loans for the development of retirement housing.
- and (ii) the approval of rates of interest and dividends paid by the Deposit and Investment Funds to investors.

4.5 PROPERTY COMMITTEE

Some years ago it was resolved that Provincial Officers should where necessary be housed by the Province and the Property Committee (working within stipulated limits) has the responsibility for purchase and sale of such housing.

5. STOCK AND CAPITAL BELONGING TO THE PROVINCIAL PENSION FUND. THE PROVINCIAL DEPOSIT FUND AND THE PROVINCIAL INVESTMENT FUND.

Detailed portfolio statements, as at 30 June 1992, in respect of each of the Funds will be available for inspection at Provincial Synod, as will copies of the audited financial statements of the Funds.

6. MINUTES

The minute book, containing certified copies of the minutes of all the meetings of the Board since the previous session of Provincial Synod, will be available for inspection during the forthcoming session of the Synod.

7. ELECTION OF REPRESENTATIVES

The houses of clergy and laity are required (as indicated in para 2.1 above) to elect one clerical and two lay members of the Board. The present representatives of Synod are:

All are available for re-election at the discretion of Synod.

The Report was received by Synod.

- 86.1 Discussion was entered into.
- The President expressed his thanks to those who served on the Provincial Trusts Board as the Bishops' Commissaries.
- The President asked Synod to stand and express its appreciation to the Lay Officers of the Province.
- At 12h02 Synod stood for silent prayer and the President then led Synod in prayer for the church's mission.
- 86.5 The Discussion on Agendum 52 was concluded.
- 87. Synod agreed that the Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman present the report of the findings of the Select Committee on Agendum 18.

The report was as follows:

NB: Please note that there has been a consequential renumbering and the addition of a new paragraph 17.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT :

- 4. Bishops be requested to transfer ordinands that are still in the process of formation at St Bede's and St Paul's Colleges to the new College;
- 5. The Provincial Standing Committee shall allocate funds annually to meet the stipends and allowances of up to five academic staff including the Rector, on a formula to be agreed upon from time to time;
- 9. Students and candidates shall be either recommended by a Diocesan Bishop of the CPSA, a Bishop of another Anglican Province or approved by the Visitor;
- 11.4 Three bishops and four persons elected by the Synod of Bishops and four other persons elected by Provincial Synod who
 - persons elected by Provincial Synod who shall hold office for three years and who shall be eligible for re-appointment. In order to ensure continuity of membership, there shall be, in the first instance, one person elected for three years, one person elected for four years and two persons elected for five years. Membership of the council shall include women and persons with educational expertise. Vacancies on the Council shall be filled by PSC until the next session of Provincial Synod;

- 16.1 The Rector shall be appointed by the Metropolitan with the approval of the Synod of Bishops, after consultation with the Council:
- 16.2 By virtue of this appointment, the Rector shall be an Honorary Provincial Canon;
- 16.6 The Metropolitan, after consultation with the College Council and with the consent of the Bishops of the Province, may suspend or dismiss the Rector at any time, subject to the payment of three months' stipend and allowances in lieu of notice;
- 17. There shall be an Executive Committee of the Council consisting of :
 - 17.1 The Chairperson of the Council;
 - 17.2 The Rector of the College.
 - 17.3 Four other members of the Council appointed by the Council;
 - 17.4 A Quorum for the Executive shall be three members.
- 18.
- 18.1 The determination of the academic courses and all matters concerning the formation of ordination candidates and other forms of ministry in consultation with the Council, the staff and the Advisory Board on Theological Education;
- 18.5 Appointment or dismissal of staff with the approval of the Council as provided for in the Bye Laws of the Council;
- 18.6 Suspension of staff with the approval of the Chairperson or in the Chairperson's absence, the Visitor;

- 18.8 The submission of an annual report of all aspects of College life to the Council;
- 19.
- 19.1 They shall be provided with a mutually agreed job description in writing;
- 19.4 Notwithstanding the provisions of 19.2 above, the Rector and members of the teaching staff shall each have the right to give to the other at least three calendar months' notice in writing terminating the appointment, which notice shall take effect only at the end of a College term; and provided further that the Rector may dismiss a member of the teaching staff at any time, with the approval of the chairperson of the Council, or in the absence of the Chairperson, the Visitor, subject to the payment to him of three months' stipend and allowances in lieu of notice;

If for any reason the College shall be closed down, whether by decision of Provincial Synod, Synod of Bishops, Provincial Standing Committee or otherwise, then the Council shall determine what shall happen to the assets of the College, but such decision shall be subject to the approval of the Metropolitan with the concurrence of Provincial Standing Committee and the Provincial Trusts Board;

REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL PENSIONS BOARD

Proposed by: Mr Neville Greenham Seconded by: The Revd V Spencer

That the report be received

1. CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARD

In terms of Canon 46 (5) the Provincial Pensions Fund is administered by a Board consisting of the Metropolitan (as Chairman) with seven other members, of whom three shall be clergy and four lay, elected by Provincial Synod.

The Board has the power to co - opt new members in the event of vacancies occurring between regular sessions of Synod.

The present members of the Board are as follows:

The Metropolitan (Chairman)

The Ven Canon D R Wells SSM

Mr C R Harper

Mr R A Stephenson

Mr J Thiselton (Co-opted as a consulting actuary)

Mr R C Lloyd (Fund Actuary)

Bishop Philip Russell was co-opted to fill the vacancy created by the illness and early retirement of Bishop Alfred Mkhize and he has another role in the affairs of retired clergy as their Provincial Chaplain (appointed by the Synod of Bishops).

Messrs Thiselton and Lloyd attend by invitation with the right to speak but not to vote.

The Provincial Secretary is ex officio the Secretary of the Board and, as such, Principal Executive Officer of the Fund.

2. FUNCTIONS OF THE BOARD

It is important to distinguish between the functions of the Pensions Board and those of the Provincial Trusts Board insofar as they relate to the administration of the Pension Fund. The Trusts Board has responsibility for the security and investment of the assets and income of the Fund whereas it is the responsibility of the Pensions board to carry out the objects and purposes of the Fund; which involves inter alia the collection of contributions, the allocation and distribution of benefits, keeping under review the needs of the members in the face of the ever increasing cost of living, and improving benefits whenever possible.

3. IMPROVEMENTS IN PENSIONS AND DEATH BENEFITS SINCE THE PREVIOUS SESSION OF PROVINCIAL SYNOD

It is particularly satisfactory to be able to report that the investments held by the Fund have increased sufficiently for the Board to have been able to grant increases in both pensions and death benefits of 12% per annum in each year since the previous session of Synod in 1989.

However it is necessary to sound a note of warning in the current uneasy economic situation because to a very considerable extent the ability of the Fund to grant future increases is dependent upon its stock market investments and there is a degree of uncertainty about the continuation of the growth that has been experienced in recent years.

4. WIDOWS BENEFITS

Much progress has been made in attending to the needs of the widows of clergy.

A register has been set up and in most cases the current financial status of widows has been established.

Provincial Standing Committee resolved to make available to the Pensions Board a sum of approximately R230000 which has enabled the Board to grant monthly grants of R80 each to 58 widows and annual grants of R250 each to 22 others. In almost all cases these grants are paid to widows who lost their husbands many years ago and whose death benefits were then a relatively small lump sum. The current practice is to investigate

the circumstances of each widow and in most cases to allocate a portion of the benefit in cash with a lifetime pension purchased from the balance. Such pensions are (like those of the clergy)subject to increase so the Board is able to provide some protection against the inroads of inflation.

