# GENERAL RULES APPLICABLE TO DETAINERS UNDER THE LARGENCY REGULATIONS.

- 1. (a) VISITORS. No visitor will be allowed without the permission of the Officer Commanding after the approved of the Police has been obtained.
- )b( Visits will be allowed on Mednesdays or Fridays from 10 to 12 a.m. or from 2 to 4 p.m. of each week. Not more than two persons ( relatives or friends ) will be allowed for not longer than 30 minutes.
- (c) Visits from legal advisers are permitted once weekly to dispose of such matters as grocuring power of Attorney, signing chaques and dispussing purely business matters and ag other matters shall be discussed. All such visits will only be allowed in the usual visitors' room and in the presence of either a prison member or foliceman.
  - (d) Any visit will be brought to end after 30 minutes.
- (e) Visits from legal advisers are for these purposes looked upon as business visits and any discussions not confined to such matters as mentioned in (c) above will result in the visits being terminated.
- (f) All discussions will be in one of the official languages of the Union or a Bantu language.
- (g) NB. All discussions between visitors and detainees must be confirmed to purely domestic or business matters.
- 2. LETTARD. Detainees may write one and received one letter weekly. All letters will be forwarded to the Commissioner of Prisons to be censored. All letters must be of a personal or domestic nature and should be of reasonable length and in one of the official languages of the Union or a Bantu language understood in the Union. Titing paper, envelopes and stamps may be purchased.
- 3. WESAGES of import, such as of serious illness, death of a detainee, births etc. will be conveyed, to detainees or relations as may be necessary, by the Commanding Officer.
- 4. ADING MATTE. Approved books, periodicals may bee purchased by detainees and may be retained by the purchaser on release, unless he/she gives written sanction to such becoming government property. No newspapers are allowed.
- 5. TOTLET REQUIR MENTS may be purchased ( subject to approval )
- 6. CIGARETTS OR TOBACCO may be purchased.
- 7. POODSTUFFO. The following may be purchased :- Pruit, sweets, cheese, peamwbutter, cake, tinned foods, bread, unfermented drinks sugar, etc. Any foods that decay easily will be allowed in small quantities only. Orders for toilet requirements and foodstuffs will be taken on Thursdays of each week.
- 8. MONSYS. Up to an amount not exceeding 620 may be paid in for each detained. Fritten requests for the transfer of an amount to any other detained may be made.
- 9. CLOTHING . . mly sufficient change of clothing will be accepted from friends or relatives. None will be sent out, but will be laundered or cleaned in the laundry if properly marked.
