He has a choice for me. Should I marry this girl? —"Worried," Jabavu.

Parents should help their children in choosing a lifepartner, but it is wrong for a father to compel his son "o marry a girl he does not love. I advise you to wait until you meet a girl whom you really love and whom you wish to make your life-partner.

Where may I obtain some office work in Johannesburg or Pretoria, especially the latter. I have passed my Junior Certificate examination and the Native Primary Higher Teachers' course. I am unable to secure a teaching post. -Miss P. M. N., Evaton.

It is hard to obtain office work. Why don't you apply for training as a nurse? In that course you earn while you learn, and you have the nece-ssary qualification.

What does this mean? "He sings where angels fear to whisper."-Lazarus Motaung,

It means that a person takes an unwise risk. The usual phrase is 'Fools rush in where angels fear to tread.'

Kindly help me to solve this problem. On account of lack of money I was forced to seek work and pay tax. Will I continue to be liable for tax when I return to school?-J. C. R.

Ordinarily a young man is liable for tax when he reaches the age of 18. But if you return to school you must go to the Pass Office and explain your position and produce papers from your school to prove your case. They will give you an exemption from tax for the years you spend in school

Since you were injured at work, consult the Pass Office who will send an inspector to investigate whether you were rightly discharged and whether you are entitled to sick pay. In any event they will compel your employers to report to the Workmen's Compensation Commissioner in Pretoria. He may order them to pay you for your injury if he finds that you are entitled to such payment.

Please let me know which school teaches sewing, dressmaking, cooking and other such subjects.—Annah Ngoben, Charles Maggs Memorial School, Pretoria.

Apply to the Inanda Seminary, P.O. Phoenix, Natal.