5. LOANS TO CLERGY

Provincial Standing Committee has approved a scheme whereby loans can be made available to members on the following basis:

- 5.1 A loan can only be made within two years of retirement age.
- 5.2 The amount of the loan is limited to the sum available to the member as a cash commutation on retirement after provision for interest at 15% per annum and after provision for life insurance cover (to protect the Fund against loss where a member dies before retirement in circumstances where no death benefit is available from the Fund).

A few such loans have been made but it seems that their availability is not sufficiently well known and where necessary letters are therefore being sent to clergy two years before retirement to inform them of their right to take advantage of the scheme.

6. ACTUARIAL VALUATION AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Copies of the actuarial valuation of the Fund as at 31 December 1990 (and 31 December 1991 if available in time) will be tabled for inspection at Provincial Synod.

Similarly copies of the audited financial statements will be available.

7. INFORMATION HANDBOOK

A revised handbook was distributed in 1989 but the time has come for a further revision and an updated version of the book will be produced and circulated to all dioceses later this year.

8. THE LAYWORKERS PENSION FUND

This Fund falls under the oversight of the Board but for all practical purposes is managed by the Old Mutual. It provides for pensions, disability cover and death cover and has grown quite rapidly since its inception in January 1987. Currently we have approximately 300 members contributing just under R40000 per month.

One change of note has been made in the rules to permit on resignation withdrawal of both personal and employer contributions with interest at the rate of 8% per annum.

9. ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS

As indicated in para. 1. above, Synod is required to elect three clerical and four lay persons to be members of the Board. However, as distinct from the case of representatives on Provincial Trusts Board, election in this instance is by the combined Synod and not by houses.

All the current Board members are available and are recommended for re-election.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 1 (OF PROVINCIAL SYNOD) AND CANON 43 OF PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE)

"In addition to the representatives in (a) of this section each Diocese may send one additional representative to Provincial Synod to represent the Youth of that Diocese provided that such representative is a Communicant who is over the age of 18 and is at the time of election an office bearer of a Provincial youth organisation or structure recognised by the Church of this Province by way of a resolution of Synod, Provincial Standing Committee or Episcopal Synod. Any such youth representative must either reside ordinarily in the Diocese or be attending an educational institution within the Diocese, but may only represent one Diocese. The Bishop of the Diocese in giving his certificate in terms of Canon 1 Section 6 shall certify that such youth representative complies with the requirements set out above."

2. The existing section 1 (a) of Canon 43 is to be re-numbered as 43 (1) (a) (i) and a new subsection numbered 1 (a)(ii) is to be added as follows:-

"The Metropolitan shall nominate two youth representatives to Provincial Standing Committee who shall be Communicants over the age of 18 and office bearers of Provincial youth organisations or structures recognised by the Church of this Province in terms of section 2(b) of Canon 1. The nominated youth representatives shall have all the rights and privileges of elected representatives including the power to vote."

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 43 (OF THE PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE) and CANON 10 OF BISHOPS SUFFRAGAN AND ASSISTANT BISHOPS

Be it enacted that Canon 43 be amended :-

1. The first sentence of Section 1(a) is deleted, and replaced by the following:

"The Provincial Standing Committee shall consist of the Metropolitan (who shall be Chairman) the Diocesan Bishops (or in any case a commissary chosen by the Bishop to attend in his stead, who may be a Suffragan in his diocese) and one clerical and one lay representative of each Diocese elected together with alternates by the Synod of each Diocese by their respective orders."

2. Subsection (c) of Section 1 is deleted, and replaced by the following:

"Each Diocese may nominate its Diocesan Secretary or Administrator as an additional representative to the Committee, if that person is not one of the representatives referred to in sub-section (a) of this section, provided that in such cases the Diocese is to be responsible for the costs of attendance at Committee of its additional representative, and provided further that the Diocese advises the Provincial Executive Officer of its nomination within 14 days of receipt of the Metropolitan's notice calling the meeting in terms of section 2 of this Canon. In addition, the Metropolitan may also nominate additional representatives up to a maximum of fifteen in number (subject to accommodation being available) to provide for the representation of such interests or groups as in his opinion may not otherwise be represented, either adequately or at all. These additional representatives shall have all the rights and privileges of elected representatives, save only that they shall have power to speak but not to vote."

The areas for which the appointment is held, and Vicar General's authorities, duties and responsibilities shall be determined by the Bishop, and may be varied by him from time to time in any way he thinks necessary.
- (c) Things done or omitted by the Vicar General shall be deemed to have the Bishop's full authority in relation to the matters delegated to him.
- 2. Re-number section 3 as 2. Alter the margin reference to read "Appointment of Vicar General while absent".
- 3. Re-number sections 1 and 2 as 3 and 4.
- 4. Re-number sections 4 and 5 as 5 and 6.

MEASURE TO AMEND CANON 36 (OF THE TRIBUNALS OF THE CHURCH) and CANON 39 OF THE TRIAL OF PRIESTS AND DEACONS

The Proposals

Be it enacted that:-

- 1. In Canon 39:
 - (a) Re-numbered Section 10 as section 11.
 - (b) Insert a new section 10 reading
 - "The Bishop acting in terms of Canon 39 sections 11-19 shall be an Informal Diocesan Tribunal".
 - (c) In the fourth line of section 5 (a) after the word "Deacons" insert "or has acted in terms of sections 11 & 12 of Canon 39, in any" and the deletion of the words "in either" in the same line.
- 2. In Canon 36:
 - (a) Re-number existing section 11 as section 20.

- (b) A new subsection, sections 11 19, be inserted under the heading "Of Informal Tribunals" as follows:
- "11. Without derogating from the other provisions of this Canon and the provisions of Canons 40 and 41, a Diocesan Bishop, if he has reason to believe that a cleric is guilty of any of the offences referred to in Canon 37, Section 1 sub-paragraphs (a) to (j) inclusive, shall have the power to summon the Priest or Deacon to appear before him.
 - 12. In summoning the cleric, the Bishop shall notify him in writing of the charge which he is required to answer to.
- 13. At the hearing before the Bishop, the Bishop shall be assisted by the Chancellor or Registrar of the Diocese (if there be none or if either or both are not available, a member of the laity being a Communicant learned in the law and appointed by the Bishop) who will be present in an advisory capacity. The Bishop shall put the charge to the cleric together with a written summary of the evidence supporting the charge, and the cleric shall be given an opportunity to be heard.
- 14. The Bishop, having heard the cleric, may after pastoral ministration, if such appears to be appropriate to the Bishop, suspend the cleric from office with emoluments pending a decision by the Bishop on the charge against him or her, subject to the provisions of Section 17 below.
- 15. The Bishop, having considered the cleric's reply to the complaint or the charge brought against him or her, shall have the power to dismiss the charge or find the cleric guilty of the charge. If the Bishop finds the cleric guilty of the charge, the Bishop may either:
 - 15.1 issue a formal admonition;
 - 15.2 suspend the cleric from office for a period not exceeding two years without affecting his pension rights; or

- 15.3 revoke the Letters or Licence of the cleric upon the expiration of not less than three months' notice, or alternatively forthwith against payment of three months' stipend and allowances in lieu of notice.
- 16. The Bishop shall notify the cleric in writing of his decision, and within seven days of the cleric being so notified, he or she shall, if the sentence is either suspension or revocation, be entitled to appeal to the to the Metropolitan (or if the Metropolitan be the Bishop concerned, to the Dean of the Province), who shall decide, upon review, whether or not the proposed suspension or revocation shall take effect.

