Thank you for batch of Agenda and Reports, and also for letter about opening a branch of the Institute here.

There are two matters to which I wish to refer :-

1) The Minutes of the recent meeting of the General Purposes Committee do not reflect correctly what I wrote to the Director about his newsletter in January.

I did not say that he appeared to agree with the colour bar policy of the Union, but that he appeared to be defending it, and that I considered this a dangerous thing.

2) I must make clear that while I was corresponding with Mr.Rheinallt-Jones about the possibility of opening a branch of the Institute here that I intended to suggest that we in N.Rhodesia should attempt to raise the funds to finance it. I understood clearly that the Institute itself would not have the funds. I therefore propose that I should consult with the Bishop of N.Rhodesia and Sir Stewart Gore-Brown about the possibility of getting money from the Government and other bodies to open such a branch.



My dear Gluckman,

Many thanks for your various letters. I am sorry that I did not give you just what you wanted in the way of an article, but I couldn't outline what the Institute's plans are to be for work in N. Rhodesia because the financial crisis through which the Institute is going, has made it necessary to call a halt. Our fund raiser was not a success and we are worse off than if we hadn't appointed him. Moreoever, I do think our policy should be to encourage the development of an institute from within the territory or territories. Anyway, I will bring your letter of the 17 January before the General Purposes Committee when it meets this month. The Executive couldn't finish its business.

Thank you for being so willing to help with the Inter-Territorial conference. I hope to get at the preliminary plans at once and I will ask for your advice.

Dear Mr. Rheinallt-Jones,

I have to thank you for two letters, dated the 6th and 9th January, and one undated postcard. I am sorry to have kept bothering you about the article but I know you would like it to go out as soon as possible and we are anxious to go to press. In your postcard you say that the article has been sent but it has not arrived here. If you could let me have it by the end of the month that would be quite satisfactory; I quite appreciate that you would like it discussed by the Council at Cape Town.

In your letter of the 9th January you ask for my views on the suggestions made in your article. I cannot of course give them since I have not yet seen the article, but you summarise your main points so that I can perhaps answer them. I do not know what you can do about the financial problem; we ourselves are short of funds and I cannot think where your Institute is likely to get any where we have failed, but in principle I think that your idea of having a branch in each of the Territories is the best. Nyasaland and the two Rhodesias are in practice widely separated and have very different problems. I suppose Ibbotson could give you the best advice on how things might be developed in Southern Rhodesia. As far as Northern Rhodesia is concerned, I think you would be best advised to tackle the problem through the three African Representatives in the Legislative Council. If the Executive agrees perhaps we might have a meeting of them and myself during the next session of Legislative Council when we will all be in Lusaka and there need be no cost. We can then discuss the whole problem and put our views to the General Purposes Committee.

I am sorry to learn from your letter of the 6th January that you have been ill, and hope you are now better. Incidentally, you mention in it that you sent me a telegram, but this did not arrive.

It would be helpful to have your views, more particularly as to the relation of any such institute to your Institute, and the way in which the proposed institute could be most helpful.


