It was under the clouds of war that we presented our last report/..

report. To-day those dark clouds are raining destruction over the world. We consider ourselves fortunate to have lived through another year of war.

In our report for the year 1940 we mentioned that a number of our members had joined the army and others were doing war work under the Y.M.C.A. At the present time there are nearly two hundred members of the Bantu Men's Social Centre in uniform. We are proud of them and wish them every success.

### -THE LIGHTHOME BEQUEST -

Sometime during the year 1938 the Bantu Men's Social Centre was notified by the Attorneys of the late Mrs Lighthome that an amount of £7,200 had been left to the Institution. Much discussion has taken place as to the best possible way of spending the money. In April, 1941 the Committee decided to spend part of the fund on extensions and improvements to the building. These improvements which were undertaken at a cost of over £4,000 were completed in October, 1941. As a result, the Centre is to-day more attractive and a good deal more comfortable. The improvements include a new floor in the hall, a ceiling, a larger stage with dressing rooms fitted with hot and cold water. A new block has been added--three residential rooms, a bathroom and lavatory. In the old days the interior quadrangle was open at the top and on rainy days the place was wet. The top has now been covered with glass. The Billiards Table will shortly be placed in this quadrangle, thus making more space available for social purposes in the club room. The provision of the ceiling has considerably improved the acoustic properties of the hall. This is an improvement for which artists and audiences are equally grateful.

## RE-OPENING OF BANTU MEN'S SOCIAL CENTRE HELL.

During the time that alterations were in progress, the hall was not used. It was re-opened on the 6th October, 1941 with a concert and dance, one of the most successful entertainments ever held here from the point of view of attendance and takings.

## -THE B.M.S.C. AS A CENTRE OF AFRICAN CULTURAL LIFE-

Ey reason of its situation--in the very centre of the city-the B.M.S.C. has always been the most convenient place for holding meetings of organisations. # -OUR CONTRIBUTION TO THE WAR EFFORT .--

The first contribution to the war effort by the E.M.S.C. was to release for Y.M.C.A.work the services of the Secretary, Mr J.R.Rathebe. Mr Rathebe is Associate Director of Y.M.C.A. Non-European War Services. Many of our members have followed Mr Rathebe as Y.M.C.A. workers, whilst others "joined up" Many of these fine men are "Up North" and not a few have, from time to time, appeared on the Roll of Honour. We are proud of them.

On the Home Front we are doing all we can to entertain African/...

. Trican soldiers who are off for their week-ends. Some time during the year, the Y.M.C.A. applied to the Executive Committee of the Centre for permission to use the building as a Soldiers Club on Saturday nights. This was agreed to. At first the response was poor; but lately the numbers have increased, the attendance varying from fifty to one hundred and fifty. On these occassions a bioscope show is provided free of charge. The assistance of African Clergymen from the African Inter-denominational Ministers Association in holding a Sunday morning service is much appreciated.

#### -GAMES-

The activities of the B.M.S.C. are largely confined to games. There are a large variety of these, and members find them engrossing. The unabated interest which they show leads us to believe that we are succeeding in our taks to help divert the thoughts and energies of the men from unhealthy persuits. Occassional competitions have been held during the year in all games and the standard has been very high. BILLIARDS:

Of all indoor games at the Centre the game of Billiards claims a larger number of players than any other. Many members have acquired considerable skill. New champions are always appearing on the Billiards horizon. BASKET BALL: The revival on interest in Basket Ball which had

The revival on interest in Basket Ball which had ceased to be a E.M.S.C. activity was brought about by the students of the Jan H.Hofmeyr School of Social Work. A few challenge. matches were played between the Centre and the school. BOXING AND PHYSICAL CULTURE CLASSES: Poring and Physical Culture

Boxing and Physical Culture Classes have continued with notable success, under the direction of our Physical Director. Nearly every night of the week these classes are hold. The attendance has been satisfactory. At first it was the junior members who took particular interest in these classes; but lately a few of the adult members have taken part. It is to be regretted that no Boxing Tournaments could be arranged for the boys who have so painstakingly kept up their training. On Guest Nights, whenever possible, some of the boys have given demonstrations. As a further means to keep the interest of the boys lessons were given by some of the students of the Hofmeyr School of Social Work in modelling aeroplanes. CHESS:

The numbers of accomplished Chess players have risen. Because there are only a few players no organised matches were played during the year. DRAUGHTS:

There has been a great deal of Draughts playing this year. The Witwatersrand Bantu Draughts Association, with headquarters at the Centre has organised a number of tournaments. Entrants have come from all over the Reef, particularly from the mines. The standard cf play has never failed to impress and the keeness shown is remarkable.