 Alternatively thereto, the cleric shall be entitled by notice in writing to the Bishop within seven days of the Bishop's said notification, to require the charge alleged against him to be dealt with under Canon 39 sections 1 10 read with Canon 37.
- 17. If the cleric elects to take the matter to review or to require it to be dealt with under Canon 39 sections 1 10 read with Canon 37, any suspension under Section 14 above shall continue until the final determination of the matter. If no such suspension is in force at the time of the cleric's election, then the Bishop shall have the power to suspend the cleric from office pending the final determination thereof."
- 18. Notwithstanding the aforegoing, the Bishop shall be entitled at any time and of his own volition to discontinue a hearing under Canon 39, sections 11 19, and shall do so at the request of the cleric, and to cause the matter with which he is charged to be dealt with under Canon 39, sections 1 10.
- 19. Where the matter is to be dealt with under Canon 39 sections 1 10 either at the request of the cleric or by a decision of the Bishop at any time before or during the informal Tribunal, the Bishop may determine that, after the expiry of a period of 3 months from a date being the end of the month in which the Bishop determined that the matter shall be dealt with under Canon 39 sections 1 10 or the date of the cleric's notification in terms of section 16, the cleric's emoluments shall cease and he shall vacate any premises occupied by him. In the event of the cleric being acquitted, his emoluments shall be reinstated retrospectively to the date when they ceased.

Advisory Board on Theological Education

102.1 After discussion on the report of Committee of Agendum 9 the measure was presented in an amended form.

MEASURE TO INTRODUCE A NEW ACT (OF ADVISORY BOARD ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION)

The Measure

Be it enacted that a New Act be introduced to read as follows:

"1 There shall be a Provincial Advisory Board on Theological Education and Training for Ministry.

- The Board shall consist of a Liaison Bishop and six additional members appointed by the Synod of Bishops.
- The Board shall consist of a Liaison Bishop and six additional members appointed by the Synod of Bishops. The additional members shall serve for an initial period of three years and shall be eligible for re-appointment for a maximum continuous period of six years. In order to ensure continuity of membership there shall be, in the first instance, two persons appointed for four years, two persons appointed for five years, and two persons appointed for six years. If a member fails to attend three consecutive meetings without apology, the membership automatically lapses. Casual vacancies shall be filled by the Synod of Bishops.
- 4 The Board shall report to the Synod of Bishops and Provincial Synod, taking into account available resources and opportunities for ecumenical and inter-institutional and inter-diocesan co-operation, in liaison, where possible, with SACTE (the South African Council for Theological Education).
- 5 The Board's functions shall be :
 - (a) To advise and act as a resource to theological colleges, pre and post ordination and lay training schemes on all aspects of training for ministry in the CPSA;
 - (b) To foster and publicise theological and pastoral thinking on these matters within the Province;
 - (c) To seek to establish basic standards and goals relating to the long and short term formation and training of ordination candidates and licensed lay ministers in the Province, taking into account available resources for ecumenical, inter-institutional and inter-diocesan co-operation in liaison with SACTE (South African Council for Theological Education).
 - The Chairman moved that the measure as amended be read for the third time on Monday at 10h00 as the sixth item of business of Synod. Synod agreed.
- 103. Synod expressed thanks to the Committee and its Chairman for their work.

105.1 MOTION ARISING FROM THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE.

Proposed by: The Bishop of Christ the King

Seconded by : Bishop Charles Albertyn

Sanctions

This Synod, recognising -

- The perpetual responsibility of the Church to pursue the implementation of God's will in society,
- 2. The effective role which local and international pressures have played in mobilising desirable political and other changes in Southern Africa,
- 3. The acute economic imbalances and social distortions which persist alongside political injustices in Southern Africa and especially in the Republic of South Africa,
- 4. The need for continuing international assistance (akin to the present involvement of the United Nations Organisation) in building a new and morally acceptable society in South Africa, along the times of God's justice,
- 5. Thanks those who have had the vision and courage to mobilise constructive international pressures, and those who have implemented them in various countries around the world;
- 2. Urges all leaders in Southern Africa, and especially those involved in the processes of change in South Africa, to give attention to economic and social justice alongside political and constitutional chance, and strongly commends the CPSA's "Outlines of a Christian response to the Constitutional Debate in South Africa", especially section 11.

- 3. Appeals to international bodies, governments, companies, aid agencies and potential investors to take not only political change but economic and social transformation into account when setting criteria for new or renewed involvement with government, business, aid agencies or communities in South Africa;
- 4. Asks that ethical guidelines be worked out by churches and made available to potential investors;
- 5. Respectfully requests the Metropolitan to set up a small advisory body accountable to the Synod of Bishops and able to work closely with other Christian bodies and economists, to monitor developments in this field and to advise international bodies of the church's views on request as the southern African situation develops.

The motion was accepted by Synod and referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

105.2 MOTION ARISING OUT OF THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE

Proposed by: The Revd V Spencer Seconded by: The Revd A S Dotchin

In his Charge, the Archbishop said that "Christians should be universal pacifists".

This Synod resolves that:

- (a) henceforth, the CPSA shall describe itself as a Peace Church and
- (b) calls on all its members to renounce the use of weapons in the resolution of conflict, and
- (c) encourages all its members to refuse to be trained in the use of arms by any organisation whatsoever.

105.3 MOTION ARISING OUT OF THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE

That this Synod appreciates the work done by the heads of churches and in particular, the tireless efforts made by the Bishop of Lesotho who is Secretary, to bring back home many

Basotho who were displaced as refugees into South Africa, Botswana and other neighbouring countries, after the aborted elections of 1970, and also ask this Synod to sincerely pray for Basotho people as they are fervently preparing for general elections in November this year.

Proposed by : Ms M Chakela Seconded by : Mr M V Nzeku

The motion was accepted and referred to Synod of Committee.

105.4 MOTION ARISING IN TERMS OF RULE 30 (a) (iv)

HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Proposed by : The Revd T P Molipa

Seconded by: The Revd Canon T G Moselane

Whereas :

- A. Any country is only as healthy as all of its people;
- B. Health care in South Africa does not reach all the people, and indeed least reaches those most in need of health care.

Synod requests

- 1. The Archbishop to express his concern over the present state of the South African Health Services, especially the fragmentation thereof which exacerbates the present shortage of trained staff.
- 2. The Bishops in whose dioceses the affected health centres are located to communicate with those involved in the strikes with the aim of bringing about a rapid reconciliation of the disputing parties by assisting them to reach a mutually acceptable solution.

The motion was accepted and referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

105.5 RESOLUTION ARISING FROM THE ARCHBISHOP'S CHARGE

Weapons Free South Africa

Proposed by: The Rt Revd C H Albertyn Seconded by: The Bishop of the Diocese of

Christ the King

That this Synod pledges itself to a CPSA programme of peacemaking focussing on the

notion of ""NO WEAPONS HERE" and,

- 1.1 urges Synod members to commit themselves not to own or use dangerous weapons (except for legitimate professional purposes);
- 1.2 calls on CPSA members and other Christians to do likewise;
- 1.3 seeks to form a broadly based public opinion in favour of the progressive future disarming of the South African population.
- 2 That this Synod calls on South Africa's leaders to:
 - 2.1 Create a new apolitical police force for South Africa, purged of destructive and insubordinate elements in the present force and incorporating personnel from all sectors of the community, working under one authority for the common good, and able to be trusted by the public;
 - 2.2 **create** a new Defence Force and new Prison Service along the line of (2.1);
 - 2.3 incorporate in the new constitution or its new legislation:
 - (i) the responsibility of the State to protect the individual;
 - (ii) the consequent denial of any general right for the private citizen to own or use dangerous weapons;
 - (iii) strict control of the licensing and issuing of firearms in cases where possession is legitimate and legalised.
 - 2.4 Adopt a timetable for the progressive disarming of all parts of the South African population within a set period after the adoption of the new constitution.

