Tv. HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE FIGHT on FRIDAY

WILL J.L. SULLIVAN TRAVEL THE 12 ROUNDS DISTANCE WITH KING KONG?

FRIDAY, JULY 6, WILL BREAK A FOUR-YEAR OLD MONOTONY ON THIS DATE JOHN L. SULLIVAN WHO MAKES HIS DEBUT IN PROFESSIONAL BOXING RINGS, IS RIDING A HIGH HORSE IN HIS ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE THE TRANSVAAL HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE WHEN HE MEETS SOUTH AFRICA'S NON-EUROPEAN CRACK BOXER, KING KONG.

King Kong, who is also referred to as King Marshal in boxing circles, claims the South African championship through lack of opponents. He last appeared in the ring, except in exhibition fights, four years ago when he caused a big sensation by winning over veteran Gil "K. K. K." Moloi.

The fight will be over 12 three-minute rounds. It took promoters time to arrange this programme, and to get these two "giants" of African boxing in the ring. The stage is now set. King Kong is well-known in the art of fistfights. But then, who is this Sullivan? That is the question not asked in Johannesburg, but throughout the country.

Sullivan (whose real name is Samson Mapalala) is a Sophiatown boxer who gave up weightlifting primarily to step into boxing and meet Marshal. Through his reputation of carrying a telling punch, Sullivan was not absolutely unknown in the boxing gym. He used to spar with leading boxers in Sophiatown until three years or so ago when he decided to couple up his weightlifting activities with boxing. Today, he is climbing the ladder of

boxing, in order to prove, if he can, that a weight-lifter can also become an efficient professional boxer even at his age which he claims to be 26 years.

During the short term of his boxing career, John L. Sullivan has had three managers. The first two did the preparatory work and the present manager, Mr. S. Mokuena will either see Sullivan make a boxing record or climb down the ladder. Mr. Mokuena is reported to be a former boxer who was trained by a Negro professional. He hails from the old Vrededorp Skating Ring Club. That seems to be many years ago, yet his interest in the game has compelled him to take a hand in the game in the form of managing boxers.

With all this to consider before the fight, the ratio is 10:1 in favour of King Kong as winner. All the same it is sporting of Sullivan. Marshal is a seasoned professional. His physique should enable him to hold out against any powerful opponent. He is fast on both his legs and hands and carries a k.o. punch in both of his fists. Whoever meets him should be prepared for real trouble.

Another title bout Friday's programme, which is the first professional show of this year, also features two prominent lightweights of the Transvaal Province. Theo, Mtumbu (alias Brown Panther) fights Kid Leopard over 12 rounds in a title fight for the vacant Tv. championship vacated by One Round Hank.

The crowd will watch an exciting bout which should be packed with action as the two opponents have drawn three times before. Both have emphatically stated that there will be no draw this time. "I either win or lose" is their slogan.

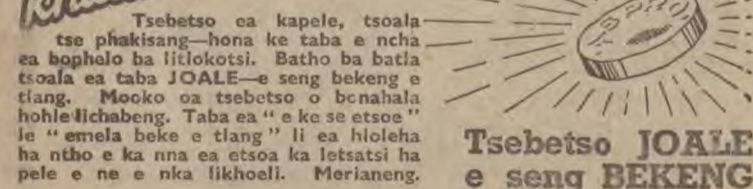
