MINUTES OF THE THIRD ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING:

The meeting was held on Sunday 8th. September 1985 at the Nur-Ul-Islam Auditorium commencing at 10H.00.

The President, Dr. Gopal, presided.

The Chairman opened the meeting and welcomed all the delegates present. He called for a minute's silence for all those who had lost their lives in the struggle for justice and fair-play.

Credentials were accepted.

The Minutes of the 2nd. Annual General Meeting were read and adopted, moved Mr. P. Gopal, seconded Mr. J. Parbhoo.

The Presidential Address

The address was read by the President, Dr. R. Gopal.

The President said that the country was in a turmoil and we were fortunate that we were still able to play cricket.

He felt that more attention should be paid to schools' cricket.

There was also a need to promote cricket in those areas where cricket is not being played. Cricket was an expensive sport and ways would have to be found to assist junior players in places where they could not afford to play cricket.

The Financial Statement:

The Statement was read by the Treasurer.

It was accepted, proposed Mr. R. Adams, seconded by Mr. A. Moonda.

A credit balance of R1 600, 86 was noted.

The Record Clerk's Report:

The report was read by Mr. P. Gopal.

The Chairman thanked Mr. Gopal for a comprehensive report.

The Report was adopted, moved Mr. E. Mla, seconded Mr. Y. Gardee.

Mr. Feldman felt that the junior board should tighten up its administration. He also commented on the poor attendance by senior clubs and players.

Mr. A. Moonda felt that an effort should be made to purchase stock for those clubs who could not afford it. He was critical about the junior presentation function.

Mr. Feldman suggested that all the reports be typed and then circularised.

Mr. A. Ahmed asked about the position of junior cricketers in the Western Transvaal. The CHairman replied that some means of co-operation would be worked out.

Elections:

The meeting decided that voting would be by a show of hands.

THE CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS TO BE PRESENTED TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

20 SEPTEMBER 1986.

Officials, delegates and junior cricketers

The administration of non-racial or SACOSport is a very difficult undertaking. We have to contend with very strong anti-SACOS forces which deprive us of sponsorship, playing facilities, news coverage and other important requirements. Most of these forces are obvious and they will only disappear when a truly non-racial democracy is achieved. Some are not so obvious. We have, for instance, some sports administrators in our ranks who collaborate with the anti-SACOS forces in an attempt to overcome the hardships and handicaps I have mentioned above. Such collaboration has set our cause back many times. These administrators and the rest of us have to accept that it is not easy to administer SACOSport.

Presently we are functioning under a state of emergency. This adds to our problems. Last season the national Under 16 tournament which was to be held in Port Elizabeth was cancelled. The situation is so bad that we do not know for how much longer we will still be able to organise and play sport. We should use the little time we do have to prepare our sportspersons for the future- a future in which justice and fair-play will prevail.

Last season, with the assistance of some senior administrators who joined our ranks, we have improved our status, the standard of our administration and our future prospects tremendously. I would like to record my appreciation to them.

During the season under review we were also fortunate in having the two official T.C.B. coaches who assisted us. We wish to express our appreciation for the service they rendered. We look forward to their continued contribution to the game in the coming season.

It will be our duty in the coming season to make positive inroads into areas where there is no junior cricket and develop cricket there. A priority will be to co-operate with the schools' associations and the schools themselves in order to promote cricket at school level. That is the reason why we are inviting the schools' sports organisations to affiliate to the junior board where they will be accessible for discussions and consultation. It is a matter of concern to us that the primary schools in the Lenasia area have still not joined our ranks. We are concerned both as cricket administrators and as parents.

After our most successful Under 16 Cricket Week a representative team was selected. In place of the cancelled Under 16 tournament we arranged a tour to Natal. The senior Board involved themselves in this matter without prior consultation and nearly caused a disaster. The junior Board did well to find money at short notice to make the tour possible.

Cricket is becoming a very expensive game. We will have to find ways to raise funds and to reduce costs where possible urgently.

Lastly, I wish to express the thought that some administrators who have been at the top for a long time seem to develop a sense of ownership and forget democracy and the constitution. It is important for office bearers to rotate their posts and positions otherwise it becomes detrimental to the organisation and the person.

Since our inception we have traversed difficult times and it seems to me as if the future does not seem to be any brighter or easier. Only hard work, dedication and a total commitment to our cause will help us.

THE SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT PRESENTED TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL

MEETING OF THE BOARD.

20 SEPTEMBER 1986.

ORGANISATION:

The following officials served the junior board for the season 1985/86:

Chairman: Dr. R. Gopal Vice Chairman: Mr. Y. Kara.

Treasurer: Mr. A. B. Gandabhai. Secretary: Mr. R.A. Feldman.