3 That this Synod thanks CPSA dioceses outside the Republic of South Africa for their encouragement and example, and urges the application of the principles set out above in neighbouring states, according to local circumstances.

The motion was accepted and referred to the Synod Advisory Committee.

105.6 MOTION OF APPRECIATION

Question:

1. With the application of Paragraph 5 of Agendum 18 for the new College of the

Transfiguration, will there be any means of reducing fees for Fedsem in order to maintain an Anglican presence at this ecumenical college?

2. If Anglicans are no longer participating in Fedsem, or if Fedsem closes, will the CPSA have any share in the assets?

Answer:

- 1. That is a matter for PSC to decide.
- 2. We do not have available with us the Trust Deed of the Fedsem. But it is not unreasonable to suppose that the net proceeds would be divided between the participating churches.

107.5 Mother Monica Mary CSJB

Question:

Is it possible for the church to invest some of its funds at banks overseas so as to accrue a better interest, as interest rates keep on fluctuating in RSA where the Rand has no value?

Answer:

- No, in the sense that our foreign exchange regulations are very restrictive in relation to the export of funds.
- 2. Interest rates overseas are generally lower than those in the RSA.
- 3. The low value of the Rand in these circumstances is not really relevant because the exchange rate obviously works both ways and further, even if permission to export funds was granted, it is a virtual certainty that the export would have to be via the Financial Rand where the rate is even worse.
- 4. The local investments made by the Provincial Trustees deliberately include certain Companies (e.g. Richemont and Trencor amongst other) which have

overseas investments contributing to their income.

The question raised is therefore already under continuing review by the Trustees.

- 5. The performance of our investments in local terms has been consistently ahead of average and better than inflation.
- 108. The Chairman of the Minute Scrutineering Committee moved acceptance of the Minutes pages 13 40. Synod agreed with applause.
- The Rt Revd Petrus Hilukiluah expressed the thanks of the Bishop and the Diocese of Namibia to the CPSA, through Synod, for recent generous financial assistance to the Diocese.

Reassessment of the Modderpoort Vision

 - 1.1.2 has removed many discriminatory laws from the statute books
 - 1.1.3 claims to be a Christian government.
- 1.2 The incredible damage and suffering that has been and continues to be caused by Apartheid in that many people had their land and property forcibly removed because of Apartheid legislation, particularly the Group Areas Act, and this includes land and property of the CPSA;
- 1.3 the **urgent** need to redress these costly and painful mistakes

2. believing

that Apartheid is a crime against humanity and that restitution is a natural consequence of genuine repentance.

- 3. calls upon the South African government:
 - 3.1 to repent of the wrong it perpetrated through its Apartheid policy and to apologise to all those whose lives have been scarred by it, particularly those against whom Apartheid discriminates, and to the international community.
 - 3.2 to establish a National Land Claims Tribunal to assist in the process of restitution.

Respectfully requests the Archbishop to appoint a task force to present to the government and/or the proposed Tribunal those instances where CPSA land and other property are affected.

- 4. Recognises that there will be no true peace, or justice, nor real reconciliation in South Africa until these issues are faced and dealt with.

- 5.1 true repentance and reparation for this sin;
- 5.2 the restoration of people to the land, in ways which redress past injustices and which ensure at the same time that the land is properly utilised for the common welfare.

Violence and a quest for Peace

This Synod, deeply distressed by the growing violence that is sweeping through southern Africa and appalled by the lack of regard for human life and property -

- 1. Affirms the work of the regional and local Dispute Resolution Committees in South Africa.
- 2. Condemns the flagrant disregard of the "Code of Conduct for Political Parties and Organisations" as contained in the National Peace Accord of South Africa by some of the signatories to the Accord.
- 3. Calls on all political parties and organisations in South Africa to uphold the principles of the National Peace Accord and to ensure that its members and organisations understand the contents of the Peace Accord.
- 4. Calls on all leaders in the Church of the Province of Southern Africa to familiarise their people with the contents of the National Peace Accord.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON THE AMENDMENT OF THE BYE LAWS OF PSC RELATING TO THE FINANCE SUB-COMMITTEE.

1. Bye-Law 7

The Committee shall consist of the Metropolitan (or his nominee) and five members. Any four members shall form a quorum and shall elect a Chairperson at each meeting. The Committee shall make recommendations regarding the allocation of the revenue of the Common Provincial Fund for the ensuing year, and to discharge such other duties as may be assigned to it by the Standing Committee.

2. Bye-Law 16

Diocesan contributions to the Common Provincial Fund shall be payable monthly in arrears

and interest shall be charged on any late payments at a rate to be determined by the Committee.

3. Bye-Law 22

The Select Committee recommended that no changes be made to the wording in the agenda book.

4. Bye-Law 19

Every Provincial Board or Institution receiving a grant from the Common Provincial Fund shall submit a report and duly audited accounts, by the 31st May, in each year.

5. Bye-Law 22

All cheques on the Common Provincial Fund shall be signed by two persons from a list of persons appointed by the Provincial Trusts Board as signatories.

6. Bye-Law 25

In its report to Provincial Standing Committee the Committee shall include an audited account of the revenue and expenditure of the Common Provincial Fund for the previous calendar year and financial statements showing the position of the fund at the 31st March immediately preceding the meeting of Provincial Standing Committee".

SEXUAL ABUSE

Proposed by : Dr M J Silk Seconded by : Ms M Sithole

That this Synod

is increasingly alarmed at the rising incidence of rape in urban and rural areas of Southern Africa and

therefore draws the attention of the public to the following:

- 172.1. The reluctance of many rape victims to report the crime, or to pursue criminal charges.
- 172.2. The sometimes unfortunate attitudes adopted by certain members of the Police, hospitals and district surgeons, towards those who report rape.
- 172.3. The atmosphere of lawlessness that prevails through all our cities.
- 172.4. The increasing numbers of incidences of sexual harassment on university campuses, especially in university residences.
- 172.5. The difficulty of successfully prosecuting rape charges in the courts, and
- 172.6. The lack of easily accessible rape counselling facilities.
- 172.7. Therefore calls for the following:
 - 172.7.1. that parish priests, parents, district surgeons and concerned adults make concerted efforts and take the initiative to provide all possible assistance to rape victims, including following reported cases to their conclusion;
 - 172.7.2. that the Commissioners of Police in the various countries of our Province
 - a. instruct all police officers to respond immediately and constructively to rape complaints, and
 - b. make arrangements so that, where possible, a rape victim is seen by a police officer of the same sex.
 - 172.7.3. that the management of public areas enhance security on their premises, in order to ensure that abductions do not take place from these places;
 - 172.7.4. that parents be cautioned constantly to advise their children to refrain from visiting areas that might be dangerous;
 - 172.7.5. that University Principals take action to ensure the safety of young people on their campuses;
 - 172.7.6. that special courtrooms be provided to hear cases of rape;
 - 172.7.7. that public prosecutors endeavour to

ensure that complainants in rape caes are only brought to court when their presence is necessary;