The first tournament was played at the B.M.S.C. on August 10th. There were thirty-six entrants and the tournament lasted for two days. The winner was Mr D.Gosani with Mr W.Ximiya as runner-up. Another competition was for the second division, the winner of which was Mr Siyama. In the tournament for the first Division played on November, 15th Mr V.Ntshingila of Pimville won. Mr Ximiya was again runner-up. Two trophies were offered by the Johannesburg Y.MC.A. for these tournaments. One need hardly say how much of an encouragement these trophies were. <u>VOLLEY BALL</u>:

Ever since its first appearance on the sports programme of the Centre, Volley Ball has been the game of old and young. At Guest Nights demonstrations have been held.

#### TENNIS:

Due to alterations at the Centre it was not possible to make use of our tennis courts for three or four menths. The Centre accepted two challenges; one from the Free State Lawn Tennis Association and nother from the Rand African Students Association. The tennis courts were then used for the first time on Boxing Day. The results showed that even with four months lack of practice our members could still play a good game of tennis. Both the Free Staters and the students were beaten. The Free State club was the guest of the Centre for two days. During this visit the E.MS.C. was a hive of activity. Many people came to watch the matches. A farewell supper was given in honour of the visitors, at which Dr Moroka, Mr Crutse and the Acting Secretary of the E.M.S.C. spoke. Notable was the appeal which speakers made for more regular inter-provincial and inter-club visits which, they said, would give the different clubs an opportunity of learning from each other.

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### -GAMMA SIGMA CLUBS-

The Gamma Sigma Club organisation continued its activities during the year and the inter-club debating contests for the Umteteli Debating Trophy were as keen as in the previous year. The subject chosen for debate for the year was the much discussed qestion of lobola. It was "Resolved that Lobola be Limited by Legislation to ten Head of Cattle, or 250". The Central Gamma Sigma Club took part in the debate. In all the contests leading up to the finals, the Central Gamma Sigma Club won, beating, in the process, the Germiston Gamma Sigma Club, the Van Ryn Deep Club, the Nigel Club, the E.R.P.M. Club and, in the finals, the Wolhuter Y.M.C.A. Thus the Central Club became the winner of the trophy for the year 1941. Mr P.J.Bennett of the Chamber of Mines, in presenting the trophy to the winners commented on the excellence of the debaters on both sides, and expressed the desire that these annual contests would continue to take place. Debaters for the Central Gamma Sigma Club were Mr Congress Mbata, Mr J.G.Malie, Miss V.Dzivane and Mr S.Msimang. They did a fine piece of work and we congratulate them.

In addition to these debating contests, the club kept up its regular programme. There were lectures and debates with groups other than the Gamma Sigma Clubs. On the 28th May Lt/Col. R.F.A.Hoernle lectured on "The African and the Present War." Other speakers were Mr W.G.Ballinger who spoke on "The World in Travall." A debate was held against the Theological students of the St. Peter's School, Rosettenville, when the subject for debate was; "Resolved that the time has come when all matters affecting fricans should be managed by Africans."

#### -LIERARY-

Now in its second year, the Municipal Non-European Library, Bantu Men's Social Centre, at the end of 1941 had a total active membership of 367. Of these the majority were <sup>A</sup>fricans. MEMBERSHIP OF RACIAL GROUPS.

Students of the Hofmeyr School of Social Work use the library reading in sociology, economics, psychology etc. Recently, the University of the Witwatersrand put this library on its mailing list.

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In our last report we expressed the hope that the Municipality would extend the library services to the Locanicus. Since then, we are glad to say, a new library has been put up at the Western Native Township in memory of the late Miss Winifred Holtby.

## -THE JAN H.HOFMEYR SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK-

The first year of the existence of the Jan H.Hofmeyr <sup>S</sup>chool of Social Work has passed with gratifying results. The school enters into its second year still meeting under the roof of the Bantu Men's Social Centre. It gives us a great deal of pleasure to have the school in our building because its presence has strengthened the educational side of our work. The students have rendered a great deal of assistance to the Centre, taking an active interest in social sporting, social and other activities. All the male students of the school are members of the Centre. The students have their mid-day meal at the Centre. There is not the least doubt that when the students have completed their course which is very extensive, they will find occupations where they will be very much needed. Municipalities are clamouring for trained social workers.

#### -MEMBERSHIP-

We have already stated that many of our members have joined the army. For that reason we could not expect as many renewals as usual. We are glad to say however, that we had more members in 1941 than we had in the previous year. The figures given below will serve to show the fluctuation of membership in the last two years.