M & R Secretary: Mr. P. opal. Members of the Executive Committee: Messrs G. Mahomed; J.Parbhoo; A. Moonda and E. Mia. Mr. P.J. Bhana attended some meetings.

ADMINISTRATION:

The affairs of the Board were administered by the officials and the Executive Committee in accordance with instructions and decisions taken at the Council meetings.

Council meetings were held once a month. The Executive Committee met once a month at least.

Council meetings were held on the following dates:

September 1985; October 1985; November 1985; December 1985;

January 1986; February 1986.

Eight Executive Committee meetings were held. One Emergency meeting was also held

An innovation during the year was the presence of junior delegates in the Council meetings. The junior delegates were encouraged to participate in the meetings and most of them took advantage of the opportunity to express their views. This is something that must be encouraged and all clubs are urged to have at least one junior delegate present at every meeting. In this way juniors will be able to have some input and they will learn meeting procedures. The idea should be introduced at club level and juniors should be allowed to hold positions such as Secretary in the junior divisions of their clubs.

During the course of the year the name of the Board was changed to Transvaal Junior Cricket Board as the old name T.C.B. Junior Division was a misnomer. The junior board was never a division of the senior board. They have always had their own constitution, have had their own officials, their own banking account and they have administered their own affairs. The only way to integrate the junior board into the senior board would be to scrap the junior board constitution, sack the officials, close the banking account and administer the affairs of the junior board just as the affairs of all the other divisions of the Transvaal Cricket Board are administered.

It is hoped to have the primary schools' association and the high schools' association within the ranks of junior board where their presence at meetings and participation will have some relevance for themselves and for junior board. Junior board caters for school boys and it is advisable to have representatives of the schools present so that they are accessible.

REGISTRATION OF MEMBERS:

A start was made with the proper registration of players. The Board decided that all players must produce documentary evidence proving their dates of birth. Only birth certificates and Identity Documents would be acceptable as they are the only documents which the South African Cricket Board accepts.

This season the junior board will insist that all players be properly registered so that in future embarrassment will be avoided when players are selected for representative matches. Each player will only have to produce his document once to junior board and again when he is selected and the document needs to be scrutinised by the South African Cricket Board. In any case, it is only right and proper that date of birth should be proved when participation in any code is according to age groups or age divisions.

COMPETITIONS:

The following age groups operated in the board:

Under 12; Under 14 and Under 16.

The Board discussed the introduction of soft-ball cricket for the Under 10 age group but unfortunately the board did not have the funds to provide the necessary balls and other equipment. It is still the intention to introduce this type of cricket and to this end approaches have been made to Bakers Ltd who are sponsoring this type of cricket. A full report is due to be presented to junior boara regarding this sponsorship application.

An Under 14 cricket and coaching week was held. Junior Board must thank Messrs Barney Mahomed and Jack Manack for undertaking the coaching chores. The boys were given a written test at the conclusion of the coaching. Mr. E. Khan of the Umpires' Association lectured to the boys on the laws of the game. We thank Mr. Khan and the Umpires_ Association. The boys had the opportunity to put whatever they learnt into practice when they played some matches at the end of the week.

The Under 16 Week was a serious cricket week and at the end of the "Week" a representative team was selected and given colours. Unfortunately the SACB under 16 tournament was cancelled. In lieu of the tournament "friendly" matches were organised.

The playing season culminated in the presentation function which was held in the Patidar Hall. A lack of funds led to the healthy participation of junior clubs and their players together with their parents in a novel function. Clubs provided all the refreshments at the function. There was more than enough for all those present and much joy was experienced at the spontaneous and generous manner in which clubs responded. It is my opinion that even if the board should have sufficient funds at its disposal we should carry on with this type of function. A full report of the function follows this report.

Our clubs need to be better organised if we are to satisfy the administrative side of our fixtures. Match reports were not submitted and generally there was a sad lack of participation by senior members in the affairs of the juniors. Those who were active did sterling work and I am certain that their efforts were appreciated by the parents and players. Junior clubs need much more assistance from senior players. Without them and without the co-operation of the parents it is not possible to run junior cricket. I make an urgent appeal to senior players and officials to come along to assist junior players and clubs.

There was a shortage of playing fields and we were forced to play two matches on some pitches on the same day with Under 12 matches being played in the morning followed by Under 14 and Under 16 matches in the afternoon.

Junior Board has resolved to develop cricket in areas where it has been in neglected. The Bosmont/Newclare/Riverlea area is one of those. Schools are being approached via the schools' association and encouraged to register school teams to play on Saturdays in the board's leagues. If sufficient clubs are registered it might be possible to institute a type of zonal cricket which will cut travelling costs and arrangements. I hope the Board succeeds in its intention. An appeal is made to the schools' bodies for their co-operation and active assistance.