- 172.7.8. that the Church and its agencies give priority to providing rape counselling services both to its own members and to the public at large, and that the availability of such services be widely advertised;
- 172.8. Debate was entered into.
- 172.9. Amendments of a grammatical nature were made.
- 172.10. A further amendment, approved by the movers, that:

 - 2.2 remaining in touch with current mission thinking and practice, reflecting on this within the CPSA's context, and making this available through publications, a resource library, briefings and other educational media, as well as through institutions of theological education;
 - 2.3 engaging as deeply as possible with local church communities in their ministry and

- mission, to provide the Institute with a base and to test missiological strategies and models in a contextual way;
- 2.4 exploring with other resource staff in the CPSA (especially those working in the areas of justice and spirituality) the wholeness of God's mission and its challenges to patterns of worship and ministry in the CPSA;
- 2.5 maintaining and developing local ecumenical links, especially with mission agencies and personnel of other churches and with the appropriate departments of bodies like the South African Council of Churches;
- 2.6 forming a network of people within the CPSA who have a special concern for educating the local church for mission, to enable mutual support and sharing of resources at diocesan and parish level; and in particular to maintain links with the Anglican Mission Association;
- 2.7 making educational and training resources available to the local church, especially in relation to the Decade of Evangelism;
- 2.8 maintaining or developing contact (in liaison with the Provincial Executive Officer) with mission agencies elsewhere in the Anglican Communion, with the mission staff of the Anglican Consultative Council, and with regional and international ecumenical bodies such as the WCC's Commission for World Mission and Evangelism and the Lausaane Movement;
- 2.9 advising the PIM Co-ordinating Committee on the generation of funds for mission; and making recommendations to the annual grant-making meeting of the Committee on grants from the CPSA Mission Fund and related funds.
- 3. The Director of the Anglican Mission Institute shall be appointed by the Metropolitan in consultation with Provincial Standing Committee, and as a CPSA resource staff member shall be responsible to Provincial Synod.

This Synod further

- 4. encourages the existing co-operation between AMI and the Anglican Mission Association (established by Provincial Standing Committee 1985) and SOMA in their respective areas of ministry:
 - AMI in reflection, study and training of the church at large for mission

- AMA in helping individuals to find their place in the mission of the Church in terms of AMA's Constitution.

- 1. Acknowledges with appreciation and joy that the period 1991-2000 has been declared a Decade of Evangelism: the sharing of the knowledge of the Revelation of God's saving act in and through Jesus Christ;
- 2. notes the policies of Apartheid historically, theologically, practically and systematically opposed the vision of the Kingdom of God through the expropriation of, and removal of people from, ancestral lands; the Bantu Education Act and numerous other vicious forms of social engineering;

3. notes that the legacy of Apartheid will affect people's lives for a long time to come and therefore

resolves to:

- 4. request the Metropolitan to encourage the whole Church towards the creation of the elements of the justice of God's Kingdom throughout the life of the Church, with special reference to such factors as:-
 - 4.1. the appointment of clergy and other employees of the church;
 - 4.2. racially and culturally biased practices in the life and practice of the CPSA and its associated institutions;
 - 4.3 formulating strategies towards overcoming the legacy of Apartheid;
 - 4.4 launching initiatives and monitoring activities of political parties in order that the world may not be seen as more enlightened than the Church: the custodian of the Good News of God's reconciling love;
- 5. request also that the Metropolitan promotes and encourages this vision in, and through, the Synod of Bishops;
- 6. request further that the Metropolitan reports on these initiatives to meetings of Provincial Standing Committee and that Diocesan Bishops report to Diocesan Standing Committees or equivalent bodies.
 - 178.1 Debate was entered into.
 - 178.2 An amendment was proposed by the Revd Canon E K Mosothoane.

That a new paragraph 4, with subsequent re-numbering, be inserted as follows:

"Request the Synod of Bishops to declare 1993 - 2003 as a Decade of Solidarity with the Victims of Racism."

The amendment was accepted by the movers of Agendum 29 and became part of the substantive motion.

- confesses to God and to those we have hurt that our church has sinned, especially:
 - 2.1 in our church structures: we have allowed racially segregated congregations to exist side by side, and we have allowed the criterion of race to determine appointments of clergy to parishes;
 - 2.2 we have made only partial and piecemeal protest against the evils of the apartheid system;
- 3. Asks forgiveness of God and of those who have been injured and alienated by these and other sins;
- 4. Urges members, congregations, dioceses and church institutions to make specific acts of confession to God and to those who have been wronged, to amend what is wrong and, wherever possible, to make reparation to those who have suffered as a result of our failures;
- 5. Calls on the State President, in his symbolic capacity as head of the people and the Party which created, applied and benefitted most from the evil system of apartheid, humbly to confess its sinfulness, to ask forgiveness of God and of its victims, and to make reparation and restitution wherever possible.
- 179.1 Debate was entered into.
- 179.2 The President commented at length about the importance of this motion and how it marked the great change that God had wrought in this church in recent times.
- 179.3 Before putting the motion to the vote the President called Synod to a time of prayer. During the time of prayer, individual members stood to identify with prayers of confession

being offered. Many members offered prayers of penitence and reconciliation.

All the members of Synod stood and linked hands while singing a song asking the Holy Spirit to be amongst them.

Synod sang "Nkosi Sikelel 'iAfrika" with open hands raised heavenward.

- 179.4 The President put Agendum 46 by asking those in favour of the motion to remain standing and those against to sit. One person sat.

 The motion was carried.

- (a) the normal retirement age of a Bishop of the Province has, for a number of years, been sixty-five years.
- (b) at Provincial Synod 1989, the normal retirement age of all clergy other than a Bishop of the Province was reduced from sixty-eight years to sixty-six years.
- (c) the Board may in its discretion grant a pension to a Bishop of the Province who takes early retirement at an age of not less than sixty years and to other members who take early retirement at an age of not less than sixty-one years.
- 3. believing that it should be the aim of the Provincial Pensions Board to reduce the normal retirement and early retirement ages of all members;

 - b. review recent developments concerning the renewal of this ancient office in the Roman Catholic Church and in other parts of the Anglican Communion, and elsewhere;
 - c. examine the issue of appropriate and effective representation of Permanent Deacons at Synodical level and in the on-going life of Dioceses, and to make recommendations in this regard;
 - d. review and make recommendations concerning the selection and training of persons called to the Permanent Diaconate;
 - e. examine the need to establish a Provincial Council or Support Group for the Permanent Diaconate, or other measures which may encourage and strengthen the ministry and witness of Permanent Deacons in the CPSA.

and while charitable and church based hunger-relief schemes are to be commended, they cannot cope with the extent of hunger at present found;

and while the structural inequalities of society in southern Africa make it unlikely that the effects of the above will be overcome in the short-term;

Be it resolved that this Provincial Synod

requests that the governments of southern Africa implement - as a matter of urgency - school feeding schemes for all primary schools that are in need of such assistance.

This assistance should include children of refugees and could be carried out by educational departments as well as church and charitable agencies.

This should be seen as a mark of commitment to the future generations of southern Africa.

192.1 An amendment proposed by the Bishop of St Mark the Evangelist was accepted by the movers of the motion.

"Omit the paragraph "This assistance ... charitable agencies" and replace it with:

"requests the Metropolitan to ask the South African government to recognise officially the presence of refugees in South Africa so that the office of the UNHCR can co-operate with local education authorities as well as church and charitable agencies to provide feeding schemes for refugee children"."

