Deeply thankful for the blessings received under the Rule of our Noble Sovereign, and His Illustrious Mother, we rejoice at the spread of British Dominion, in South Africa, and assure His Majesty, through You, His Chosen Envoy, that as in the past, the Native Tribes of Bechuanaland, never wavered in their allegiance, in the darkest hour, so they will ever shew in years to come, true devotion to His Throne and Person.

We heard of our King's sickness and were sore afraid, but our hearts swelled with gladness, when he rose up again



again like a strong man, refreshed with slumber, and our prayer is that, through the favour of Almighty God, He may long live and reign over our Childrens' Children.

Knowing Sir, that in you we have a tried friend and a sincere well-wisher, we open our hearts to you to day, and tell you that which is the one great desire of our hearts, and of our people, namely, - that by our loyalty and good conduct, we may always deserve the King's Gracious Protection and by His Will continue to enjoy the great pleasure of living under His and our own Laws, which has helped to make use happy and contented people,

HIS MAJESTY'S CECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES.

The Petition of Pessels Montsion, Chief of the Baralong, and the undersigned Chiefs and Headmen of the Baralong Tribe,

respectfully and Humbly sheeth:-

- (I). That the undersigned are representatives of the Baralong Tribe of Batives living in Bechuanaland.
- (2). That the Baralong has lived in this Territory for many generations past and has from the day it first came under the British Government remained loyal to the British Flag.
- (3). That in days gone by this Nation has been compelled to fight with other Mative Tribes, and the Transveel Boors in order to protect and keep possession of their Country. In this they successful and thus were able to keep open the important direct trade toute to the North and altimately the whole of Bechuanaland became British Torrivery.
- (4). That when the late wer broke out, we offered our assistance to the British, and though as a Tribe our offer was not accepted, yet over 500 of the Tribe were armed, using their own riflez, as there were not sufficient for all the garrison, and took part in the defence of Mafeking.

A great number of the Tribe, over 100, acted as scouts and many as despatch riders. These men in Hafeking served for over seven menths without pay and fed themselves the whole time at their own expense.

- (1). Our grain and stock was commandeered to feed the garrison but of this this we did not, or do not now complain, but cheerfully submitted out of respect to, and love for the British Throne.
- (6). On many occasions duting the Siege, Generals Cronje and Snyjman, commanding the Republican Porces, around Mafeking, sent mesenges to our people, asking them to leave the British to starve in the Tewn, and promised that they could come out and till the growth, and tend the crops, free from melestation from them, but this we would not do, as we preferred to stand side by side with the few European British Subjects still remaining loyal in this part of the Country. Such of the Tribe as play were allowed to and had the privilege of taking up arms for the British Covernment, fought to their beaty, and many lost their lives.
- (7). We humbly and respectfully submit that there is no doubt as to the loyalty of the Baralong Tribe. Long before our request to come under and enjoy the British Bule was accorded us we respected and loved it, and before we became British Subjects we fought for the Honour of England.
- (8). That during the Transvaal War in 1880, Englishmen and loyal Natch speaking Colonists took refuge in Rechuanaland and were well received and looked after by the people of the Tribe.
- (9). Your Petition F would humbly and respectfully draw the attention of your Excellency to the fact that up to 1873 the Baralong Tribe or a portion of it, eccupied what is known as the Pohlfontein Reserve in the Transvaal, but which up to that date, belonged to the Tribe, and adjoins the Natove Reserve at present occupied by them, but were expelled from there under circumstances well known to you.

(10). That soon after the relief of Hafeking, your Petitioners approached Majer General Baden-Powell as representing the Imperial Authorities, and the representative of the Colonial Government Mr Bell, the Civil Cormissioner at Mafeking, and humbly requested that in recognition of the services rendered by the people of the Tribe, the Poliontein Reserve might be in again stanted to the Baralons Tribe and become the inalienable property of the people. We understood that both Major General Baden-Bowell and Mr Bell favoured our request, and would recommend the grant and in anticipation of the confirmation of the same General Baden-Powell at once sent one Silas Molena a Pettychief, to look after the Reserve and restrain the Matives from looting. These instructions were carried out to the satisfaction of the then Acting Resident Commissioner of the District, Mr Blan.

made to annex Bechmanaland to the Transveal. We would rather remain as so are at present, but if His Majesty the King deems it expedient that Bechmanaland should be annexed, then we carnestly pray our Reserve should be annexed to the Bechmanaland Protectorate, in which we have landed property, immediately adjoining the Northern Berders of our Reserve.

AND your Petitions humbly pray that your Excellency will recommend to his Nest Gracious Majesty the King that:
I. The portion of the Transvaal known as Pohlfontein be granted to the Baralong Tribe to be held by them in perpetuity and to be the inalienable property of the Tribe as a recognition of services randered by them to the Imperial Government is the late Far and also in times come by.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

WE, THE PARAMOUNT CHIEF, HEADMEN AND COUNCILLORS OF THE BARALONG NATION, AT MAFEKING, and on behalf of the Baralong Nation at Mafeking, and in the Bechuanaland Protectorate, extend to you and Mrs Chamberlain, a hearty welcome, on this the occasion of your unique visit to South Africa.

We are sure your visit will be fraught with important results, to the future of this Country, and, in view of this, we humbly beg to bring to your attention, and for your earnest consideration, certain matters affecting in no small degree, the interests and existence of the Baralong Nation; and concerning which, we respectfully pray for an assurance and promise, that:-

- (a). As long as prove loyal to the British Government, we shall continue to enjoy the privilege of being subject and amenable to our Native Laws, and to the jurisdiction of the Paramount Chief.
- (b). We shall not be deprived of the rights and privileges conferred on the Baralong Nation, which / /////////////////////
 resident in British Bechuanaland, under and by virtue of
 the Colonial Annexation Act, No.4I, of 1895, either by
 repeal of the provisions of such measure, or otherwise;
 provided we continue as hitherto, to act and conduct purselves as loyal citizens of the British Empire.
- (c). The Native Reserve Lands, situate in the Bechuanaland Protectorate, and set spart for, and granted to, the Baralong Nation, shall ever remain vested in us, and that we shall never have reason to anticipate the deprivation, on the lart of the British Government, of such Native Reserve

We further crave leave to draw your attention to the occasional misgivings, expressed by a number of the people of

South Africa that there is continual danger to be feared, from a Native outbreak or rising, in one or other of the Colonies or Dependencies, of South Africa, in the future.

Thins, we think and trust, been proved, if only during the memorable Siege of Mafeking, that the Baralong Natives shewed during the late War, its loyalty, by espousing and assisting the British cause; and, having no good reason for crediting our fellow-subjects elsewhere in South Africa, with harbouring such designs and ingratitude against the British Government, we deeply feel the suspicions entertained against our Native Brethren, and the consequent reflection upon our proved loyalty.

We lastly desire to express our sympathy, with our European friends, and the South African Colonies generally, in regard to the labour question and difficulty, and recognize gravest— problem, which awaits soltate it is one, if not the greatest ution at your hands. Many thousands of our young man have left and still are leaving, British Bechuanaland and the Protectorate to take employment in the mines, and we would bring to your notice, that we feel a step nearer would be gained, towards solving the labour difficulty, were Mining Employers to increase the existing scale of mwages, which we cannot but admit, is scarcely a living wage.

We wish to express the hope that success will crown your efforts, in South Africa, and that both you and Mrs Chamberlain, will, on returning to England, be benefitted in health, through your visit, and that you will never regret the arduous undertaking, in coming to this distant and strenuous arm of the Empire.