The Junior Board was left to rely on its own resiurces to meet the financial needs for the year.

A raffle boosted the income but it was not enough to cover all our expenses. The Junior Board fell back on the most reliable of resources, the human material at its disposal. Clubs and individuals came to the rescue of the and we were able to provide all players and officials with lunches at the Under 14 and Under 16 Weeks as well as send a team to Durban. Our sincere thanks go to all those who assited by sponsoring lunches: both clubs and individuals whose names appear in the Under 14 and Under 16 cricket week reports.

The Junior Board is entering the new season "in the black". Here we must commend our Treasurer who is a pillar of strength in Junior Board.

Junior Board is once more planning a "community" effort when all players, club officials and parents will get together in a joint effort to assist the Board. The féte which will be held in November will provide an excellent vehicle for togetherness and at the same time assist the Board financially.

The Presentation function was an outstanding success. Here again a joint effort proved to be " a winner". Each club was asked to bring a specific item of refreshment and the Board, once more, owes a debt of gratitude to all those who made the Presentation such an enjoyable function. The two junior speakers added lustre to the occasion and the Board saved a biggish sum of money.

We have every reason to be optimistic of achieving our aim to meet our budget in the coming season, thanks to the splendid spirit of unity in the Board.

THE TRANSVAAL CRICKET BOARD

Elsewhere in his Presidential Address the Chairman mentions the fact that the Under 16 visit to Durban nearly ended in a "disaster". Junior Board had occasion then to write a letter to the T.C.B. and I can do no better, in my opinion, to reflect Junior Board's feelings vis a vis the T.C.B. than to quote fully the final paragraph of that letter which went as follows:

"Junior Board wishes to place on record, without reservation, its wish for close, harmonious co-operation from the T.C.B. and all its members. We wish to thank all the clubs and individuals who have come forward to offer assistance to Junior Board and wish to inform them that we shall certainly and gladly make use of all offers of assistance. We look forward to an improvement in our relations with the T.C.B. and only request, most seriously, that all those who are committed to non-racialism in sport and in life in general should conduct all their affairs with due regard to the tenets of democracy which we are fighting so hard for and in accord with the dictates of courtesy and mutual respect and also without regard to the personalities involved. Our dictum should be: We Live for Our Children."

The letter was written on the 11th. of January and every word in it is still true.

CONCLUSION:

In conclusion, I wish to thank all the officials and delegates who attended Junior Board meetings regularly. In my long time as a sports administrator I has seldom experienced such unity and harmony of purpose. It was a pleasure to attend Board meetings and a privilege to work for the young cricketers who form the most important part of the Junior Board's membership. I hope that the Junior Board will be allowed to continue its work unhindered. Our Chairman, Dr. R. Gopal is completely committed to our cause and he has with him officials who are similarly imbued.

I wish Junior Board everything of the best.

The number of pitches was not adequate and an innovation was that two matches were played on the same ground: an Under 12 match in the morning, followed by an Under 14 or Under 16 match in the afternoon.

An application to make use of some turf wickets to alleviate the shortage of grounds was unanswered by the Senior Board.

Competitions:

It is not possible to publish logs for the competitions mainly due to the fact that clubs did not regularly make match returns. This was due to the fact that junior teams were frequently not accompanied by senior members or that the senior members were not sufficiently interested to insist on the match return. There were exceptions and some of the clubs were meticulous in their attention to the juniors.

Under 12:

The Under 12 division played a league competition and a knock-out. The teams were:

Azad A; Azad B; Queensland; Azaadville; Pirates; Bluebells; Ennerdale(this team withdrew from fixtures in the middle of the season. Transport problems were given as the reason) Ottomans(did not fulfill all matches) and Azad Hinds who registered when Ennerdale withdrew.

Under 14:

This division only played a league competition.

A most successful week was held for the Under 14 cricketers. The programme for the week was as follows:

The intention is to allocate managers from the ranks of school boys who are playing in the top divisions as the main drawback clubs suffered was the non-availability of their senior officials who were at work during the time of the competition.

The matches were of a high standard and were keenly contested. At the end of the week a team was selected to represent Transvaal. They were given colours. Unfortunately the SACB Under 16 Tournament which was to have been held in Port Elizabeth was cancelled.

As compensation the team was taken to Durban where they played two matches, winning one and losing one. The Managers were Mr. A. Moonda and Mr. M. Desai.

I recommend that the Board organise another week for the Under 14 and for the Under 16 teams.

Registration of Players:

I recommend that this season only properly registered players be allowed to participate in the Board's competitions. This means that all registrations must be accompanied by a birth certificate or an I.D.

Presentation of Trophies:

This function was an unqualified success. Trophy winners are noted in an addendum to the Secretary's Report and follows that report.