The amendment became part of the substantive motion.

Whereas the Provincial Synod of 1989 requested the formation of a Provincial Task Force.

Be it resolved that

- 1. Synod respectfully requests the Metropolitan to urge the Provincial AIDS Task Force to communicate to the dioceses of the Province any progress it has made in meeting its mandate.
- 2. That the dioceses of the Province report to the Provincial AIDS Task Force what they have achieved in the areas of ministry and education with regard to HIV\AIDS and that such information be made available to all the Dioceses of the Province by the Provincial AIDS Task Force.

THE DROUGHT

Proposed by: The Ven J Nhangumbe Seconded by: The Revd Canon L Ngewu

1. Noting the effects of drought in the countries of the Province and beyond and the possible lasting effect thereof

and

- Noting the non-existence of an Anglican Body which would administer resources to meet crisis immediately or to address social needs;
- 3. Believing that Anglicans world-wide have resources and are willing to release them for the relief of the suffering people of God, if credible channels can be found,
- (i) Requests the Anglican Consultative Council to establish a Pan-Anglican Body to collect, in time, resources and administer them whenever and wherever necessary and to relieve suffering and promote human dignity. Such a body could be called Anglicare or any other suitable name.

- (ii) In order to enable people to become good stewards of nature, this Synod calls upon the Dioceses to draw guidlines to be shared with Governments at all levels and other humanitarian bodies, related to ecological issues where lack of knowledge might have contributed to the present drought.
- (iii) Recalling that in many countries of Africa, the church has been the guardian and teacher of better, traditional and modern methods of agriculture and noting that in recent years the churches seem to be withdrawn from this function, that this Synod calls upon dioceses and parishes
 - (a) to take practical steps to reintroduce in their life the important task of providing agricultural skills, traditional and modern, to all people desiring them.
 - (b) to be the voice of the voiceless in regard to ownership of land and related issues especially in those areas where people are being deprived and cheated of their land.
 - 203.1 Debate was entered into.
 - 203.2 The motion was put, and carried.

PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

Proposed by: Mother Monica Mary CSJB Seconded by: The Bishop of Umzimvubu

The Archbishop expressed concern over the lack of vocations to the Religious Life within the CPSA and voiced a desire that each Diocese should be host to at least one Religious Community by the next session of Provincial Synod.

and also

The Archbishop called on young Anglicans to give a year of their life to God.

That this Synod

- 1. requests parishes throughout the CPSA to remember that the Ember Days each September have been set aside, by the Synod of Bishops, as days of special prayer for vocations to the Religious Life and to:
 - (a) take this call to prayer seriously

- (b) encourage preaching about vocations to the Religious Life during this time
- 2. (a) Calls on Young Anglicans seriously to consider spending some portion of their time living and working with a Religious Community.
 - (b) Requests the Executive of the Anglican Students Federation and the Provincial Youth Council to request their members to heed this call.

- The effective role which local and international pressures have played in mobilising desirable political and other changes in southern Africa,
- 3. The acute economic imbalances and social distortions which persist alongside political injustices in southern Africa and especially in the Republic of South Africa,
- 4. The need for continuing international assistance (akin to the present involvement of the United Nations Organisation) in building a new and morally acceptable society in South Africa, along the lines of God's justice,

Therefore

- 1. Thanks those who have had the vision and courage to mobilise constructive international pressures, and those who have implemented them in various countries around the world;
- 2. Urges all leaders in southern Africa, and especially those involved in the processes of change in South Africa, to give attention to economic and social justice alongside political and constitutional change, and strongly commends the CPSA's "Outlines of a Christian response to the Constitutional Debate in South Africa", especially section 11.
- Appeals to international bodies, governments, companies, aid agencies and potential investors to take not only political change but economic and social transformation into account when setting criteria for new or renewed involvement with government, business, aid agencies or communities in South Africa;
- 4. Asks that ethical guidelines be worked out by churches and made available to potential investors;
- 5. Respectfully requests the Metropolitan to set up a small advisory body accountable to the Synod

of Bishops and able to work closely with other Christian bodies and economists, to monitor developments in this field and to advise international bodies of the church's views on request as the southern African situation develops.

- 1. This Synod pledges itself to a CPSA programme of peacemaking focussing on the notion of "NO WEAPONS HERE" and,
 - 1.1 urges Synod members to commit themselves not to own or use dangerous weapons (except for legitimate professional purposes);
 - 1.2 calls on CPSA members and other Christians to do likewise and commit themselves to peaceful means of conflict resolution;
 - 1.3 requests the clergy of the CPSA no longer to write letters of commendation for the procurement of licences for firearms;
 - 1.4 seeks to form a broadly based public opinion in favour of the progressive future disarming of the South African population.
- 2. This Synod calls on South Africa's leaders to:
 - 2.1 Create a new apolitical police force for South Africa, purged of destructive and

insubordinate elements in the present force and incorporating personnel from all sectors of the community, working under one authority for the common good, and able to be trusted by the public;

- 2.2 Create a new Defence Force and new Prison Service along the lines of (2.1);
- 2.3 incorporate in the new constitution or its new legislation:
 - (i) the responsibility of the State to protect the individual;
 - (ii) the consequent denial of any general right for the private citizen to own or use dangerous weapons;
 - (iii) strict control of the licensing and issuing of firearms in cases where possession is legitimate and legalised.
- 2.4 Adopt a timetable for the progressive disarming of all parts of the South African population within a set period after the adoption of the new constitution.
- 3. This Synod thanks CPSA dioceses outside the Republic of South Africa for their encouragement and example, and urges the application of the principles set out above in neighbouring states, according to local circumstances.

ANGLICAN MISSION INSTITUTE: STATEMENT OF PURPOSE AND STRUCTURE

Proposed by : The Bishop of Christ the King

Seconded by: The Rt Revd G Quinlan

That this Synod

adopt the following Statement of Purpose and Structures for the Anglican Mission Institute:

- 1. The purpose of the Anglican Mission Institute shall be to help the CPSA to discern how to share in God's whole mission in the world.
- 2. It shall aim to do so through:
 - 2.1 offering training and input on mission issues to dioceses and parishes through clergy schools, workshops, seminars and the like;
 - 2.2 remaining in touch with current mission thinking and practice, reflecting on this within the CPSA's context, and making this available through publications, a resource library, briefings and other educational media, as well as through institutions of theological education;
 - 2.3 engaging as deeply as possible with local church communities in their ministry and mission, to provide the Institute with a base and to test missiological strategies and models in a contextual way;
 - 2.4 exploring with other resource staff in the CPSA (especially those working in the areas of justice and spirituality) the wholeness of God's mission and its challenges to patterns of worship and ministry in the CPSA;
 - 2.5 maintaining and developing local ecumenical links, especially with mission agencies and personnel of other churches and with the appropriate departments of bodies like the South African Council of Churches;
 - 2.6 forming a network of people within the CPSA who have a special concern for educating the local church for mission, to enable mutual support and sharing of resources at diocesan and parish level; and in particular to maintain links with the Anglican Mission Association;
 - 2.7 making educational and training resources available to the local church, especially in relation to the Decade of Evangelism;
 - 2.8 maintaining or developing contact (in liaison with the Provincial Executive Officer) with mission agencies elsewhere in the Anglican Communion, with the mission staff of the Anglican Consultative Council, and with regional and international ecumenical bodies such as the WCC's Commission for World Mission and Evangelism and the Lausaane Movement;

- 2.9 advising the PIM Co-ordinating Committee on the generation of funds for mission; and making recommendations to the annual grant-making meeting of the Committee on grants from the CPSA Mission Fund and related funds.
- 3. The Director of the Anglican Mission Institute shall be appointed by the Metropolitan in consultation with Provincial Standing Committee, and as a CPSA resource staff member shall be responsible to Provincial Synod.

