

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE HELD IN THE OFFICES OF THE NON-EUROPEAN AND NATIVE AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT, JOHANNESBURG MUNICIPALITY, GENEVA HOUSE, ON FRIDAY, 10th JANUARY, AT 1:00 O'CLOCK.

PRESENT: Senator J. D. Rheinallt Jones (in the Chair), Dr. Ray E. Phillips, Mr. Graham Ballenden, Miss Miriam Janisch, Mrs. J. D. Rheinallt Jones, Councillor W. McEwan, Mrs. Ray E. Phillips, Mr. John H. Hunt, Archdeacon R. Y. P. Rouse, Mr. David Murray.

Apologies were received from Mr. J. H. Hofmeyr and Reverend S. S. Tema.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

APPLICATION TO SCHOOL: Dr. Phillips reported that twenty-five men and women had been accepted as students of the School. Several applicants had been turned down mainly because of their heavy indebtedness. A half-dozen applications were still under consideration.

ACCOMMODATION: Arrangements had been made with (1) the Helping Hand Club for providing accommodation for one married couple and several single women students; and (2) the Municipal Non-European and Native Affairs Department for the housing of eight single men students at the Wolhuter Men's Hostel. As these men were to give voluntary assistance in the supervision of the Reading Room, Mr. Ballenden offered to reduce the rent of the students' common room by 50%.

FURNISHING OF ROOMS: Mrs. Ray E. Phillips reported on the furnishing of four rooms and a common room for the men at the Wolhuter Men's Hostel. The cost of this permanent equipment would be about £40.

Suggestions were made about having strips of felt or canvas covers filled with teff instead of coir mattresses. These were referred to the Sub-Committee on Admissions.

STAFF: Dr. Phillips reported briefly on the Staff of the School which was to consist of:-

Miss Hansi Pollak, (Introduction to South African Economics.)
Mr. Julius Lewin, (Social Legislation).
Mrs. J. D. Rheinallt Jones, (Careers and Social Agencies).
Mrs. Perry Joy, (Arts and Crafts).
Miss Leontine Sagan, (Dramatics).
Dr. Ray E. Phillips, (Introductory Sociology).
Dr. George Gale, (Short course of ten hours on Personal Health and Hygiene).

Owing to ill-health Rev. D. K. Clinton was unable to take the course on Christian Social Teachings, which was now to be taken by Rev. John Mullineux. The Physical Education and Recreation course would be under the direction of Dr. E. Jokl of the Witwatersrand Technical College, and would include a special course for the women students.

FURNISHING OF THE CLASSROOMS: Suggestions were made about the type and arrangement of the tables and chairs in the class-room at the Bantu Men's Social Centre, and Dr. Phillips was authorised to furnish this room.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT: After discussion about the wisdom of making such large grants to married couples in particular and also to some of the single students, the financial statement was agreed to with the following alterations:-

- (1) That £250, i.e. 10% of the estimated expenditure be budgeted to cover unforeseen expenses.
- (2) That the cost of the midday meals and the actual amount received from students paying their tuition fees be shown separately.

The question of security for loans was also raised and Dr. Phillips explained that arrangements for the re-payment of loans would be made by him with each student individually.

PLANS FOR THE OPENING OF THE SCHOOL ON 15TH JANUARY:

Mr. J. H. Hofmeyr had agreed to presiding at the official opening of the School at 2:30 o'clock at the University of the Witwatersrand. Senator J. D. Rheinallt Jones would speak on "Present and Probable Future Development in Social Welfare for Africans".

Other speakers would be the Mayor of Johannesburg, Dr. Ray E. Phillips and Mr. Selope Thema.

It was agreed that there should be no collection at this opening ceremony.

The meeting adjourned at 2:35 p.m.

My dear Doctor,

That being the case, I feel I must take this opportunity to offer you my belated yet heartfelt congratulations on your election to the Presidential chair of the African National Congress. I do so both in my personal capacity as plain Richard and also as humble President of the Advisory Boards' Congress.

Although according to well informed circles down our way your election was considered a foregone conclusion long before December last, the results filled us with joy and gladness as if it was something we did not expect. I had hoped to write to you earlier than now, but I was kept so busy during December and the early part of this month that I could hardly write a ~~fix~~ simple letter.

Now that the reins of Congress, and for that matter the political destiny of our people, are in your able hands, we hope for better results. However, I am holding the fort till the end of the year when the members may probably find another man more suited to the position.

By the way, I have a few suggestions to make to you regarding co-operation between the two organisation (A.N.C. & L.A.B.C). These I hope to make in my next letter.

Dear Dr. Xuma,

The outline of the scheme I have in mind is as follows:

You and any of your friends who wish to join in the scheme would form a small company with a capital of say £1000 and the chief business of the company would be to guarantee loans obtained from my Company or other lenders to people approved of by you.

You and your friends would undertake to subscribe amongst you £1000 Capital, but only £100 would be required as an initial contribution though you would have to be prepared to pay up the balance of £900 in a reasonable time when called upon.

When approached for assistance by people you would like to lend money to the following facts must be ascertained:-

again as the amount of the loan required is, viz. if they have property worth £900 they can borrow £600.

(b) They must be people you know you can trust to make regular payments and so pay off their liability in terms of the conditions on which the loans are granted.

(c) If (a) and (b) are complied with your company must be prepared to sign as surety and see that the monthly payments are regularly made.

So far as the working of the company is concerned you would have to appoint a reliable man to act as agent and he would collect the monthly payments from the borrowers or see that they are regularly paid to the lenders.

If the business is done through my Company the charge to the borrowers would be $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ on the amount loaned and of this charge half would be paid to your company as a contribution towards its expenses. Interest would be at the rate of 6% per annum calculated quarterly in advance.

The risk that you and your friends would take would be minimised by the fact that you would only deal with people you know or who would be well recommended to you, but if one of them did fail to pay regularly you would have to take over the property and sell it to someone else. This is an expensive process sometimes and that might result in some loss.

As an additional safeguard I would suggest that each borrower be compelled to become a member of the company and so add to your numbers and reduce the individual liability of all the remaining members.

An article of facts will be a missionary work to the Americans. Will you do this for me?


And if you will, I should like a photograph of yourself, and a short sketch of your own life.
