

Dear Dr. Xuma,

In the first place I must beg for your pardon for what I had promised to do, to send you regularly all the reports of the Committee's activities, I have not been able to do so, and I have always felt that I would be interferring with your so much desired studies for the forthcoming exams you will be taking.

Things have so changed locally that it is quite possible that when you return we shall be on a defferent footing than when you left us. Our Sanitary Staff has done excellent work. Mr. Thipe was successful at the examinations held under the directorship of Dr. Anning and Mr. Nyamende has acquired his R.S.I. certificate.

During December and up to the present we have the Press busy some clamouring for the immediate abolition of the Township whilst others follow the contents of the Feetham Report, a copy of which I am sending under separate cover, that the Government should shoulder the burden of the whole administration of the Township.

The Feetham Report will give you an idea of the opposite attitude adopted by the Europeans of the place. The City Council, Native Affairs Department, Public Health Department and the Provincial Administration will be meeting very soon to confer on our ultimate end. As soon as we receive a drastic change I shall let you know. At the moment things are just running smoothly the only exception being these smallpox cases - created by none but the Zionists who point blank refuse to be vaccinated.

Another long wanting asset is the co-operation of the inhabitants and the Health Committee. At the present such co-operation is lacking and lacking to an extent that

people are actually playing into the hands of the City
Council. Recently a public meeting decided to F.M.G (in
their own way of putting it - meaning FALWASSER MUST GO).

I take no sides, but I think when such a resolution is submitted to the Administrator and a deputation waits on him,
whilst on the one hand we have the Feetham report which
places high praise on the system of Government of the Township, things do not look at all rosy for us. Even the recent
amallpox outbreak was so tackled that the Union Public Health
Department was surprised at the manner in which we handled
the affair. To-day after having discoverred, with no aid
from a Medical Practitioner - some hiden cases, the Press
have the audacity of terming the Township a "PLAGUE SPOT".
This insinuation we might augment by having this split between the people the and the Health Committee.

I do hope that when you return you will find things on a bettering line and I have thought to myself that since you were M.O.H. we were never so worried by the Government Departments, nor were insinuations thrown at us from the Press as at present, and your return will, this is my sound contention - wave aside such insinuations and we shall never - as in the past - have an outbreak of any form of epidemic.

Your studies are a great concern as far as I am concerned and I do not want you to worry about local affairs whilst furthering your knowledge.

Dear Sir,

I thank you for your letter of the 22nd April, 1938, and very much appreciate what you said in it.

I had the privilege of seeing you by accident when Mr. Griffiths Motsieloa/walked into your surgery in Johannesburg in 1928.

Regarding my views on the suggested incorporation of the Bechuanaland Protectorate into the Union of South Africa, I and my people are strongly opposed to such incorporation by reason of the Union's Native Policy towards its own natives, and I need not awell at length on this question, as you are better acquainted with the Union legislation than I am, because your home is in the Union.

With reference to your seeing The Secretary of State on our behalf, I am afraid I cannot go as far as that, but you can see him and tell him what you yourself feel about this suggested incorporation, because I know

you are also opposed to the idea of having these territories transferred to the Government of the Union of South Africa. My not granting you permission to interview the Secretary of State on our behalf must not be taken as meaning that 1 distrust you in any way - far from that - the question is a very delicate and deplomatic one indeed, and you know that I am a representative of the people and am not at liberty to authorise any private individual to interview such a high official on their behalf, and in any case you could not be accepted by the Secretary of State as an official representative of the people.