This Synod further

- 4. encourages the existing co-operation between AMI and the Anglican Mission Association (established by Provincial Standing Committee 1985) and SOMA in their respective areas of ministry:
 - AMI in reflection, study and training of the church at large for mission
 - AMA in helping individuals to find their place in the mission of the Church in terms of AMA's Constitution.

- 2. confesses to God and to those we have hurt that our church has sinned, especially:
 - 2.1 in our church structures: we have allowed racially segregated congregations to exist side by side, and we have allowed the criterion of race to determine appointments of clergy to parishes;
 - 2.2 we have made only partial and piecemeal protest against the evils of the apartheid system;
- 3. Asks forgiveness of God and of those who have been injured and alienated by these and other sins;
- 4. Urges members, congregations, dioceses and church institutions to make specific acts of confession

to God and to those who have been wronged, to amend what is wrong and, wherever possible, to make reparation to those who have suffered as a result of our failures;

- 5. Calls on the State President, in his symbolic capacity as head of the people and the Party which created, applied and benefitted most from the evil system of apartheid, humbly to confess its sinfulness, to ask forgiveness of God and of its victims, and to make reparation and restitution wherever possible.

- 179.2 The President commented at length about the importance of this motion and how it marked the great change that God had wrought in this church in recent times.
- 179.3 Before putting the motion to the vote the President called Synod to a time of prayer.

 During the time of prayer, individual members stood to identify with prayers of confession being offered. Many members offered prayers of penitence and reconciliation.

All the members of Synod stood and linked hands while singing a song asking the Holy Spirit to be amongst them.

Synod sang "Nkosi Sikelel 'iAfrika" with open hands raised heavenward.

Whereas the combined impact of the economic recession and the devastating drought in southern Africa is causing severe hunger and malnutrition;

and while charitable and church based hunger-relief schemes are to be commended, they cannot cope with the extent of hunger at present found;

and while the structural inequalities of society in southern Africa make it unlikely that the effects of the above will be overcome in the short-term;

Be it resolved that this Provincial Synod

requests that the governments of southern Africa implement - as a matter of urgency - school feeding schemes for all primary schools that are in need of such assistance.

This assistance should include children of refugees and could be carried out by educational departments as well as church and charitable agencies.

This should be seen as a mark of commitment to the future generations of southern Africa.

192.1 An amendment proposed by the Bishop of St Mark the Evangelist was accepted by the movers of the motion.

"Omit the paragraph "This assistance ...charitable agencies" and replace it with:

"requests the Metropolitan to ask the South African government to recognise officially the presence of refugees in South Africa so that the office of the UNHCR can co-operate with local education authorities as well as church and charitable agencies to provide feeding schemes for refugee children"."

- 2. Amend the Squatting Act as to afford the homeless assistance rather than persecution.
- 3. Adopt effective urban land and housing policies which direct state resources to helping the poorest households. Every household should be able to afford at least a serviced site.
- 4. Accept the principle of unified, non-racial local authorities.
- 5. Encourage employers to take more effective steps to assist their workers with obtaining shelter.
- 200.1 Agendum 104.6, as amended, was accepted.
- 200.2 Debate was entered into.
- 200.3 An amendment was proposed to "add to paragraph 1 : ", and the sale of State Land needed for public housing to private owners.
- 200.4 The amendment was accepted by the proposer and seconder and became part of the substantive motion.
- 200.5 The motion was put and carried.

ATDS

Proposed by : Ms M Sithole

Seconded by : The Very Revd G Henwood

Whereas the Archbishop in his charge reminded Provincial Synod of the impending catastrophe facing our region of southern Africa as a consequence of the AIDS pandemic and of the plight of people living with HIV\AIDS

and

Whereas the Provincial Synod of 1989 requested the formation of a Provincial Task Force.

Be it resolved that

- 1. Synod respectfully requests the Metropolitan to urge the Provincial AIDS Task Force to communicate to the dioceses of the Province any progress it has made in meeting its mandate.
- 2. That the dioceses of the Province report to the Provincial AIDS Task FOrce what they have achieved in the areas of ministry and education with regard to HIV\AIDS and that such information be made available to all the Dioceses of the Province by the Provincial AIDS Task Force.
- 201.1 The motion was put and carried.

202. AGENDUM 104.9

THE DROUGHT

Proposed by: The Ven J Nhangumbe Seconded by: The Revd Canon L Ngewu

1. Noting the effects of drought in the countries of the Province and beyond and the possible lasting effect thereof

and

- 2. **Noting** the non-existence of an Anglican Body which would administer resources to meet crisis immediately or to address social needs;
- 3. Believing that Anglicans world-wide have resources and are willing to release them for the relief of the suffering people of God, if credible channels can be found,
- (i) Requests the Anglican Consultative Council to establish a Pan-Anglican Body to collect, in time, resources and administer them whenever and wherever necessary and to relieve suffering and promote human dignity. Such a body could be called Anglicare or any other suitable name.

- (ii) In order to enable people to become good stewards of nature, this Synod calls upon the Dioceses to draw guidlines to be shared with Governments at all levels and other humanitarian bodies, related to ecological issues where lack of knowledge might have contributed to the present drought.
- (iii) Recalling that in many countries of Africa, the church has been the guardian and teacher of better, traditional and modern methods of agriculture and noting that in recent years the churches seem to be withdrawn from this function, that this Synod calls upon dioceses and parishes
 - (a) to take practical steps to reintroduce in their life the important task of providing agricultural skills, traditional and modern, to all people desiring them.
 - (b) to be the voice of the voiceless in regard to ownership of land and related issues especially in those areas where people are being deprived and cheated of their land.
 - 203.1 Debate was entered into.
 - 203.2 The motion was put, and carried.
- 204. AGENDUM 104.10 was accepted with an amendment.

PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

Proposed by : Mother Monica Mary CSJB Seconded by : The Bishop of Umzimvubu

Whereas

The Archbishop expressed concern over the lack of vocations to the Religious Life within the CPSA and voiced a desire that each Diocese should be host to at least one Religious Community by the next session of Provincial Synod.

and also

The Archbishop called on young Anglicans to give a year of their life to God.

That this Synod

- 1. requests parishes throughout the CPSA to remember that the Ember Days each September have been set aside, by the Synod of Bishops, as days of special prayer for vocations to the Religious Life and to:
 - (a) take this call to prayer seriously

- (b) encourage preaching about vocations to the Religious Life during this time
- 2. (a) Calls on Young Anglicans seriously to consider spending some portion of their time living and working with a Religious Community.
 - (b) Requests the Executive of the Anglican Students Federation and the Provincial Youth Council to request their members to heed this call.
- 204.1 Debate was entered into.
- 204.2 The motion was put and carried.
- 205. The President proposed a motion thanking the Bishop of Port Elizabeth and the Revd C Albertyn for their contribution to the Province, this being their last Provincial Synod, and looking forward to their continuing minister during their retirement."

 Synod stood to applaud them.

- 208. Agendum 104.11 was accepted with corrections.

SANCTIONS

Proposed by: The Bishop of the Diocese of Christ

the King

Seconded by : The Rt Revd C Albertyn

This Synod,

recognising :-

- 1. The perpetual responsibility of the church to pursue the implementation of God's will in society,
- 2. The effective role which local and international pressures have played in mobilising desirable political and other changes in southern Africa,
- 3. The acute economic imbalances and social distortions which persist alongside political injustices in southern Africa and especially in the Republic of South Africa,
- 4. The need for continuing international assistance (akin to the present involvement of the United Nations Organisation) in building a new and morally acceptable society in South Africa, along the lines of God's justice,

Therefore

- 1. Thanks those who have had the vision and courage to mobilise constructive international pressures, and those who have implemented them in various countries around the world:
- 2. Urges all leaders in southern Africa, and especially those involved in the processes of change in South Africa, to give attention to economic and social justice alongside political and constitutional change, and strongly commends the CPSA's "Outlines of a Christian response to the Constitutional Debate in South Africa", especially section 11.
- 3. Appeals to international bodies, governments, companies, aid agencies and potential investors to take not only political change but economic and social transformation into account when setting criteria for new or renewed involvement with government, business, aid agencies or communities in South Africa;
- 4. Asks that ethical guidelines be worked out by churches and made available to potential investors;

- Respectfully requests the Metropolitan to set up a small advisory body accountable to the Synod of Bishops and able to work closely with other Christian bodies and economists, to monitor developments in this field and to advise international bodies of the church's views on request as the southern African situation develops.

PEACE CHURCH

The motion was moved in an amended form.

Proposed by: The Revd V Spencer Seconded by: The Revd A S Dotchin

In his Charge, the Archbishop said that "Christians should be universal pacifists".

- (a) the Synod of Bishops to investigate the implications of the CPSA becoming a Peace Church and to communicate these to all parishes within the Province.
- (b) all its members to renounce the use of weapons in the resolution of conflict.

BASOTHO REFUGEES

That this Synod

appreciates the work done by the heads of churches in Lesotho, and in particular the tireless efforts made by the Bishop of Lesotho who is their Secretary, to bring back home many Basotho who were displaced as refugees into South Africa, Botswana and other neighbouring countries, after the aborted elections of 1970, and also asks members of the CPSA to pray sincerely for Basotho people as they are fervently preparing for general elections in November this year.

HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Proposed by: The Revd T P Molipa

Seconded by : Dr M J Silk

Whereas

- A. Any country is only as healthy as all of its people;
- B. Health care in South Africa does not reach all the people, and indeed least reaches those most in need of health care.

Synod requests

- 1. The Archbishop to express our concern over the present state of the South African Health Services, especially the fragmentation thereof which exacerbates the present shortage of trained staff.
- 2. The Bishops in whose dioceses the affected health centres are located to communicate with those involved in the strikes with the aim of bringing about a rapid reconciliation of the disputing parties by assisting them to reach a mutually acceptable solution.
- 211.1 Debate was entered into.
- 211.2 The motion was put and carried.

212. AGENDUM 104.15

WEAPONS FREE SOUTH AFRICA

Proposed by: The Rt Revd C H Albertyn

Seconded by : Mrs G Lee

- 1. This Synod pledges itself to a CPSA programme of peacemaking focussing on the notion of "NO WEAPONS HERE" and,
 - 1.1 urges Synod members to commit themselves not to own or use dangerous weapons (except for legitimate professional purposes);
 - 1.2 calls on CPSA members and other Christians to do likewise and commit themselves to peaceful means of conflict resolution;
 - 1.3 requests the clergy of the CPSA no longer to write letters of commendation

for the procurement of licences for firearms;

- 1.4 seeks to form a broadly based public opinion in favour of the progressive future disarming of the South African population.
- 2. This Synod calls on South Africa's leaders to:
 - 2.1 Create a new apolitical police force for South Africa, purged of destructive and insubordinate elements in the present force and incorporating personnel from all sectors of the community, working under one authority for the common good, and able to be trusted by the public;
 - 2.2 Create a new Defence Force and new Prison Service along the lines of (2.1);
 - 2.3 incorporate in the new constitution or its new legislation:
 - (i) the responsibility of the State to protect the individual;
 - (ii) the consequent denial of any general right for the private citizen to own or use dangerous weapons;
 - (iii) strict control of the licensing and issuing of firearms in cases where possession is legitimate and legalised.
 - 2.4 Adopt a timetable for the progressive disarming of all parts of the South African population within a set period after the adoption of the new constitution.
- 3. This Synod thanks CPSA dioceses outside the Republic of South Africa for their encouragement and example, and urges the application of the principles set out above in neighbouring states, according to local circumstances.
- 212.1 The motion was accepted with amendments.
- 212.2 Debate was entered into.
- 212.3 A further amendment was proposed that the word "professional" in 1. 1.1 be removed. The amendment was lost.
- 212.4 The debate continued.
- 212.5 The motion was put, and carried.

COMMUNITY MINISTRIES - PROVINCIAL POLICY GUIDELINES

Proposed by: The Bishop of Pretoria Seconded by: The Bishop of Swaziland

That this Synod:

Giving thanks to God, with our Archbishop who in his Charge recognised how God is raising up and equipping his church with a variety of ministries among the Baptised;

commends developments in those dioceses where there is a restoration of the early church pattern of the local congregation's ministries of community deacons and priests.

requests the Synod of Bishops to take the initiative in producing Provincial Policy Guidelines for community ministries, lay and ordained, in the local congregations of the CPSA so as to encourage and commend this development.

- 3. Expresses its deep gratitude and thanks to the member countries of the Organisation for African Unity (OAU) for their generous and sacrificial solidarity with the South African oppressed;

The motion was put, and carried.

MOTION ARISING OUT OF THE METROPOLITAN'S CHARGE

Proposed by : Mr K Stonestreet

Seconded by: The Bishop of Kimberley & Kuruman

That this Synod:

noting that the President's charge reminded members that they must be "free to choose freely" and "coercion or intimidation of any sort" must not occur; respectfully requests that a sub paragraph (d) be added to rule 52 of the Standing Rules of Provincial Synod.

- i.e. d) The said voting by orders, shall, if requested, be by secret ballot.
- 215.1 Debate was entered into.
- 215.2 The President refused a motion "to move on to the next matter of business."
- 215.3 An amendment was proposed by the Revd Canon L Siboto and seconded by the Revd V Spencer that:

 after the word 'requested' be inserted 'and agreed to by a two-thirds majority'".
- 215.4 The amendment was voted on and carried.
- 215.5 The motion, as amended, was put and carried.

 - 3. there are progressive and democratic structures being looked into by His Majesty the King to afford genuine and lasting peace to the people of the Kingdom,

respectfully and humbly requests the Metropolitan, the Most Revd Archbishop Desmond Tutu, if possible, to

- 1. arrange to meet His Majesty the King Mswati 111 and convey Synod's heartfelt congratulations,
- 2. assure His Majesty the King of our prayers for wise and peaceful leadership, and continued stability in the worship of God through His Son Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour.

The motion was put, and carried.

220. MINUTES

The Chairman of the Scrutineering Committee gave his report. The Minutes pages 92 - 113 were passed as correct by Synod. The Minutes of pages 114 - 134 had been recently posted for inspection - Synod agreed to their signature. The President proposed that the balance of the Minutes be signed, being scrutinised, after the dissolution of Synod.

- 221. The President asked the Headmaster of Waterford Kamhlaba to come forward and receive a gift for his staff from the members of Synod, Synod applauded as the gift was received.
